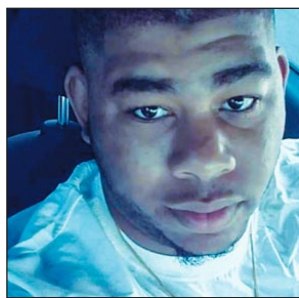

Death at local plant

NORTHEAST HARRIS COUNTY – Harris County Sheriff's Detectives, Occupational Safety and Health officials and an attorney representing the family of Bryan Jones are investigating how he was found dead at work in the world's largest tire shredder on January 26.

At a location just the other side of the San Jacinto River on the Beaumont Highway, Genan Inc. operates a plant said to be state of the art in safety, engineering and production of materials for reuse of old tires has had its first work related fatality in the world.

Co-workers indicate Jones had just begun his shift but then went missing. They later discovered that he had somehow died in a gruesome industrial accident. Co-workers indicated they had no idea how he could have become caught in a tire shredder. A federal investigation is underway.

Attorney Andrew Seerden, indicated that his law firm plans to file a lawsuit and is also investigating the death of the 26 year old father to hold "negligent parties fully accountable."

The Genan Company has issued no statements concerning the death but records indicate this is the first incident of its type in company history. The local plant is the largest re-cycling plant of its type in the world.

County Attorney Vince Ryan says opioid lawsuit should stay in Texas court

Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan is fighting to keep the opioid lawsuit filed on behalf of Harris County in a state district court.

Ryan is opposing an effort by opioid drug distributors to move the lawsuit to federal court. He has filed a motion seeking to have the case returned to state district court.

Three distributors—McKesson Corporation, Amerisource Bergen and Cardinal—moved Harris

several of the different schools that Harris County Precinct 3 Deputies patrol and provide security. Constable Sherman Eagleton's Office provides security for Sheldon ISD, Galena Park ISD, Channelview ISD, Dayton ISD, and Crosby ISD.

Recently, a juvenile was detained at one of those schools after officials alerted the campus deputy of a threat made by the student.

Constable Eagleton is committed to the safety and welfare of the students and staff at the five school districts within his precinct. "Children are our most precious gift, it is incumbent that parents be involved, and monitor the activities of their children, especially on social media. Ultimately, safety is everyone's responsibility," said, Constable Eagleton.

The current climate has caused anxiety for many parents, but Constable Eagleton has implemented enhanced safety measures on all campuses. All deputies assigned to patrol schools are trained to respond to emergency situations, including active shooters, and each district has an established plan in place, for emergency situations. Harlem hosts first CATCH family night

the community meet at Goose Creek Trail and Eddie Huron Park. The next Healthy Weight and Your Child class is offered by the Baytown YMCA in February, and there is still time to register. In addition, the Diabetes Prevention Program is offered year-round. Those interested in any of the programs may contact the YMCA at 713-758-9152 or text Strawbridge at 850-208-1560. All of these programs are free.

Coach Carl Gray and Michael Garza, Campus Student Success Specialist, gave out door prizes, including cookware, a cooler, a yoga mat, a game set and a basketball. Children at the session engaged in physical activity in the gym and were invited to participate in a matching game, selecting foods that would fulfill healthy options for the MyPlate guidelines. The evening ended with attendees enjoying healthy fruits and vegetables.

"Great job, Harlem! We look forward to hosting CATCH Family Nights at Lamar and Carver Elementary next month," said Priscila Garza, Healthy Community School Coordinator.

suit, cost Harris County residents their health and even their lives and cost taxpayers millions to pay for healthcare and law enforcement. The County Attorney's office reports that jail costs associated with opioid addiction are currently approximately \$216,000 a day in Harris County. The suit accuses the defendants of creating a public nuisance, conspiracy and neglect.

Ryan's lawsuit maintains that the defendants knew that the use of opioids had the potential to cause addiction and other health maladies. Driven by profit, the suit says the defendants engaged in a campaign of lies, half-truths and deceptions to create a market that encouraged the over-prescribing and long-term use of opioids, even though there was no scientific basis to support such use. Unfortunately, the suit says, the campaign worked and resulted in an exponential increase in opioid abuse, addiction, and death. That increase required Harris County to expend its limited resources to help those affected by this crisis and protect the community from harms associated with the opioid epidemic.

Ryan points out that McKesson is one of the largest drug distributors in the world and was fined

\$13 million dollars in 2008 and \$150 million dollars in 2017 for failing to report suspicious sales and suspicious orders of opioids. Also, AmerisourceBergen has paid \$16 million dollars for improper behavior in its role as a distributor of opioids, and Cardinal settled with the State of West Virginia in 2012 for failing to report suspicious orders of controlled substances.

"As I said when I announced the lawsuit, these companies have repeatedly placed profits above people," said County Attorney Ryan. "The wrongful removal of this case demonstrates a continuation of that philosophy and a desire to frustrate the judicial process by denying the residents of Harris County the right to have this case determined by Harris County residents in the county where the harm occurred. The 133rd District Court is where this case belongs, not Cleveland, Ohio, where the defendants are attempting to have this case transferred.

"This same tactic was attempted unsuccessfully in Hopkins County, Texas, where it was summarily dismissed by the federal court to which it was removed," Ryan explained. "We will fight for the same right for Harris County."

Supreme Court declines to decide fate of ‘Dreamers’ just yet

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court on Monday rejected the Trump administration’s highly unusual bid to bypass a federal appeals court and get the justices to intervene in the fate of a program that protects hundreds of thousands of young immigrants from deportation.

The announcement means the case affecting “Dreamers” will have to work its way through the lower courts before any Supreme Court ruling is possible. The case could also become moot if Congress takes action in the meantime. Right now, however, efforts to address the issue in Congress have hit a stalemate.

The Supreme Court’s decision for now to stay out of the case on the Obama-era Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or DACA, wasn’t surprising. It’s highly unusual for the Supreme Court to hear a case before a lower appeals court has considered it.

But DACA supporters hailed the decision as a significant — if only temporary — win. Trump said the case would now be heard by an appeals court and “we’ll see what happens from there.”

“You know, we tried to get it moved quickly because we’d like to help DACA. I think everybody in this room wants to help with DACA,” he said to visiting governors. “But the Supreme Court just ruled that it has to go through the normal channels.”

DACA has provided protection from deportation and work permits for about 800,000 young people who came to the U.S. as children and stayed illegally.

In September, Trump argued that President Barack Obama had exceeded his executive powers when he created the program. Trump announced he was ending the program effective March 5 and gave lawmakers until then to come up with a legislative fix.

But in recent weeks, federal judges in San Francisco and New York have made Trump’s deadline temporarily moot for people who have sought and been granted renewals; the rulings do not extend to people who are applying for the first time. Judges issued injunctions ordering the administration to keep DACA in place while courts consider legal challenges to Trump’s termination. As a result,

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services resumed accepting and processing DACA renewals in January, just as it had before Trump’s September announcement.

The Trump administration has not tried to block the injunctions that force it to continue operating the program. Though the March 5 date is now moot, Greisa Martinez, policy and advocacy director for United We Dream, said DACA supporters planned to demonstrate in Washington on that day in part to continue to pressure Congress to act.

The Senate two weeks ago blocked a bipartisan bill offering Dreamers potential citizenship and providing \$25 billion for President Donald Trump to build his proposed border wall with Mexico. A more conservative House proposal that sharply reduces legal immigration and imposes other restrictions has languished short of the GOP votes it would need to pass, leaving its fate in question.

The Supreme Court’s announcement Monday that it wouldn’t step in to the case now means the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit will likely be the first appeals court to weigh in on the topic, the step before the case would return to the Supreme Court.

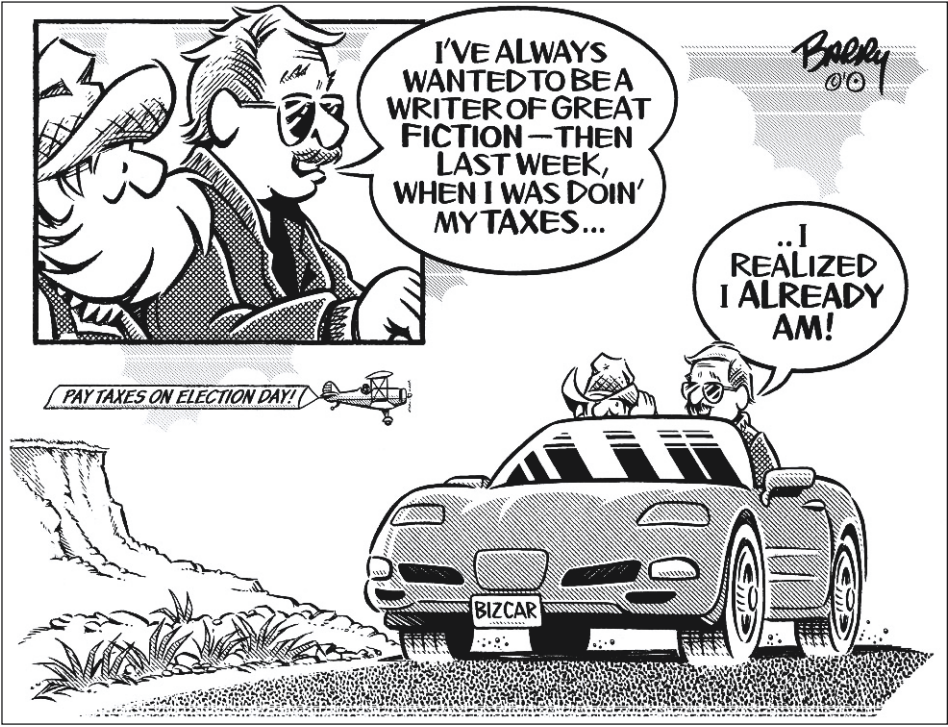
California Attorney General Xavier Becerra, who has led the multi-state lawsuit in California to keep DACA in place, cheered the Supreme Court announcement Monday.

“It’s a victory for all Dreamers, certainly a great victory for California,” Becerra said during a phone call with reporters. “It’s a victory for the rule of law and it’s a victory for our economy.”

The Ninth Circuit has set no date to hear arguments but has given lawyers dates by which they must file briefs that run through April. Andrew Pincus, an attorney who represents more than 100 businesses that intervened in support of DACA, said June is probably the earliest that the court would rule.

Trump on Monday didn’t seem to hold out much hope of winning at the Ninth Circuit, criticizing the liberal-leaning court by saying “nothing’s as bad as the Ninth Circuit.”

“I mean, it’s really sad when every single case filed against us in the 9th Circuit we lose, we lose, we lose and then we do fine in the Supreme Court,” he said.



Governor orders action to address safety at schools

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Feb. 21 sent a letter to Texas Education Agency Commissioner Mike Morath ordering immediate action to ensure the safety of children in Texas schools following the multi-fatality shooting at a Parkland, Florida, high school on Feb. 14.

Abbott listed steps for Morath and other state education leaders to take to respond to and prevent such tragedies, including:

— Catalog and share all available information from the Texas School Safety Center on school safety programs and distribute this information to all school districts, charter schools and education service centers across the state;

— Ensure that all Texas public schools have completed their statutorily required school safety audits and have submitted confirmation of these audits to the Texas School Safety Center;

— Publish on the Texas Education Agency website and via agency press release a list of any school districts that have not completed the statutory requirements referenced in point two above within 45 days; and

— Work with the Texas School Safety Center, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the governor’s office to draft recommendations to the Texas Legislature on changes to the school safety architecture of our state.

“All of Texas grieves the tragedy that occurred in Parkland last week. As governor, I take seriously the safety of all Texas residents, and as an American, I mourn the loss of 17 Floridians in a cruel and senseless act of violence. Immediate steps must be taken to keep our students and communities safe, with the understanding that more will be expected in the future,” Abbott said.

State laws allow marshals

Acknowledgement of the threat of school shootings came years ago in the form of House Bill 1009, a law passed by the 83rd Texas Legislature in 2013.

The law allows public school districts and open enrollment charter schools to appoint school marshals.

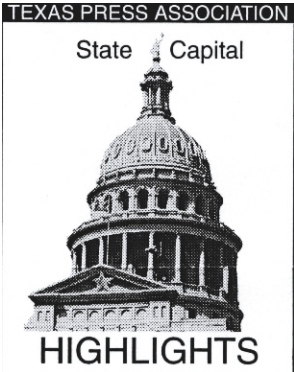
In 2015, the 84th Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 386, to include public two-year junior colleges in the list of institutions that can appoint school marshals.

And, in 2017, the 85th Texas Legislature

passed House Bill 867, a law that allows private schools to appoint school marshals.

According to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, “The sole purpose of a school marshal is to prevent the act of murder or serious bodily injury on school premises and act only as defined by the written regulations adopted by the school board/governing body.”

Abbott spares prison inmate

Shortly before state prison inmate Thomas Bartlett Whitaker, 38, was scheduled to die by lethal injection on Feb. 22, Gov. Abbott signed a proclamation commuting the death sentence to life in prison without possibility of parole.

Abbott, in making the proclamation, agreed with a recommendation by the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles.

Whitaker was convicted and sentenced in 2008 for conspiring to kill his parents and brother, but he did not shoot the gun that caused the murders of his mother and brother.

DPS drone program debuts

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Feb. 15 announced the launch of its “unmanned aerial systems” program.

Small, unmanned aerial vehicles, generically referred to as “drones” will be used for a variety of public safety missions across Texas, including flight missions related to officer safety, search and rescue, disaster support, aerial observation support, crash reconstruction, crime scene photography and communication tower inspections.

So far, the DPS said, the program’s fleet includes 17 unmanned aerial systems costing the state an estimated \$70,000 and paid for with existing funding,

grant funding or seized funds.

AG pursues elder fraud

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Feb. 23 announced that his office joined the U.S. Department of Justice and the National Association of Attorneys General in “the largest coordinated sweep of elder fraud cases in history.”

The multi-state actions charged a variety of fraud schemes, ranging from mass mailing, telemarketing and investment frauds to individual incidences of identity theft and theft by guardians.

“Anyone can be a victim of fraud, but senior citizens are targeted more often by scammers seeking to exploit someone for a quick buck,” Paxton said. “Today’s action is one of many steps my office has taken in the fight to protecting elderly Texans whose financial well-being is compromised by nefarious characters,” he added.

Joining Texas in the coalition are the U.S. Department of Justice, Alabama, Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New York, North Dakota, Oregon and South Dakota.

How to see actual government documents

In addition, federal depository librarians can provide expert research assistance to help you make the most of these U.S. government information resources.

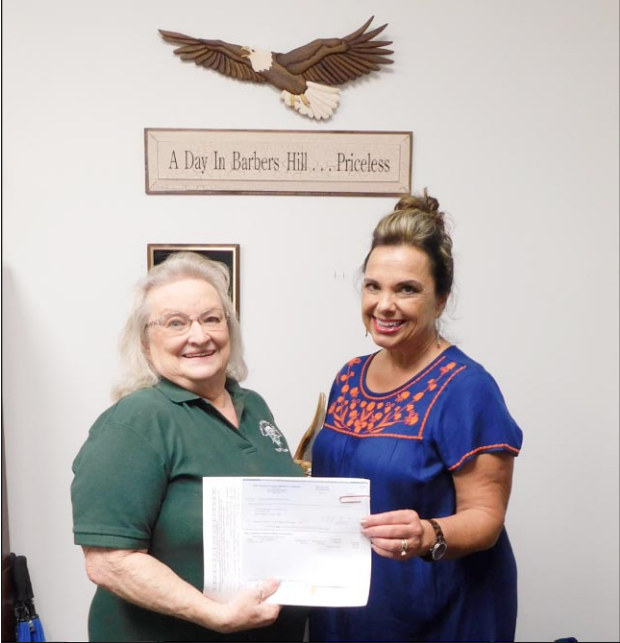

Keep Your Knees Healthy

BAYTOWN — (February 16, 2018) — Many people begin experiencing some degree of joint pain as they age, especially in the knees. But it is possible to combat the wearing down of cartilage (osteoarthritis) and the general wear and tear inflicted on the knees.

Strengthen Your Legs

The knee depends on the muscles around it to take some of the impact and pressure of everyday use. By strengthening your leg muscles, you can bolster the joint and relieve pressure. “The main muscles to focus on are your quadriceps (the muscles above your knee on the front of your thigh) and hamstrings (back of your thigh), though the muscles in your calves, hips and core also play important roles in stability,” said Dr. Michael Hopson, orthopedic surgeon with Houston Methodist Orthopedics & Sports Medicine at San Jacinto.

Try this: Start with low-impact exercises like walking, cycling and yoga to build strength. For help with building a tailored strength-training regimen, speak with a physical therapist or trainer.

Lose Weight

Extra weight puts more pressure on your knees than you may think. It's estimated that for every extra pound we carry, we add four pounds of pressure to our knees. That means a loss of even 10 pounds can relieve 40 pounds of pressure. By staying within a healthy body mass index (BMI) range, usually from 18.5 to 24.9, you can prevent extra wear on your knees and ankles.

Try this: If you're overweight, set a goal for weight loss that's within your reach so you can make progress right away. You might aim to lose five to 10 percent of your current weight, for example.

Improve Flexibility

“A mobile, conditioned knee is less likely to devel-

op overuse problems. Whether you work out a lot or joint issues keep you mostly stationary, improving your flexibility can alleviate pain and stiffness,” Hopson said.

Try this: Work on improving flexibility by stretching the muscles in your legs (quadriceps, hamstrings and calves). Or, try a gentle yoga or tai chi class. Your doctor or physical therapist can recommend exercises that are right for you.

When knee pain and stiffness interfere with your daily activities, it's time to speak to an orthopedic specialist about knee replacement surgery. At Houston Methodist Orthopedics & Sports Medicine at San Jacinto, we offer a full spectrum of services, including:

gery procedures, including 120 performed by O'Hara in 2017, have been performed in the Heart & Vascular Center's state-of-the-art operating room. In 2016, the program for the first time earned a three-star rating from the Society of Thoracic Surgeons (STS) for its patient care and outcomes in the CABG (coronary artery bypass graft) surgery Composite Score Index. The three star rating is the highest national category of quality and is achieved by only 15 percent of cardiac surgery programs in the U.S.

“The hard work we have been putting in is paying off,” O'Hara said.

O'Hara says the program has in the past two years further strengthened its commitment to providing world class cardiovascular care by adding talented physicians, including heart failure cardiologist Dr. Nadia Fida and interventional cardiologist Dr. Rhagunandan Muppidi, as well as new intensivists and nurse practitioners, who together provide critical care 24/7 in the cardiovascular thoracic ICU.

Patients have also benefited from the offering of a new procedure intended to treat atrial fibrillation, or AFib, called convergence. It is a two-part treatment that relies on the skills of a CV surgeon and an electrophysiologist (EP). The surgical ablation is performed in the operating room, followed six weeks later by a catheter ablation procedure in the hospital's cardiac cath lab. O'Hara says the new procedure provides relief for patients whose AFib (also known as irregular heartbeat) is difficult to treat through standard procedures.

“This procedure is reserved for patients with treatment-resistant forms of AFib, which can develop in patients who have had the condition over a long period of time,” O'Hara said.

While new physicians, advanced procedures and unsurpassed facilities certainly enhance the CV program's standing in Baytown and the surrounding communities, O'Hara also believes the personalized care patients receive goes a long way in explaining why so many

patients trust their cardiovascular care to the physicians at Houston Methodist San Jacinto Hospital.

“We have a great team here and a big reason why the care is so good in Baytown is because everyone on the care team knows each other very well; from the cardiologist to the ICU nurses to the anesthesiologists,” O'Hara said. “The patients and their families know everyone who comes into their room and this personalized care can make a huge difference in the patient's recovery.”

Baytown resident Buddy Bruner, a guest speaker at the hospital's February 14 Heart Month Celebration, says the comfort of being cared for in Baytown made a world of difference for him.

“The nurses and doctors were always checking on me and making sure I was recovering the way I was supposed to after my surgery,” Bruner said. “I wouldn't want to go anywhere else.”

What to ask your doctor about parkinson's disease

(StatePoint) Talking to your doctor about any health concern can be tough, particularly when symptoms catch you by surprise or cause concern. And when it comes to Parkinson's disease (PD), experts say there are many symptoms that often go unreported at doctor's appointments, making them difficult to diagnose and treat.

For example, many people are aware of visible symptoms associated with

PD, like resting tremors and loss of balance. However, more than half of people living with Parkinson's also experience a lesser known aspect of the disease -- hallucinations and delusions.

“Over time, these symptoms may increase in frequency or become bothersome, as a person with Parkinson's becomes less able to distinguish between what is real and what's not. Fortunately, these symptoms often can

be addressed,” says Neal Hermanowicz, MD, director of the Parkinson's Disease & Movement Disorders Program at the University of California, Irvine.

To help you prepare for your appointment with a PD specialist, Dr. Hermanowicz says to consider the following statements, and if they apply to you, to tell your doctor at your next appointment.

- I sometimes feel out of touch with reality.

- Others tell me that what I am hearing, seeing or sensing (e.g., people, animals or objects) are not actually there (hallucinations).

- I have beliefs or fears that a loved one (perhaps a spouse, caregiver or friend) is stealing from me or being unfaithful (delusions).

Dr. Hermanowicz also suggests that caregivers prepare for the next appointment by considering the following statements

and speaking to their loved one's PD specialist if any of them apply.

- I have observed my loved one interacting with things, seeing things or sensing things that are not there (hallucinations).

- My loved one has had false beliefs toward me or others, such as believing someone is stealing from them or being unfaithful (delusions).

- These experiences have affected our daily life.
