Houston lowered

With heavy storms predicted, and flooding throughout the San Jacinto River watershed, authorities this week ordered a permanent reduction in the level of water in Lake Houston.

Houston City Council Member Dave Martin announced that after a meeting held Monday with Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner, the daily pooling level of Lake Houston will be reduced from 42.5 feet to 40 feet, effective immediately. Last night, Houston Public Works Director, Carol Haddock, directed the Coastal Water Authority to start lowering the

level of Lake Houston in advance of Wednesday's predicted storms. Council Member Martin has confirmed that all gates at Lake Houston are open and the level of Lake Houston is anticipated to reach the desired 40 foot mark by Wednesday evening.

Once the lake is lowered to 40 feet it is the City of Houston's plan to adjust the spillway gates to maintain a level of 40 feet moving forward on a long-term basis. This will address the immediate concerns of the Lake Houston Community, including Kingwood, Hum-

Governor brings 500 jobs, \$500 million to Baytown area

MUMBAI, INDIA - Governor Greg Abbott today visited JSW Group Global Headquarters in Mumbai, India, and signed a Memorandum of Cooperation to develop and augment the steel industry in Texas. With this agreement JSW Steel (USA) Inc. has agreed to consider an investment of \$500 million in phases in developing its steel manufacturing infrastructure in Baytown.

This investment will be used to expand the company's Plate & Pipe Mill unit. A Texas Enterprise Fund (TEF) grant offer of \$3.4 million has been extended to JSW Steel (USA) Inc. It is expected that the investment will eventually create an additional 500 jobs

Should you stay in your home or move during retirement?



Bombing suspect ends own life as officers approach him

AUSTIN — The primary suspect in a string of terrorist-style bombings died in his pickup truck on March 21.

Mark Anthony Conditt, 23, of Pflugerville, detonated explosive devices in his truck on an Interstate 35 access road in Round Rock as two law enforcement officers approached the vehicle on foot. One officer was injured in the explosion. The other officer reportedly fired a rifle at the suspect.

Intensive search and surveillance operations began on March 2, when a bomb later traced to Conditt exploded and killed an Austin man who picked up what appeared to be a normal package delivered to his residence. Similar packages exploded in the Austin area on March 12, one killing a teen and injuring his mother, and another injuring a 75-year-old woman. On March 18, two men were injured by a tripwire-triggered improvised explosive device in

On March 19, two days before Conditt was tracked down, Gov. Greg Abbott announced the release of \$265,500 in emergency funding for the Austin Police Department and the Texas Ranger Bomb Response Team to purchase seven portable x-ray systems for use in bomb detection and responding to suspicious package investiga-

Abbott said his office has provided nearly \$1 million over the last two years to enhance the capabilities of the Austin police department's bomb squad. He said the grants provided for purchases of bomb disposal robots, robotic arms and bomb suits that allow technicians to approach potentially explosive devices and render them harmless.

On March 20, the day before Conditt's death, the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans to remain vigilant and to report any suspicious activity or suspicious packages to authorities. The DPS stressed that Texans should not approach any unknown or suspicious packages or items, to keep a safe distance and then to notify the authorities by calling 911.

The Texas Workforce Commission on March 23 announced that the Lone Star State's economy added 40,500 seasonally adjusted non-farm jobs in February, marking 20 consecutive months of employment growth.

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate remained unchanged at 4.0 percent in February and remains below the U.S. unemployment rate of 4.1 percent.

Industries noted for adding jobs in February included professional and business services, 13,200 positions; followed by trade, transportation and utilities, 11,800 jobs; and mining and logging, 6,500 positions.

TxDOT: Buckle up, teens

The Texas Department of Transportation on March 19 posted a message urging teen-agers to "always buckle up."

The message is part of TxDOT's annual "Teen Click It or Ticket" campaign, conducted in partnership with high school students, to urge young drivers and their passengers to wear their seat belts every time they're in a vehicle.

"In Texas, 42 percent of all teenagers killed in traffic crashes in 2016 weren't buckled up," said TxDOT Executive Direc-




Babin votes NO on **Omnibus** Spending Bill

Washington, DC – U.S. Rep. Brian Babin (R-TX-36) released the following statement today after voting NO on the FY18 Omnibus spending bill:

What did these two accomplishments have in common? They both were achieved by sidestepping the Senate "filibuster" and allowing the majority to rule. "The American people did not elect Donald J. Trump as President just to see his agenda thwarted by Chuck Schumer and at least eight of his Democrat colleagues, but that's what will continue happening until Senate Republicans have the courage to change their broken, arcane rules - which they can do right now with just 51 votes. While there were some good things in this bill that I supported, including excellent levels of funding for our military and NASA, on balance it included too many misguided policies and too much misdirected spending for me to vote for it."

Noah Webster's 1828 dictionary defines resurrection, in part, as "rising again." It continues to discuss resurrection from the dead, but these first three words are intriguing.

With Easter coming, we're obviously thinking about The Resurrection, that moment Jesus was restored to life after giving the devil "what for" in Hell. Too often, even those who call themselves Christians merely equate resurrection with that one Sunday of the year when we feel like we really to have to go to church if only to satisfy our mothers. Thin Blue Line Project: K9 Training for comfort dogs

Danny McWilliams, a Baytown Police Officer, told the Highlands Rotary Club about a special project he is involved with.

McWilliams has been interested in dogs since he was a boy growing up in Highlands. As a boy he had a Brittany Spaniel named Sport, and in later years worked as a veterinarian's technician. This experience led to his involvement with police dogs, after becoming

McWilliams has been a police officer for over 27 years, and is a certified K-9 Handler. Trained at the USK(Unlimited facility in Louisiana, he was in charge of the Baytown K-9 program for over 6 years. During that time, as a Handler he coordinated the Department's K-9 training program. He trained dogs and Handlers in narcotics, explosive detection, tracking, and suspect apprehension. During this time he had a dog named Fideaux, who is retired with him

McWilliams became concerned about the number of police officers killed in the line of

duty, which now number over 2800 throughout the nation. Working on his own, using his training and experience, he decided to start a program of providing "comfort' dogs for the families of those deceased offic-

ers. His first dog was a chocolate Labrador Retriever, named Preston.

His Thin Blue Line program, just starting, finds families with a need to get the dogs. Preston went to a family in Michigan, and after transporting the dog on a plane, McWilliams spent three days acclimating the family with the dog.

McWilliams has now formalized the program with a 501c3 designation, and is looking for financial support. Dogs cost from \$500 to \$2500, and cost upwards of \$15,000 to train. Families do not pay for a dog, it is donated. If you wish to help, vou can contact him at EastexK9.com, or 281-846-

ble, Atascocita, and Huffman. This lower lake level will continue to be observed while the City works with area partners to address siltation and other coordination efforts with Lake Conroe. The City of Houston will continue to monitor and evaluate water demand, weather patterns and other mitigation activities.

Tuesday Harris County Commissioner's Court will vote to authorize requests for qualifications (RFQ) for engineering and other services to identify watershed-wide flood risks, evaluate food mitigation strategies that address those risks and develop recommendations to enhance the flood warning system and action plans used by the emergency managers in the San Jacinto River Basin from its headwaters in Lake Houston across Harris County Precincts 1, 2, and 4. Harris County will be working with the San Jacinto River Authority as well as other municipalities to accomplish this task which was a part of Governor Greg Abbott's charges for the region.

Additionally, Harris County will also be requesting authorization for RFQs for engineering, environmental permitting, and other services in support of dredging the West Fork of the San Jacinto River from IH-59 to Lake Houston Parkway. This was another of Governor Abbott's charges during his visit to the Kingwood Area. All parties are committed to working together to swiftly move the dredging project forward in preparation for this year's hurricane season.

Council Member Martin has been working diligently over the last few weeks to make sure the efforts of dredging are not short lived. The visit of Texas Land Commissioner. George P. Bush, and continued communication with the Governor's office have allowed the city to partner with the Aggregate Production Operators (APO) and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. The continued interest and participation of statewide leaders helps local efforts by assisting in identifying red tape and providing solutions to

these obstacles. Next Tuesday, April 3, a visit from Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick is planned, who has expressed an interest in touring the San Jacinto Watershed by air and wa-


These state partnerships allow us the opportunity to closely evaluate existing regulations for sand mining as well as the ability to increase the strength of these existing policies. The regional APOs have stepped up to the table and want to be a part of the solution. Texas Senator Brandon Creighton and Texas State Representative Dan Huberty continue to be champions for stricter sand mining regulations to protect our watershed.

The problem of flooding within the San Jacinto Watershed is a difficult one to tackle due to the size of the watershed and many jurisdictions involved but Council Member Martin is creating relationships where none have existed before and knows that working together will get us further along the path to a long term solution.




