Crosby ISD plans to right dire finances

Trustee meeting included a packed room, four citizen's comments, extensive discussion of dire finances and a Superintendent's report of what the state of the finances are, what needs to be done and how the district will get to the point of solvency to avoid being taken over by the

State.

Dr. Scott Davis, Superintendent of Crosby ISD, and recently-hired Chief Financial Officer, Lesa Jones, presented an overview of the District's current financial state.

Davis has been in regular communication with the Texas Education Agency regarding Crosby ISD's financial state and will continue to provide regular updates to the Commissioner of Education, Mike

He indicated that no one wants to see Crosby ISD

taken over by the State. "Be careful what you wish for.'

In 2015 and 2016 the Board of Trustees discussed how to get the highest academic standards possible." At the last meeting everyone learned from the Accountability Report that Crosby ISD was rated a 'B' according to the Domain Scores by the State – neighboring school districts were rated "Met Standard" or "Substandard." One easy way to get student's scores up is to hire more teachers. Generally it is held that the lower the teacher to student ratio, the faster students learn. Although, there are certainly studies that indicate otherwise or that it makes no difference.

Monday attendees and trustees learned why we have seen the last hiring of over 200 new teachers in a district with nearly 6000

students. While personnel normally accounts for about 80% of a district's budget, it has been found that about 89% of Crosby ISD budget goes to person-

to punish those that may have done something criminal to create these economic conditions. A forensic audit calls for a 1/2 million dollars that the district doesn't have. Davis seemed to advise instead for a financial analysis and a internal control analysis, preventing the same ole mistakes but says he will do as requested by the board.

In addition to providing an overview of the District's financial state, Davis also provided an initial plan of cost-saving measures he believes will mitigate any further financial repercussions and ultimately lead to financial restoration for Crosby ISD. Some of these cost-saving measures have already been implemented while others are imminent.

The budget passed in June is about \$5 Million over incoming revenue. In the Spring of 2019, the district will need an external lending solution to subsi-

dize the continued cash flow shortage and create a reduced dependency on borrowing for cash flow shortages.

The District is currently pursuing a formal declaration of financial exigency based on the condition that the District's General Fund Balance was reduced by more than 20% in the past two years.

Dr. Davis emphasized that a problem of this magnitude will require "great resolve" from the district and community. "Complete restoration of Crosby ISD's financial integrity is absolutely possible with sound financial planning and steadfast adherence to the recovery plan," said Davis. "It will be a matter of time, perseverance, and mutual support between district and community to see Crosby ISD thrive financially."

The total amount of discrepancy discovered by Davis was about \$9.6 Million

Sewer overflow in Baytown due to heavy rain

As a result of recent heavy rainfall occurring Friday, September 14; the City of Baytown has reported runoff filling manholes producing an overflow in the City's san-

itary sewer system.
Cedar Bayou had 15
Manholes overflow for a
total of 172,305 gallons.
Black Duck Bay had 11
Manholes overflow for a
total of 203.030 gallons.

total of 203,030 gallons.
All appropriate local government officials and the TCEQ regional office have been notified and the appropriate documentation/records supplied. Clean-up activities of the overflow area are underway and will be continued until the affected area is clean and completely disinfected.

Per the Harris County Flood Control District, the area around these overflows in Baytown received 3.52 inches of rain over the corresponding 24 hour period.

Overflows listed above do not affect the City's fresh water supply.

Persons who purchase water from a public water supply may contact their water supply distributer (City of Baytown) to determine if the water is safe for personal use. As a precaution, the public should avoid all contact with waste material, soil, or water in the area potentially affected by the spill. If the public comes into contact with waste material, soil or water potentially affected by the spill, they should bathe and wash clothes thoroughly as soon as possible.

Harris County residents urged to monitor weather

Harris County residents are urged to monitor the weather forecast and use extreme caution if venturing out into rainy conditions according to the current forecast. Portions of Harris County could receive up to four inches of additional rain espe-cially south of I-10 as a weather system moves into the Gulf of Mexico and has the potential to impact the Texas coast with showers and thunderstorms.

As of now, bayous, creeks and tributaries are expected to remain within banks, but roadways and streets may become impassable. Commuters are urged to avoid high

water and flooded streets throughout the county and to proceed with caution when driving or area roadways - Turn Around Don't Drown!

The Harris County Flood Control District's Flood Watch team will continue to monitor rainfall trends and check the gages that measure rainfall amounts and water levels in bayous and creeks to advise the public and local officials of areas that are and could be affected by flooding. Residents may monitor rainfall and bayou water levels on the Harris County Regional Flood Warning System website (desktop and mobile versions) at www.harriscountyfws.org.



Weather system prompts Texas to prepare as hurricane season continues

AUSTIN — Before Hurricane Florence reached the shores of the Carolinas last week, Gov. Greg Abbott focused on the Gulf of Mexico, where an inbound tropical disturbance threatened the southern disturbance region of Texas.

Proactively, Abbott on Sept. 14 issued a disaster declaration for 78 counties stretching from the Texas Gulf Coast to deep into the interior of the Lone Star

Rainy Day fund is eved In preparation for the upcoming legislative session scheduled to begin in January, the Senate Finance Committee in a Sept. 11 hearing considered state spending and costs related to the 2017 Hurricane Harvey disas-

Figures provided to the powerful, budgeting-writing committee by the Leg-islative Budget Board show the state already has spent \$2.6 billion on Harvey-related disaster recovery. But that amount, largely federal funds, does not include dollars for public education, according to the Senate News Service.

Public education in Tex-as is funded primarily with local property taxes, so when property values in a district decrease, so does the money available for public schools there. Lost property value could mean up to \$1.4 billion less for school districts in the areas affected by Hurricane Harvey, which caused an estimated \$125 billion in damages.

Some members of the committee suggested tapning the state's nearly \$11 billion Economic Stabilization Fund, also known as

the Rainy Day fund, to help overcome local property tax revenue shortfalls.

Portal assists victims

The Texas Attorney General's Office on Sept. 10 launched a new portal within the agency's official website that enables victims and claimants to apply online for Crime Victims' Compensation and Emergency Medical Care Compensation for sexual assault exams.

The portal is intended to make it easier for crime victims, claimants and their advocates to submit applications, upload crime-related bills and follow the steps of the claim and bill review process with near

real-time updates.
Created by the Legislature in 1979, the Crime Victims' Compensation program is administered by the attorney general's office and reimburses vic-tims and claimants for certain crime-related expenses not paid by other sources, such as funeral and burial, mental health care, loss of wages, loss of support, child care and

medical care.

The program receives criminal court costs, fees and fines from convicted offenders to reimburse victims and their families for crime-related expenses of

up to \$50,000. More information can be found at texasattorneygeneral.gov.

Revenue is distributed

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Sept. 12 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts some \$739 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of September, an amount 10.5 percent greater than the amount returned in September 2017.

Allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

Registration ends Oct. 9

Texas Secretary of State Rolando Pablos on Sept. 7 posted a reminder that Oct. 9 is the voter registration deadline and to make all necessary preparations to be able to cast a ballot in the upcoming November 6 General Election.
Texans may check to see

if they are already regis-tered to vote by visiting www.votetexas.gov.
Pablos encouraged all

eligible Texas voters to ensure that they:

- Are registered to vote in their county of residence; and - Are aware of what they

need to bring to the polls in order to cast a ballot.

"Don't wait until the last minute," Pablos said, and encouraged Texans to avoid waiting at the polls on Election Day by voting during the early voting pe-riod that will begin on on Friday, Nov. 2.

Emmett says Partnerships Forged in Disasters Result In Greater Public Trust. More Efficient Responses To Challenges

HARRIS COUNTY -Harris County Judge Ed Emmett presented his 11th annual State of the County Address last Thursday, at a luncheon at NRG Center, on the 10th anniversary of Hurricane Ike's devastat-ing arrival, noting that county residents have emerged from recent natural disasters better prepared, better educated and more determined to take the steps needed to combat such challenges in the future.

Emmett focused on partnerships and sounded an optimistic tone, addressing a sold-out event of more than 1,000 attendees at the annual speech at the county-owned NRG Center. The event is sponsored by the Greater Houston Partnership.

He noted that a recent series of nearly two dozen "community engagement meetings" focusing on the county's recent \$2.5 billion flood bond issue resulted not only in an overwhelming margin of victory, but further strengthened the ties between Harris County residents and their employees and officials.

"It was an amazing sight to behold." Emmett said. "At every meeting, county residents of all types met face-to-face with county employees many of whom spend most of their time behind desks. Suddenly, a human element came into focus instead of abstract numbers and plans. County employees were energized, and the public believed and trusted them. On Aug. 25th, the one-year anniversary of Harvey, Harris County voters approved the flood mitigation bond with 86% voting yes. On that day, Harris County became truly Harris County Strong.

"So on the 10th anniversary of Hurricane Ike, a storm we thought was one for the ages, Harris County has now endured a worse storm, but we have emerged with unshakeable partnerships and a belief in each other that we can, and must, carry forward into all of our endeavors,' Emmett said. "Harris County is not just strong. Harris County is together and ready to face the future.

Emmett was intro-duced at this afternoon's event by state Rep. Garnet Coleman, chairman of the House County Affairs Committee.

Although the interviews were individual and confidential, the public was invited to sit in on the final Round Table. At this session, about 20 people attended. Included were the interview team, concerned residents, environmental activists, journalists, and attorneys for aggrieved parties and environmental

Coats started the Round Table by noting that all information about the Waste Pits is available at the Stratford Library in Highlands, as well as on the EPA website. Citizens may also call an informa-tion number, 800-533-3508 to discuss the site or ask questions.

Coats had prepared a list of questions as prompts for the assembled group and those who had been interviewed.

Simple questions included: "Are you aware of the site?" and "Are you aware of any controversial concerns about the site?"

She also asked if anyone was aware of the activity taking place on the site.

She wanted to know how residents perceived the EPA and its work. In response to this, it was suggested that more notices and information should be furnished to the community. It was suggested the Home Owners Associations, and Civic Clubs could be a vehicle for distributing information.

Coats asked what health concerns individuals had. She was told that some people had developed endometriosis, a disease of the reproductive system.

Coats was asked by the group why fishing was still allowed in these polluted waters. They said posting signs was good but ignored many. It was suggested that a large billboard might be effective.

Coats asked what information should be given to the public, and the answer was more about the dangers of Dioxin.

She asked what media were followed by residents social media, newspapers, school notices, and service clubs were answered.




