FM 2100 begins to let in March

CROSBY – The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is planning to begin the reconstruction of FM 2100 from S. Diamondhead to 0.23 miles south of Antelope Drive in March of 2019.

A series of temporary road closures of several intersections are planned and TxDOT says they will notify relevant parties of the closures. These closures are of course said to be related to public safety while construction continues.

TxDOT said the motivation to reconstruct Main Street in Crosby is to improve traffic safety and facilitate mobility with additional lanes, sidewalks and a raised median over the 8 miles to reach Huffman. In total some 107 acres is involved in the reconstruction. The reconstruction to Huffman's FM 1960 is to take 3.5 years and cost \$79.3 Million to build. A series of public hearings in

2015 found primary concern of commenters was to add a raised median to the FM 2100 roadway, which reduces the number of entrance/exit access points to properties along FM 2100. Business owners along the corridor were worried that the median might make patronage by their customers challenging. The project has not changed in any way inspite

of the 97 dissenters.

The Southern section of the road-way fron Hare-Cook Road to South Diamondhead is to be 23 feet across.

The section north of Hare-Cook is to be 53 feet across with 4 twelve foot lanes, a dividing median and two five foot sidewalks.







Dear Rusty: I will be 67 years old this September and have been receiving my Social Security benefits since September of last year (2017). I've found that I do not need the money now, and since I don't need the money, I'm wondering if can I repay what I've already collected and just wait until I'm 70 to get a larger benefit? Signed: Changed My Mind

Dear Changed: Situations such as yours are exactly why Social Security has a "do over" option, which allows those who claim benefits to withdraw that application within one year. Reality is that sometimes financial circumstances change. People who lost their job may react by claiming Social Security, and then later find other employment, which provides them the income they need. Or they may simply just change their mind and be sorry they applied for benefits. In any case, the do-over option can be used to fix that but exercising that option does have some important consequences.

The short answer to your questions is "Yes" you can exercise the "do over" option and totally withdraw from Social Security if you do so within 1 year of the date your benefits originally started. But - and this is a big but you will have to pay back everything that you have collected, including any withheld taxes, Medicare premiums, and any spousal or other dependent ben-

count over the past year. 521 (Request for Withry of your original applica-

have already reached your full retirement age of 66, you have another less fi-nancially painful option available to you which you might want to consider – you can simply suspend your current benefits, which will allow you to earn delayed retirement credits equal to 2/3rds of 1% per month of suspension (8% per year) up until you reach 70 years of age. You will have lost that initial 8% benefit growth you would have otherwise realized for the 1st year after you reached age 66, but that may be less traumatic than repaying Social Security a very large lump sum for an entire year's worth of benefits paid. Then when you reinstate (un-suspend) your benefits at age 70, the benefit amount will be about 24% higher than it is now. Thus, you'll gain a significantly increased benefit without needing to repay all that money you collected for a whole year.

Abbott, Valdez present views on Texas in one hour forum

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott and Lupe Valdez on Sept. 28 appeared together on television for 60 minutes in the only scheduled gubernatorial debate, a forum hosted by the Lyndon Baines
Johnson Presidential
Library and Museum on the University of Texas campus.

A Republican and former Texas attorney general, Abbott is seeking a second four-year term as the state's chief executive. His challenger, Guadalupe "Lupe" Valdez, a San Antonioborn Democrat, held elected office as Dallas County sheriff from 2005 to 2017 and previously served as a senior agent and investigator for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, earlier as an agent for other federal agencies and as a captain in the U.S. Army Reserve.

Abbott and Valdez voiced their positions on topics including education, property taxes, health care, immigration. border security, gun control, school campus security and disaster management related to Hurricane Harvey. Abbott touted his record on each topic and asked voters to stay the course and support him. Valdez said she would use the state's \$12 billion "rainy day fund" to speed up assistance to hurricane-stricken Texans. Valdez also said she would fund public education and health care programs at a much higher level, rather than devote state dollars to militarizing the Texas-Mexico border. Also, she said that as governor she would sign a "red flag law" to help keep fire-arms out of the hands of ill-intentioned individu-

Both candidates said they would support legislation that increases access to medical marijuana and decreases the criminal penalty for possession of small amounts of marijuana for non-medical use.

Robert Hadlock of KXAN, the Austin NBC-TV affiliate, moderated the forum in which the

candidates answered questions from a panel of four journalists from Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio broadcast stations.

Registration hits new high

As of last week, Texas had 15,624,871 registered voters, a new record, the state's chief elections officer announced.

On Sept. 25 — National Voter Registration Day
— Texas Secretary of
State Rolando Pablos pushed for even more participation, inviting all eligible residents to ensure they are regis-tered to vote ahead of the Oct. 9 voter registration deadline.

It was Pablos' final call to action to voters, community leaders and elected officials to encourage fellow Texans to register and prepare to vote in the upcoming Nov. 6 election. He suggested that Texans check their registration status on the Texas Secretary of State's "Am I Registered?" web page, and that those who have moved to a new address within the same county or have changed their name can update their information online

Early voting will begin on Oct. 22 and end on Nov. 2. Voters with questions about how to cast a ballot in upcoming elections can call 1-800-252-VOTE.

The funds, Abbott said, are for the build-out of communication facilities supporting the new U.S. Army Futures Command in Austin.

The \$2 million comes through the Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance grant program administered by the Texas Military Preparedness Commission, a part of the governor's office that advises Abbott and the Texas Legislature on defense and military

Abbott noted that he announced more than \$50 million in grant awards to military installations across Texas over the last two state budget cycles

Don't Let Hand Arthritis Slow You Down

BAYTOWN — (September 28, 2018) — Approximately 50 million Americans suffer from some form of arthritis. with many of them forced to cope with often debilitating pain in the hands.

Arthritis of the hands can make performing simple, every day activities difficult and extremely painful. Dr. Jennifer Wagner, an orthopedic surgeon specializing in surgeries of the hands and upper extremities with Houston Methodist Orthopedics & Sports Medicine at Houston Methodist San Jacin-Hospital, says osteoarthritis is frequently the type of arthritis that

strikes the hands.
"With osteoarthritis, the cartilage in the joints begins to wear thin, which results in the bones touching each other and that may cause significant pain," Wagner said. "Generally, it begins with pain that gets worse with activity and gets better when you rest."

Wagner adds that many people also feel stiffness in the joints, especially in the morning hours, but the pain may subside as the day proceeds. Weather changes, especially a rise in barometric pressure, may also trigger pain, which adds validity to the claim by many who say they "feel it in their bones."

Wagner said an x-ray of the hand may detect a loss of cartilage or bone spurs, leading to an arthritis diagnosis. During a physical exam, the presence of bone spurs may be detected as well. Applying pressure and manipulating the hand may reveal pain that indicates bone-on-bone degeneration.

Arthritis in the hands is commonly diagnosed in the distal phalanx (first knuckle) of the fingers and in the basal joint, located at the base of the thumb near the wrist. Wagner said those areas are prone to arthritis because they may become weakened over time by years of performing pinching and grasping movements on a daily basis.

"These joints are predis-posed to arthritis because they are used so frequent-ly and become prone to injuries and strains," Wagner explains.

Wagner said arthritis develops slowly over time and usually afflicts people age 40 and over. Taking over-the-counter supple-ments, including glucosamine and chondroitin, which have been shown to slow the progression of arthritis and help keep joints mobile, is one the few preventive measures avail-

Wagner said the first line of treatment may include the prescribing of oral or topical anti-inflam-matory medications or the use of braces and splints to immobilize the joint. Steroid injections into the joint may be ordered if there is no significant symptom re-lief. More severe cases may require surgical procedures to remove the arthritic bone or fuse the joints together, although joint fusion drastically reduces

"Scheduling an appointment with your doctor is the first step in managing the disease if you think you have arthritis," Wagner said. "Individualized programs are available that may include less invasive methods to relieve pain and increase range of motion.

Meanwhile, the Houston Methodist Orthopedic Injury Clinic at Baytown has expanded its hours to make it more accessible to Baytown area residents seeking treating for conditions such as acute orthopedic injuries, fractures and broken bones, sprains and strains and sports injuries.
