Engineers hear public on Crosby drain project

CROSBY - On January 15 the Harris County Flood Control District held a meeting to inform the public about partnering with the Harris County Engineering Department to address flooding issues in residential neighborhoods in unincorporated regions of Harris County with focus on stormwater drainage on stormwater drainage improvements and to re-ceive input from the public. Voters approved \$2.5 bil-lion in bonds to finance

flood damage reduction projects within the county. The county is moving forward with planning and construction of projects with bond funding, making effort to make transparent

those projects to residents.
This meeting was enti-tled Crosby MUD/Township Drainage Project and is listed on the Harris County Flood Control District website as HCFCD Bond Project E-12. Information can be obtained and comments made at www.hcfcd.org/E12 the dis-

trict's website. Stormwater drainage in Crosby was discussed with what engineers believe are the best remedies and they heard residents express what they believe are

I am happy to announce that the dredge material from the area of concern near the San Jacinto River Superfund Site will not be coming to Beach City! Holtmar Land, LLC informed us that they now plan to develop their 3 acre site in Beach City for Residential use. This was told to us by Tom Marian in a meeting with him yester-day at Judge Silvia's office. He latter followed up with an email at Commissioner Billy Combs request. I will share that with you now.

"Billy, My pleasure and good to know the room was not filled with Alabama fans! In any event, consistent with this afternoon's

LLC has directed its new engineering vendor to contact the Galveston District ACOE project officer (i.e., Mr. Brian Bader) and inform him that Holtmar intends to amend its permit application to substantially reduce the dredging

footprint.
This will, in turn, dramatically decrease the amount of dredged spoil material. As such, the much lower volume of material can now be placed at a location that is much closer to the project rather than the previously-pro-posed site located in Beach City. Seminar promotes weight loss surgical options

BAYTOWN — (January 11. 2019) - Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital bariatric surgeons Dr. Laura Choi and Kendell Sowards, MD hosted a free weight loss seminar last Tuesday, January 15 and provided information on the full range of weight loss surgical options to those seeking to lose weight and improve their health.

Research indicates morbid obesity—defined as a Body Mass Index (BMI) of 40 or above—is linked to the development of a variety of potentially serious medical conditions, including type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke and

heart disease. The Houston Methodist Weight Management Center-Baytown offers personalized care for patients affected by conditions attributed to obesity through medical nutritional counseling and bariatric (weight loss) sur-

Choi says weight loss surgery helps patients reduce their calorie intake, but the procedures are combined with counseling and dietary education to help patients learn about their own eating habits and stay fit after they lose weight.

Bariatric surgery procedures restrict the amount of food that can be con-



sumed and/or alters the route food takes through the body so less food is absorbed. Patients whose BMI is in the morbid obesity range are eligible for bariatric surgery, while those whose BMI is in the 35-40 range are also eligible if they have existing medical conditions considered to be caused by or associated with morbid

obesity.
The most commonly performed weight loss procedure is the sleeve gastrectomy, which reshapes the stomach into a thin, sleeve-shaped organ that helps to limit the amount of food that can be consumed at

given time. With the Lap-Band procedure, an adjustable band is placed around the upper stomach to create a smaller stomach. Both procedures are performed laparoscopically, which requires small in-

cisions. Sowards says the Weight Management Center offers comprehensive nutritional and counseling

after-care programs to help patients adjust to the physical and emotional changes that frequently occur post-surgery. It is vital that patients be willing to make major lifestyle and dietary changes in order to achieve optimal results following any bariatric surgery procedure.

Although weight loss surgery isn't right for everyone, becoming educated about it and discussing the available options with your doctor will help you determine whether it's right for

House elects new speaker as legislative session kicks off

 ${\rm AUSTIN} - {\rm The}~86 {\rm th}$ Texas Legislature convened on Jan. 8 with all its customary ceremo nies and recognitionschief of which was the unanimous election of a new House speaker Angleton Republican Dennis Bonnen.

On Jan. 9, Gov Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick who presides over the Senate, and Speaker Bonnen announced their joint commitment to passing legislation that would improve how public education is funded. That arduous and heretofore divisive task means rethinking and recalibrating what share of funded by local property taxes public education's primary source of funding.

Patrick predicted this legislative session would be different from previous ones. "If the three of us are aligned, that we're going to accomplish a mission and pass legislation, it happens," said Patrick. "This is not just a message to the public and to the media, but I think our members will take note, that this is really unprecedented, that we're addressing these issues at the beginning of session. totally united with one another." Patrick added that he would name a new Senate committee on property taxes to work on

House and Senate committee hearings will begin as soon as Patrick and Bonnen have selected chairs and members for each panel. Lawmakers must keep in mind that the comptroller's office has estimated the cost of public education, the biggest of all drivers of the state budget, at about \$63 billion in fiscal 2018-2019.

Commission on Public

School Finance. Among other things, the commission suggested moving \$3.5 billion in existing state resources away from "outdated programs or obsolete hold-harmless provisions" into new strategies.

The commission's report also calls for a halt to the continuing decrease in state resources allocated to public education, and directing more money toward students who need it most, such as low-income special needs and English language learners

Revenue estimate is

Glenn Hegar on Jan. 7 released his biennial revenue estimate, this one covering the state's 2020-2021 budget years

Hegar said a strong national economy and rising oil prices over most of 2018 left the state with 8 percent more revenue than two years ago, or \$119.1 billion in total general revenue

However, he said, Despite this projected revenue growth. the Legislature will again face some difficult choices in balancing the budget. The most pressing and costly budget drivers for the upcoming session include a potentially large boost in education spending to reduce the property tax burden and reform school

"Texas remains economically well positioned compared to other states and we will continue to outpace the U.S. economy in the long

term," Hegar added. However, he also noted that the price of oil has been down since October, federal interest rates are up and both the global economy and U.S. trade policy remain uncertain.

Meanwhile, the state's Economic Stabilization Fund, commonly referred to as the "Rainy Day Fund," currently contains about \$12.5 billion, not counting currently outstanding spending authority. Absent any legislative appropriations, the balance of the fund is expected to be \$15.4 billion at the end of the 2020-21 biennium, Hegar said.

The Silly Arguments Against a Border Wall

They'll go around it? Exactly—that's the point.

This week saw the culmination of the great wall debate. President Trump made his case ally agree with—and explained what an extra \$5.7 billion (approximately 0.1% of the budget) would do for the security of our southern border. Democratic leaders Chuck Schumer and Nancy Pelosi immediately dismissed it. It is honestly surprising how quickly and thoroughly Democrats adopted the notion that a wall of any kind is such an obviously stupid and immoral idea. Well, is it? Let's lay out the claims one by one

• They'll just climb over it, dig under it or break through it. Just like that huh? I spent 10 years as a Navy SEAL, and people often say, "Dan, you know better than anyone how ineffective a wall is." Actually, I know how effective walls are, even against skilled SEALs. Planning to scale a 30-foot steel slatted barrier is a daunting challenge. Do you bring an enormous ladder all the way there? How do you get down from the top? Jump? Rappel? This isn't a Tough Mudder course. A few skilled and well-equipped people may figure it out, but the reality is that most will be deterred.

The same goes for "digging" or "breaking." Tunneling would require special equipment and hundreds of hours to dig under the barrier, the base of which would penetrate many feet underground. To break through it, you'd need specialized circular saws, torches or explosives. Typical equipment for a special-ops team. but not exactly on the packing list for a migrant. And Border Patrol agents would easily detect such a

This isn't to argue that a wall is completely impenetrable given the right equipment, but to state the obvious: A barrier is far preferable to an open space, where migrants can simply walk across

• They'll just go around it. Exactly—that's the point. A deterrent at the busiest sections of the border would allow more effective allocation of manpower. If a mile of the border is walled off, that's one less mile the Border Patrol needs to worry about. Agents can still respond to the location if a special-ops caravan shows up with a blowtorch, but otherwise they can focus on open areas where it is simply not viable to build a

• You can't put a wall on the Rio Grande. Fair enough—there are places where a physical barrier can't work, such as private land along the river in Texas. You can't build a wall everywhere—but that doesn't mean you shouldn't build one anywhere.

This whole debate is a classic case of one side attacking the other's worst arguments instead of seriously addressing the actual proposal. Democrats need to stop assuming we are talking about a contiguous 2,000-mile wall. Republicans know that's not practical. The budget's small allocation of \$5.7 billion that President Trump has requested would build 234 miles of wall. It's a start.

We know that border security is a multifaceted problem, that security at unwalled segments can be enhanced by drones, sensors and additional patrols, and that the Rio Grande requires a different approach. Let's start looking for a multifaceted solution instead of automatically dismissing the critical role that physical barriers play.

Do Democrats agree that it's a problem when hundreds of thousands of people illegally cross our border each year or not? If we all still agree on the sanctity of our country's borders and rule of law—and I have faith that most of us do—then we should be looking for solutions. My fear is that Democrats have staked out a position so extreme that any commonsense compromise involving a physical barrier will constitute a serious political loss for them. It doesn't have to. The president's proposal—a mix of physical barriers, technology and more Border Patrol agents is one that benefits everyone




