## TxDOT urges young drivers to plan for sober ride ahead of Spring Break

TxDOT reminds Spring Breakers about deadly. long-term consequences of drinking and driving

HOUSTON - Spring Break is a dangerous time on Texas roads, with hundreds of impaired driving crashes involving young drivers occurring each year. As college students and young adults head to Spring Break destinations in the coming weeks, the Texas Department of Transportation's "Plan While You Can" campaign reminds them to make a plan for a sober ride before

"Drinking alcohol and driving can severely impact a young person's future. Many promising lives are cut short due to the poor decision to drink al-cohol and drive," said Tx-DOT Executive Director James Bass. "We urge young drivers to make rethe Spring Break holiday.

Before heading out, please plan ahead for a sober ride to ensure you get to and from your destination safely."

During last year's Spring Break\* in Texas, there were 444 crashes involving young drivers who were driving under the in-fluence of alcohol. Those crashes killed 11 people and seriously injured another 37. The "Plan While You

Can" campaign includes a statewide tour featuring the new "Plan to Win" virtual reality game where participants are a part of an immersive trivia game which poses questions related to drinking alcohol and driving, and also demonstrates the consequences of drunk driving. Players avoid "jail" by answering questions correctly, and winners progress to a waiting taxi to receive a safe and sober ride. The experience will visit 10 Texas cities during March.

While drivers under the influence of alcohol risk killing or seriously injuring themselves or others, they also face up to \$17,000 in fines and fees, jail time and loss of their driver's license. Visit SoberRides.org to find alternatives to drinking alcohol and driving, such

## Someone's Child

There is much concern about the increasing number of homeless people who are in the North Channel Area. Almost daily there are posts from concerned community members that are upset over the number of people and the amount of items that are piled under the underpasses along Interstate 10 heading east as well as those under the intersections along the Sam Houston Parkway. There are countless individuals who you can find in the wooded area along the Beltway as well as around vacant buildings and quite often behind restaurants in

the alleyways. On social media, you see some people almost developing a vigilante attitude, calling for the underpasses to be washed daily with a high pressure water pump. These people talk about their property value decreasing and the amount of trash as well as human excrement increasing. Often these homeless individuals scare off potential customers as well as potential new residents to the community.

There are numerous community members who will hand cash to those who approach them while others will look into the distance. Sometimes there are

individuals or groups who prepare a small plastic bag with basic essentials such as a toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss, deodorant, shavers, shampoo and other hygiene items. Other groups will sometimes distribute blankets, towels and jackets to the homeless

No matter which side of the discussion that you find yourself, take a moment and remember that the people on the streets and in the woods are someone's child. We do not know what happened in their lifetime to lead them on the path that they are on now. Often the members of the homeless community have a mental disorder and without medication and treatment, their lives are in a constant. turmoil. There is a misconception that many of the homeless are military veterans. In reality, thanks to many programs available, veterans are typically moved to the top of lists when trying to get assistance. Many of the homeless are ex-offenders and depending on the crime, there are few

options for housing. Even worse is the number of homeless youth. Please remember than not every person on the streets wants to be there or made decisions to be there.

On more than one occasion, I have sat down and talked to those living on the streets. Most often. they just want to know someone cares and they want to find resources for assistance. One of the best things that you can do is visit www.homelesshouston.org and print out the "HELP CARD" and give it with a smile to the next homeless person you see. If you are bold enough, hug them Research shows three hugs a day improves your life. And if you are brave enough to speak with a homeless person, you might ask them if they would like to use your cell phone and contact a family member just to let them know they are still alive. If you are not quite that brave, you can at least pray for them. Always remember, we do not know the route that led them to the current situation, but they are still someone's child.



## SENATE APPROVES *ACROSS-THE-BOARD* TEACHER PAY RAISE

(Austin) The Senate passed its first bill of the session Monday, one that would give every public school teacher in the state a \$5000 pay raise beginning in the fall semester of 2019. Named as an emergency issue by the governor, the bill would give teachers their first meaningful pay raise in 20 years, said author and Flower Mound Senator Jane Nelson. "The one thing we should do, first and foremost, is to recognize the need to uplift our entire teaching profession," she said. According to testimony offered by Texas educa tion commissioner Mike Morath last week, most teachers in the state make between \$50,000 and \$60,000 per year, including bonuses and other incentives. All 30 members joined Nelson as co-authors of the bill. The bill would

cost the state right at \$4 billion next biennium: \$3.7 billion to pay for the raises for the state's 350,000 teachers and \$240 million in additional pension costs. An amendment added to the bill by Nelson would give the same raise to school librarians, at a cost of \$53 million. Nelson told members that this raise, if signed into law, wouldn't preclude additional, effectivenessbased pay schedules expected in forthcoming school finance legislation. The bill now heads to the House for consideration.

In committee action Monday, the Senate State Affairs Committee approved a measure aimed at ensuring the proper reporting and investigation of all sexual assault allegations on college campuses. Bill author and committee chair Senator Joan Huffman of Houston said that studies show that one in five female college students have experienced some form of sexual assault. SB 212 would require that any university employee that either witnesses or receives information of sexual harassment, assault, dating violence or stalking reports the incident to the institution's Title XI coordinator for investigation. It also requires the coordinator to make a monthly report on the number and status of sexual assault investi-

requires the president to make the same report to the institution's governing board once a semes ter. That report would be made publicly available, though the identities of individuals within would be concealed.

The bill also has strong penalties for non-compliance. Employees failing to report incidents of sexual assault would be terminated, and if the person intentionally tried to cover the incident up, they would face a Class A misdemeanor charge The university itself could also face disciplinary action as failure to comply with the bill's  $\,$ requirements could incur as much as a \$2 million penalty. "I am confident that this bill strengthens the reporting requirements to ensure that the days when an outcry went unheard or covered up at an institution of a higher education are over," said Huffman. A similar version of this measure cleared the Senate 30-1 last session, but failed to reach the governor's desk The committee

also passed a bill that

would facilitate coopera

tion between state agencies on anti-human trafficking efforts.
According to the Office of Attorney General, at any given time there are 234,000 victims of human trafficking in Texas, with nearly 80,000 of those victims being children or minors. SB 72, also by Nelson, would create a centralized body to formulate a statewide plan to combat human trafficking and facilitate cooperation between state agencies that work to fight the practice. "If we don't do everything we can to address this, we are allowing slavery to take place in this state, said Nelson. "My commitment is there both in financial resources and anything else we need to do to put a stop to this.' As chair of the Senate Finance Committee, Nelson said she funded every agency request for human trafficking programs at a total cost of almost \$89 million. She said she intends the State Human Trafficking Prevention Coordinating Council created by this bill to help maximize the impact of these funds and ensure that agencies aren't duplicating efforts.



## Order stops state, local authorities from purging voter rolls

AUSTIN - A San Antonio federal judge on Feb. 27 ordered Texas Secre tary of State David Whitley not to purge the names of voters whose registrations he challenged as be ing potentially fraudulent.

The order came in a voting rights case filed by the League of United Latin American Citizens and other plaintiffs.

U.S. District Judge Fred Biery denied defendants' motion to dismiss the suit. Biery then ordered officials not to remove anyone from the current voter registration list until autho rized by the court.

However, Biery added that local officials may continue to determine whether someone who is not a citizen is in fact registered to vote, so long as it is done without communicating directly with any particular individual on the list.

Biery's ruling, which came after three days of hearing evidence and arguments in the case, stated: "Out of 98,000 new American voters on the list, thus far approximately 80 have been identified

as being ineligible to vote." Plaintiffs filed the case after Whitley, acting as the state's chief elections officer, on Jan. 25 issued an advisory to county voter registrars regarding voter registration list mainte-nance activities, one of which was to identify any non-U.S. citizens registered to vote in Texas

The advisory came after the secretary of state's elections division reported that some 95,000 individuals identified by the Texas Department of Public Safety as non-U.S. citizens have a matching voter registration record and that approximately 58,000 voted in one or more Texas Texas Attorney General

Ken Paxton reacted to the ruling, saying it "deprives state and county election officials of the capacity to faithfully execute their duties under state and federal law to maintain vot ing rolls." Paxton also said, "We are weighing our op-tions to address this ruling and to continue making our case that ineligible voters should not vote and counties are free to continue to follow the law and keep their voter rolls clean.

Meanwhile, Whitley, appointed as secretary of state by Gov. Greg Abbott in December, is undergoing the confirmation process in the Texas Senate. The body's nominations committee last week voted along party lines to forward his nomination to

#### Abbott reacts to

**ruling** Gov. Abbott on Feb. 28 sent a letter to appointees and state agencies following the Texas Criminal Court of Appeals' Feb. 27 ruling that struck down a key provision of the state's open meetings law.

In question was the law's prohibition against members of a governmental body meeting privately in numbers of less than a quorum to discuss public business. In writing the majority opinion, Presiding Judge Sharon Keller described that part of the law as "unconstitutionally vague."
The court's split decision

came in a case pitting the State of Texas against a county judge who was alleged to have broken the

In his letter, Abbott instructed recipients to continue to follow the spirit of the Texas Open Meetings Act, despite the ruling. "Texas has long been, and will continue to be, a leader in governmental transparency," Abbott wrote.

"Regardless of yesterday's ruling, my standard and expectation is for all agencies and boards to continue to follow the spirit of the law. You should not waver in your commitment to providing transparency in the work you perform for Texans at your respective governmental entities," he

Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, is working with advocates of government transparency and accountability on legislation addressing the appeals court's criticism of the law.

The bill-filing deadline for the current legislative session is Friday, March 8.

#### Abbott reappoints Morath Gov. Abbott on Feb. 27

### Houston TranStar urges motorists: move over, slow down – it saves lives

Every day, law enforcement, fire fighters, emergency personnel and tow operators risk their lives responding to calls for help. In 2018, more than 1.100 crashes in the Houston/Galveston area involved emergency vehicles, according to the Texas Department of

Transportation (TxDOT).
The Texas Move Over/ Slow Down law requires that passing motorists move out of the lane closest to an emergency vehicle stopped on the roadway, or if they can't safely move, reduce driving speeds to 20 miles below the posted limit. Move Over/Slow Down also applies when passing stopped TxDOT vehicles and tow trucks displaying warning signals such as traffic cones or flashing

"Move Over/Slow Down is designed to prevent secondary crashes and protect first responders as well as drivers and passengers," said Dinah Massie, Executive Director at Houston TranStar. "It's about improving safety for all, particularly emergency personnel who work in dangerous conditions

along Texas roadways." The Move Over/Slow Down Law requires you

 Move out of the lane next to the stopped vehicle(s) when on a highway with two or more lanes going the same direction, if it can be done safely and legally OR -

• Slow to 20 miles per hour below the posted speed

• Slow to 5 miles per hour if the posted speed is 25 miles per hour or

Heightened enforcement of the Move Over/ Slow Down law is happening across the state, with fines from \$200 to \$2,000, depending on the offense. Last year, TxDOT reports the Department of Public Safety issued more than 41,000 warnings and citations to motorists violating the law.

## Black Boxes, human remains, debris recovered from cargo jet crash site

teams have found the missing "black boxes" from the wreckage of the Atlas Air 767-300 cargo jet that crashed into Trinity Bay last Saturday, February 23rd, on a flight from Miami to Houston. They have also recovered the remains of the three crewmen that were on the plane when it went down. The third body had proven hard to find, as well as the black boxes due to the thick mud below the murky, opaque water. But hundreds of volunteers, some from the Texas Search and Rescue organization, methodically waded through the water feeling below, when they couldn't see. Dive teams from Houston, Baytown, and the state DPS were assisting in the search, as well as other authorities such as the Chambers County's sheriff and fire

departments.

They announced last Sunday, March 3rd, that they had recovered the Flight Data Recorder. Ear-lier they had found the Cockpit Voice Recorder. They also said that they had found remains of the third victim from the

plane, which had eluded the searchers for days afwere discovered in the waters of Jack's Pocket, a backwater of Trinity Bay near Anahuac

Aboard the plane had been the pilot and the co-pilot, Capt. Ricky Blakely

the NTSB laboratories in Washington, D.C. for analysis. The cargo plane was on a flight from Miami to Houston. About 30 minutes from landing at Hous-Intercontinental airport, air traffic controllers warned the pilot that he was headed toward had weather. The pilot asked for permission to fly around the storm, to the west. After that transmission, no other voice was heard from the plane. Flying at about 12,000 feet, at 12:35 the plane disappeared from radar, without a distress signal or other communication. Witnesses said the plane nose- dived into Trinity Bay near Anahuac, in about 30 sec-

First responders from Chambers County did not find any survivors or iden-

tifiable portions of the plane, except for small fragments. Authorities said the debris field stretched for almot 3 miles in length. Search and reteams have been busy this week, loading debris and packages from the plane onto a barge. These are being transport-

ed to a hangar at Chambers County Airport for examination and reconstruction.

Authorities do not have a cause for the plane crash at this time, but NTSB expects that the information they get from the recorders will help solve the mys-


