# Another pipeline fire at Crosby oil facility



Only one day after the major fire at the KMCO plant in Crosby, the Crosby fire department was fighting another oil facility fire on Sralla Road. Crosby and Highlands fire departments were called out Wednesday night, May 3rd, after lightning struck storage tanks. Highlands Fire Chief Harvey Little said that the three storage tanks were completely destroyed by flames. He responded with a brush truck, because the facility is far from the road over unpaved fields. This is the same oil well that had a fire about one year ago. See page 8 for additional photos. # Goose Creek plans \$335 million bond vote

HIGHLANDS - Goose Creek school district is planning on a large \$335 million bond issue to place before voters on election day, Saturday, May 4. School super-intendent Randall O'Brien, and others on a planning committee, have been meeting with civic groups and citizens throughout the district to explain the need for this large sum of money, and how it would be

O'Brien spoke on Tuesday to the Highlands Rotary club, reviewing the history of the last bond issue in 2013, and the need for another one to keep up with the growth of the student population at present, and as projected into 2040. At that time, he said there would be another 6000 homes in the Baytown area, and those children must be accommodated properly.

As superintendent, O'Brien does not

officially take a position on the passage of the bond referendum, but only explains the scope of the vote and answers questons about what it would accomplish, and how much it would cost the average taxpayer

This is the second attempt at a bond issue to provide facilities and upgrades. Last year, a larger two part referendum was defeated, partially because it included about \$50 million for a multi-purpose center that the taxpayers deemed not necessary. This year's bond committee had 42

# KMCO status update

Crosby, TX (April 5, 2019) – KMCO, LLC today issued the following up date on the status of the incident response at its production facility in Cros-

#### Regarding KMCO's Most Affected **Employees**

"Two members of our team are still in critical condition at area hospitals and the entire KMCO family is praying for their rapid recovery. We remain in close contact with all the families and are providing support for their special needs during this challeng-ing time," KMCO CEO, John Foley said.

Out of respect for the families and their request for privacy, the company will not release further information on their status. Regarding the Status of the Ongoing Post-Incident Response and

Investigation "The Harris County Fire Marshals have completed their initial scene examination. Investigative teams from the Fire Marshals, OSHA, CSB and KMCO are all working co-operatively to track down the cause of this tragic incident. KMCO has been cleared to continue remediation of the site," KMCO VP of Operations Keith Terhune said.

The company is continuing its water containment and collection efforts Additional precautions are being taken to manage anticipated rainfall and prevent any uncontrolled runoff. Residents should be aware that mobile water pumping equipment and tank vehicles deployed on adjacent roads are removing water runoff from the site. No hazardous

compounds have been detected in any offsite sam-

We are continuing to systematically assess the facility to verify the extent of any structural damage. Important note

The fire suppression foam used by emergency responders at the Crosby site is not hazardous to people or groundwater. If residents should see foam in their yards, it is safe and will not hurt trees, shrubs,

lawns or pets. The EPA continues its aerial and ground level air monitoring using their highly sensitive monitoring equipment. TCEQ is also conducting air monitoring. To date, there have been no findings that would raise community health concerns.

KMCO has numerous air monitoring systems at the Crosby site and de-ployed teams of mobile monitors to gather air samples in surrounding communities and downwind from the facility. "Our mobile air monitors have been taking air samples around the clock and will continue to do so until we are certain that all systems are locked down and air tight," Mr. Foley said. "We will provide the data from all these samples to the EPA and TCEQ for analysis

We know last week was challenging for our neighbors in Crosby as well. We want to again apologize for the inconvenience and worry the incident caused in our community and beyond. We thank so many of you who have expressed your empathetic well wishes and offered your prayers for those most affected.

On behalf of all of us at KMCO, I especially want to extend our deepest appreciation to the Sheriff's Department, the Harris County Fire Marshal Office, Crosby Fire Department, Life Flight crews, hospital staff, all the Harris County first responders, and the mutual aid teams from partner plants, who rushed to the aid of our people and our plant. We will be forever grateful for their courage and their skill in helping us extinguish the fire and care for our injured colleagues.

The facility is stabilized. KMCO is working in close cooperation with the Fire Marshal, federal Chemical Safety Board and OSHA investigators to determine the cause of last week's tragic incident. I can assure the community that no investigation will be more thorough than our own. We never want to see anything like this occur in the future.

Safe and compliant operations are our number one priority every day, and the measure of our ultimate success every night. As we work to remediate and rebuild, we will resume the four-year capital investment program we were implementing to upgrade our facility with the latest technologies, safety systems and training.

The events of last week have been a terrible setback. But while it has broken our hearts, it has not broken our spirit. As one of our employees put it this week, "A New Tomorrow: Stronger, Safer, Better."

We are determined to finish the job we started and fully transform KMCO into a next-generation, best-practice operator that exceeds the expectations of our customers, employees, surrounding communities, regulators and the industry at large.

# Social Security Matters

## Ask Rusty – Social Security's "First Year" Rule

Dear Rusty: I've been trying to determine the best way to proceed with retirement and could use some help. I'd like to retire on or about my 62nd birthday this September. Waiting for "full retirement" does not motivate as I have income replacement through my real estate investments. I'll have way over any earnings limits for 2019, but I don't want to have my benefits reduced. Can I apply as SSA suggests three months before my 62nd birthday without running afoul of SSA's arcane benefit reduction rules? Or should I quit first then apply? Please don't refer me to my Financial Advisor or local SSA office, they just confuse. Signed: Anxious to Retire **Dear Anxious:** Well I'm afraid I can't offer you

any obscure methods to avoid Social Security's rules & regulations, but perhaps I can clarify ome things which will help you manage the timing of your application for Social Security benefits. From what you've said, I assume you mean you plan to retire from your working career in September, but by that time you will have greatly exceeded Social Security's annual earnings limit (which is \$17,640 for 2019). Again, from what you've said, you wish to claim SS as soon as possible but you don't want to lose any benefits because of exceeding the earnings limit. So, if you wish to claim SS as soon as you turn 62, you'll be happy to know that there is a special rule which applies for your first year of collecting benefits before your full retirement age (66 \_ in your

That "first year rule" essentially says that if you start benefits in midyear, earnings prior to the month your benefits start don't count; instead you'll be subject to a monthly earnings test for the remainder of that year, once your benefits have started. So in your case, your first month of eligibility for SS would be the month of October (you must be 62 for the entire month to be eligible for benefits), and your benefit payment for October would be paid the following month (the payment date will be either the 2nd, 3rd, or 4th Wednesday of the month,

depending on the day of the month you were born). Then, starting with the month of October, if you do not have earnings from working which exceed \$1,470 in any of the remaining months of 2019, your benefits will not be cut; but if you have earnings from working which exceed that monthly amount in any month for the rest of 2019, then you will not be entitled to SS benefits for that month. Exceeding the monthly limit by any amount (even by \$1) will cause Social Security to take back the full benefit for that month. So, if your plan is to retire from your working career in September and depend upon your savings and invest-ments for income, and if vou claim Social Security as soon as you're eligible in October and you have no further earnings from working, you'll not suffer any loss of benefits in 2019.

But just as a caution, after 2019 you'll still be subject to the annual "earnings test" because you're claiming Social Security before you reach your full retirement age, and the annual earnings test will apply until the month that you reach your full retirement age (after that, there is no longer a limit to what you can earn). As for when you should apply for benefits, Social Security recommends that you apply 3 months before you wish your benefits to begin. When applying, you can specify the month you want your benefits to start, so if you wish that to be at age 62 simply specify October 2019 as your benefit start month. Applying prior to September and specifying October as your benefit start month will not expose you to any extra earnings limitations over those explained above.

# House passes legislation to reform school finance, property taxes

AUSTIN - The Texas House of Representatives on April 3 approved much-anticipated legislation written to revise the state's public school finance system. The vote was 148-1, and the bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

House Bill 3 would increase pay for public school classroom teachers, librarians and other full-time personnel and also would enable property tax relief. Primarily authored by House **Education Committee** Chair Dan Huberty, R-Houston, joint authors include Reps. Diego Bernal, D-San Antonio; John Zerwas, R-Richmond; Ken King, R-Canadian; and Alma Allen, D-Hous-

HB 3's estimated net cost would be \$9.5 billion, covering the fiscal biennium that ends Aug. 31, 2021. In addition to pay increases and incentives, HB 3 would reduce recapture and enable some \$2.7 billion in property tax relief. The legislation, among its general provisions, changes the order in which the Foundation School Program is financed so that stateavailable school funds would be applied before locally generated property tax revenue.

After the House voted. Gov. Greg Abbott applauded lawmakers for their work and said, "Texans are demanding meaningful reforms to our school finance system, and today's passage of HB3 in the House is a vital step toward that goal. By reducing recapture, investing more money in our schools and in our teachers, the Legislature is making changes that will have a lasting impact on our education system, and more importantly, our students."

State Rep. Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, chair of the House Democratic Caucus Special Committee on Education, in an April 3 news release called HB 3 "the bill we have been working for."

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance Committee on April 3 unanimously approved a budget bill that matches the House's appropriation on two of the session's top priorities: education finance and property tax reform.

A report filed by the Senate News Service points out that while the House and Senate have settled on \$9 billion in additional funding toward those priorities,

exactly how the funds would be spent is still up for debate.

Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, said, "We continue to negotiate this issue with the House, but both chambers have now reached \$9 billion set aside for whatever agreement we reach."

#### Revenue increase noted

State sales tax revenue totaled \$2.6 billion last month, an amount 9 percent greater than the amount calculated for the month of March 2018, Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar announced April 2.

The comptroller's office reported increased collections in all major economic sectors, including retail trade, information services, oil and gas and restaurants. "Much of the increase stemmed more from consumer spending rather than business spending," Hegar said.

Furthermore, total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in March 2019 was up 7.3percent compared to the same period a year ago, according to agency sta-

#### RRC marks annıversary

On March 31, 1919, the Texas Legislature enacted a statute giving the Texas Railroad Commission regulatory authority over the oil and gas industry in the Lone Star State.

Railroad Commissioner Christi Craddick wrote an April 1 editorial commemorating the milestone. Among the points she made was that the commission's well-plugging program is hitting historic numbers. In fiscal years 2018-2019, the Texas Legislature set a performance goal for the agency to plug 1,958 abandoned wells. However, Craddick said, the commission is on track to plug about 3,000. Craddick pointed out that funds to plug the wells come from fees paid by the energy industry, not from Texas taxpayers.

HOUSTON - Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia met with federal officials in Washington, D.C., this week to advocate for infrastructure resources and enhancing safety and collaboration with the chemical industry after the ITC explosion.

During the visit, which

spanned Monday, April 1, through Thursday, April 4, Commissioner Garcia met with EPA officials to address the lack of air monitors available after a fire broke out at Intercontinen tal Terminals Company in Deer Park March 17 and burned for days. Garcia emphasized the need for more foam on site to be able to combat these blazes, as well as the importance of knowing quickly what is inside the tanks so first-responders can be both safe and effective.

"We need to work to-

gether, at all levels of government, to ensure industry leaders and our communities cannot just co-exist, but be good neighbors and look out for each other," Commissioner Gar

cia said. ITC continued to be addressed in meetings with Speaker Nancy Pelosi's team, Senator John Cornyn, various members of Congress and the American Chemical Council. Also in those discussions, Commissioner Garcia pushed for infrastructure resources in Precinct 2, specifically around the



responding to natural and man-made disasters. Both agencies are assisting in this response with equipment and expertise in response management and air and water quality test-ing and analysis. EPA has conducted ground level air

monitoring with hand held equipment and the Airborne Spectral Photomet-EnvironmentalCollection Technology air-craft (ASPECT). The EPA Trace Atmosphere Gas Analyzer (TAGA) has also been monitoring for organic compounds in the air. The TCEQ continues to work around the clock. pulling in inspectors from regions around the state to conduct air monitoring and water quality sampling. Test results are being posted to the TCEQ's incident

# **Harris County Attorney Ryan** files court brief seeking to remove citizenship question from 2020 census

Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan vesterday filed a friend of the court brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in a lawsuit seeking to prevent the U.S. Census Bureau from including a question about citizenship on the 2020 Census.

Ryan is joined in Harris County's brief by Fort Bend County Judge K.P. George and the City of Marfa. The brief asks the Supreme Court to affirm a district court judge's ruling that the citizenship question cannot be included. The ruling came in a lawsuit filed against the Census Bureau by the State of

New York. "We join in the concerns expressed across the country that a question on citizenship will reduce the number of people participating in the 2020 Census," said Ryan. "This question will intimidate ur immigrant population. We want everyone to participate—whether they are citizens or not.

The brief states that the addition of the citizenship question to the 2020 De-cennial Census will cause in an undercount of each jurisdiction's significant

foreign-born population resulting in disproportion-ately low representation at the local state and federal levels along with corrupt data inadequate for effective governance. An undercount will also hurt the amount of federal dollars coming to these communities in programs based on population.

Harris County's growth has always been driven by immigrants intertwined with new industries creating diverse economic engines for Texas and the country, Ryan points out in the brief. Neighboring suburban Fort Bend County has exploded in growth, diversity and affluence in the last few decades elect $ing\ its\ first\ non-Anglo\ chief$ executive since the 1800s, immigrant K.P. George. While the tiny City of Marfa has not seen such explosive growth, it shares a high foreign-born population with Harris and Fort Bend at risk for a net undercount in the Decen-

nial Census. Ryan says the current intense climate of fear among immigrants makes it all the more likely that the net differential undercount will be more acute in Texas should the citizenship question be added to the census. In the past, as with the decades-long practice of using "white primaries" to disenfranchise African-American voters, the Supreme Court was the only source of protection to the constitutional rights of people wishing to engage in the civic sphere

"Now, the Supreme Court's intervention is needed again, to ensure that the integrity of the data for representation and effective governance is protected," Ryan said. "Judge George, the City of Marfa and we agree with the New York district court's finding that the undocumented and Hispanics will be dispropor-tionately undercounted if the citizenship question is left in the Census."

"We believe adding that question will depress responses, undercount the people and harm the representation and safety of the people of Harris and Fort Bend Counties and the City of Marfa," Ryan

# Fatalities decline in the State's Highway construction areas

**TxDOT Promotes Safe** Driving in Conjunction with National Work Zone Awareness Week

HOUSTON - April 8, 2019 — In spite of a decrease in work zone crashes in Texas last year, 161 people still lost their lives and another 684 were seriously injured, with the vast majority of those killed—84 percent—being motorists and/or their passengers. As National Work Zone Awareness Week gets underway today, the Texas Department of Transportation highlights its Be Safe. Drive Smart. campaign, reminding motorists to stay alert and exercise caution when driving through work zones.

"Work zones present a different environment for drivers to navigate with concrete barriers, slow-moving heavy equipment and vehicles that may make sudden stops," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "That's why we're urging drivers to pay special attention in work zones on Texas roadways-for their protection and the safety of highway work crews.

In 2018, a total of 25.162 work zone traffic crashes were reported, an average of nearly 70 crashes per day, resulting in deaths that fell by 20 percent between 2017 and 2018 in construction zones in Tex-

At any given time, Texas has as many as 3,000 active work zones across the 80,000 miles road TxDOT

maintains. Since the leading causes of work zone crashes in Texas are speeding and driver inattention, TxDOT asks motorists to avoid distractions and put their phones away, obey road crew flaggers, slow down and follow posted work zone speed limits. Traffic fines double in work zones when workers are present, and fines can cost up to \$2,000. To safeguard road-

side crews and first responders, the state's Move Over/Slow Down law also requires drivers to move over a lane or reduce their speed to 20mph below the posted limit when they see flashing blue or amber lights on a TxDOT vehicle, emergency vehicle, tow truck, or law enforcement stopped on the roadside or shoulder. Not doing so can result in a fine of up to \$2,000.

The Texas Mutual Insurance Company is joining TxDOT to promote work zone safety through sharing of campaign materials and providing speakers for safety-related events. Part of Texas Mutual's mission is to help employers prevent workplace incidents and minimize their consequences, which aligns with TxDOT's work zone awareness safety efforts.

Also, as part of National Work Zone Awareness Week, Tx-DOT Houston District is teaming up with the City of Houston to highlight the importance of being aware in all work

zones. The programma-ble LED lights that decorate multiple bridges above the mainlanes of I-69 Southwest Freeway in the Montrose area will be lit up in orange and white starting Mon-

day, April 8.

The City of Houston and TxDOT are also working together to promote work zone awareness during a Facebook Live presentation on Wednesday, April 10th at 1 p.m. The discussion will focus on ways motorists can keep safe in work zones including not texting and driving, obeying the posted speed limit, and to always expect the unexpected.
