However, stores in Crosby were packed as parents endeavored to get ready for school to start today.

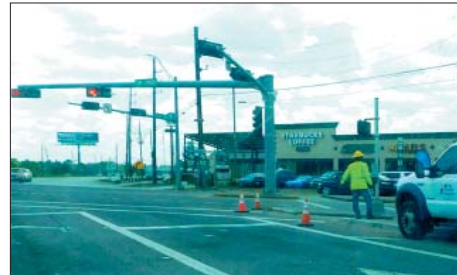

TxDOT changes US 90 / FM 2100 signal timing

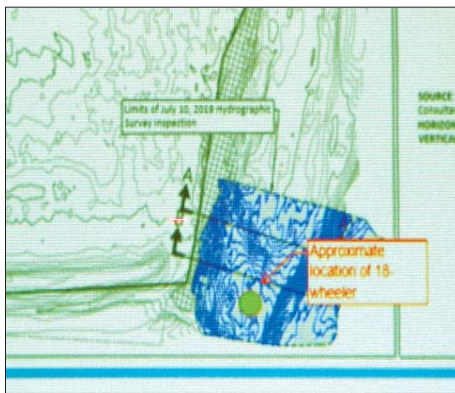

EPA sets community meeting Sept. 24

HIGHLANDS - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), in cooperation with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), Federal, State and Harris County agencies, local officials and industry, plan to hold a Community Meeting for the San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund site.

During the meeting an update will be provided on current site activities and the cap inspection data. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 24, 2019 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Highlands Community Center, 604 Highland Woods Drive, Highlands, Texas 77562.

HIGHLANDS - This month's meeting of the THEA/San Jacinto River Coalition dealt with potential threats to the integrity of the cap over the waste pits, as the community waited for the slow process of removing the toxic waste to go forward. Jackie Young announced that she had learned that the Pelican Asphalt Permit, wanting to dredge areas near the

Waste Pits, had been approved on July 3 without any further public notice. She also reported on a discussion with the EPA about the position of the marker buoys in the river, which are to protect the cap from marine vessels. She said they determined they were not in the proper location, and the EPA had them moved.

Crosby hero sets sights on raising \$270,000 to save more young lives

C.E. KING - Last Saturday, the GoBigOrGoHome Cody Stephens Foundation scanned the hearts of over 250 kids with the help of C.E. King staff and faculty, North Shore Rotary, San Jacinto Pilot Club, and the North Shore Anchor Club volunteers.

ReACT in a Heartbeat, a Baytown Non-Profit that teaches life saving C.P.R. instructed some 200 students how to perform Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation at the same venue. These were not certification classes but exposure classes and man of the students went from having their hearts tested to learning to save someone else's life. "We always try to teach C.P.R. training at our screenings we don't usually do it at school screenings because kids

are supposed to get C.P.R. certification from their school but anytime we have a community screening we try to team up with someone group and teach the basics. Now Stephens says, "We are going to try to help put EKG machines in schools so that athletic teams can check out their own members."

The Stephens fight to save young lives for the last seven years as Scott's family has attempted to impress upon the Texas Legislature that young athletes dying of sudden death can hopefully be avoided with early detection by the new E.K.G machines that have not only gone from being the size of an ambulance to the size of a paperback book and

Eagle Scout projects planned in Highlands



Two Eagle scout candidates, John McGregor at left, and Logan Lopez at right, spoke to the Highlands-Lynchburg Chamber of Commerce last Thursday at their monthly luncheon.

The scouts explained their ideas about projects that are required to achieve their Eagle scout status. McGregor said that he plans on renovating the "fire pit" in the Park along San Jacinto Street and the railroad tracks, which is used by the scouts for flag burning ceremonies and other types of events. McGregor plans to rebuild the stone perimeter and clean the pit.

Lopez said that his project would be the construction of a wooden fence along the line between the park and the railroad, thus enhancing the park and providing safety for children and others that use the park. He described his fence as about 6 feet tall, and learning how to procure the materials and engineer the construction of it would be part of the learning experience.

The attendees at the luncheon listened to the proposals with enthusiasm, and after the talk a collection was taken to help the boys pay for the projects, and about \$1 000 dollars was donated in just the short time of the luncheon.

Fireworks cause \$70,000 damage to house in Lake Houston area

Houston Firefighters were called to battle a House Fire on August 8, 2019 at about 9:00p.m. The fire was contained in a storage area of the house at the 300 block of Corydon 77336, where fireworks were exploding.

No injuries were reported to firefighters or the home's occupants.

\$80 thousand in estimated property was saved, but \$70 thousand in damage was sustained by the house.

The cause for the fire is being listed as unintentional.

Firefighters arrived on scene to fire from a storage area of a house with fireworks going off. They began an attack on the fire and conducted a primary search. Fire was also found in the attic and once the fire was extinguished crews conducted salvage and overhaul. The resident stated they had a generator running for electricity. Firefighters from Stations 64, 65, 101, 102, 103, 105 and 30 responded to this incident.

Three children drown at Sylvan Beach

Sheriff Hawthorne reports that on Thursday, August 8, at approximately 7:28 p.m., the Chambers County Sheriff's Office was notified by the LaPorte Police Department of a possible multi-fatality drowning at Sylvan Beach Park.

Sylvan Beach Park is a county park within the city of LaPorte, Texas, and Harris County, however, the bay waters that border the park are wholly within Chambers County.

Upon arrival of the Chambers County deputies it was learned that a family from the Houston area were swimming in the park when an otherwise beautiful afternoon took a tragic turn.

Six members of the family, including the Mother, Father and four children ranging in age from 7 to 13, began having trouble in the water. The Mother and Father, along

Elvis performer at Liberty Opry Aug. 25

Although numerous performers call themselves Elvis Presley impersonators, or the more recent term "tribute artists," Sting Ray Anthony thinks the legendary entertainer would have frowned.

Anthony will be singing Presley's tunes and a myriad of others in Liberty Texas Liberty Opry on August 25th 4:00. The show is "Juke Box Rock and Roll Extravaganza." It includes the Liberty Opry band.

The first question out of my mouth during a telephone interview with Anthony was, "Is Sting Ray really your name?"

"We had been hired to sing at Dick Clark's Amer-

ican Bandstand Theatre in Branson, Missouri," he said. "Some of the other original cast members were Bobby Vee, Fabian, and the Shirelles. We all were trying to think of a name to put on the billboard for me: not 'Rockin' Ray,' or 'Reckless Ray.' Finally we hit on 'Sting Ray,' and it stuck."

Anthony, a native of Toronto Canada, became preoccupied with Presley at an early age when his mother, in desperation, gave him a Presley album because she was tired of listening to Englebert Humperdinck, another singer he liked.

With a new-born passion for Elvis, Anthony taught himself drum, gui-

tar, and piano; sometimes over the years scrounging instruction and experience from other musicians.

Over time Sting Ray and his accompanying musicians gained a widening ripple of fans. Gigs became more frequent and widespread, leading even to shows in Canada's Sky Dome that seats 50,000 people.

He paid his dues while making a living in Canada, and the big break came with his invitation to perform in a Las Vegas live tribute show John Stewart's Legends in Concert. That led to Branson and subsequent opportunities.

Battleship to Close Arrests made in Dayton Stripes Robbery

Battleship Texas Closes to the Public Aug. 26

LA PORTE— The Battleship Texas State Historic Site will close to the public Aug. 26, allowing staff and contractors full accessibility to the ship ensuring they can safely perform the necessary preparation work ahead of a repair project. The last day the public will be able to explore the Battleship

Texas will be Sunday, Aug. 25.

"It is important that we take the necessary steps to preserve the profound legacy of the Battleship Texas," said Rodney Franklin, Director of Texas State Parks. "I look forward to the next chapter that the Battleship will experience after these much-needed repairs are completed. The ship has taken part in some of the most significant naval battles of the 20th century and we hope

it will continue to be around for future generations of Texans to enjoy."

During the closure, staff will be cataloging and securing thousands of artifacts on board the ship, as well as removing large exhibit collections before it is transported for repair.

Visitors will continue to have access to the San Jacinto Monument, the San Jacinto Battleground and the park's nature trails during the closure.

Arrests made in Dayton Stripes Robbery

Second Arrest in Aggravated Robbery Case

On Wednesday, August 7, detectives with the Dayton Police Department's Criminal Investigations Division along with members of the Harris County Pct.3 Criminal Investigation Unit conducted a search warrant and felony arrest warrant at 16119 Palm St. in Channelview.

The warrants were part of the ongoing investigation of an Aggravated Robbery of the Stripes Convenience Store in Dayton. The robbery took place at the Stripes store on Thursday, May 30, 2019 at approximately 2:20am.

The execution of the warrants resulted in the arrest of Daniel Gallegos 18 of Channelview for Aggravated Robbery and the recovery of an AR-15 style rifle believed to have been used in the robbery. Gallegos is a former Channelview High School student, according to authorities.

Gallegos was transported to the Harris County Jail and will be extradited back to Liberty county.

"We would like to extend a special thank you to Harris County Pct.3 Assistant Chief Rick Larkin, Corporal Steven Dugat and the members of their

Criminal Investigation Unit," said Dayton Police Chief Robert Vine. "Working together makes all of our communities safer."

Authorities said that three persons were involved in perpetrating the robbery. They entered the store at the rear, carrying

weapons, and threatened the clerk on duty. The ordered him to open the register, where they took cash, and tobacco products.

They left through the rear, and escaped in a grey or white Ford SUV with a spare tire on the right rear.

Police were able to identify and arrest a second suspect, Gregorio Tapio, 18, of Dayton on Monday, July 29, and are still looking for the third person involved.

If convicted the suspects face five to 99 years in jail, and a fine up to \$10,000.

Ask Rusty – About Survivor Benefits

Dear Rusty: I am looking for information on my benefits. I am 60 years and 5 months old, and still employed. My spouse died in 2017 and would have been 61 years and 9 months old on July 31, 2019. My husband was the more highly compensated employee and was employed longer than myself. Signed: A Survivor

Dear Survivor: You are eligible for a survivor benefit from your deceased husband because you are now 60, but that survivor benefit will be considerably reduced (by about 28.5%) if you take it now. The survivor benefit is reduced if taken before your widow's full retirement age (which is 66 for you). Taken at your widow's full retirement age (FRA) you'd be entitled to 100% of the benefit your deceased husband had earned at his passing. But if you take the survivor benefit now - before your normal full retirement age (66 years and 10 months) - and you are working you'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings limit." If you exceed the limit, it will cause Social Security to withhold some of your survivor benefits. The 2019 earnings limit is \$17,640 and it will increase slightly each year until the year you reach your normal FRA, when it will increase by about 2 times; then when you reach your normal FRA there is no earnings limit. What all of that means is that if you take the survivor benefit now and continue to work and earn, your survivor benefit will be reduced from what it could be, and Social Security will take back some benefits if you exceed the earnings limit (they'll take back \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit).

Assuming you have earned the requisite 40 credits from your own career, you will be eligible for your own

Social Security retirement benefit at age 62, though your own benefit would also be reduced if you take it early (the reduction for your own benefit at age 62 will be about 29.2%). Since at 62 you will have a choice to take either the survivor benefit or your own benefit, you may want to set a goal of getting the highest possible benefit for the rest of your life. To do that I suggest you determine whether the maximum benefit you can get on your own work record (at age 70) is more than the maximum survivor benefit you can get at your widow's FRA, and then follow a strategy which yields the highest benefit. You can get those numbers by contacting Social Security directly and asking for your own Statement of Estimated Benefits, and also asking for what your maximum survivor benefit will be. You can get the statement for your own estimated benefits online by creating a "My Social Security" account, but you will need to contact Social Security directly to get your maximum survivor benefit amount.

Once you are 62, you will have a choice of which benefit to choose and when to choose it. So, if your own SS benefit on your own work record will be more at age 70 than your survivor benefit will be at your widow's FRA, you should consider taking the survivor benefit first and delaying your own benefit until it reaches maximum, at which point you would switch to your own benefit. However, if your own maximum benefit at age 70 will be less than the maximum survivor benefit you can get at your widow's full retirement age, then you may wish to wait until you reach your widow's full retirement age (66?) to claim the maximum survivor benefit. If you wait until your widow's FRA to claim the maximum survivor benefit, and you need additional income while you're waiting, you can claim only your own SS benefit at age 62 but remember that if you do so the earnings limit will still apply to your own SS retirement benefit until you reach your normal full retirement age.

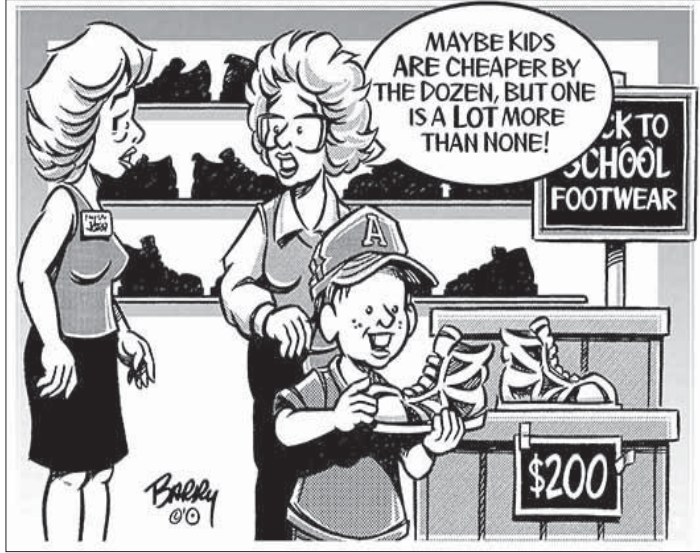

Officials meet to discuss public safety following deadly shooting in El Paso

AUSTIN — Following the Aug. 3 shooting that claimed the lives of 22 people and injured 24 others at a popular El Paso shopping venue, Gov. Greg Abbott and a group of officials met in the border city to discuss ways to address violence.

Joined by Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, House Speaker Dennis Bonnen, state Sen. Jose Rodriguez, and area state Reps. Cesar Blanco, Art Fierro, Mary Gonzales, Joe Moody and Lina Ortega, Abbott and the group talked about how to improve public safety.

"The entire state of Texas continues to grieve the tragedy in El Paso," Abbott said. "While our hearts remain broken, it is our responsibility to show the resolve that is needed to address this shooting and begin the process of working together to lay a groundwork of how we are going to respond. The people of Texas — including the people of El Paso — deserve to be safe and it is our responsibility to ensure that safety," he added.

Sen. Rodriguez, in a statement on behalf of the El Paso legislative delegation, said: "State leaders pledged to work with the El Paso delegation to address gun violence driven by white nationalism. We all agreed that gun violence and white nationalism are pressing issues. Gov. Abbott, in his remarks, was frank about calling the shooter a white supremacist and his actions domestic terrorism. All leaders, from local to state to federal, must reject the ideology of white supremacy."

Abbott announced the state would provide more than \$5 million in immediate financial assistance through the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Public Safety Office for law enforcement agencies and the community of El Paso.

According to a governor's office news release, the financial assistance will take these forms:

- Psychological first aid and crisis counseling;



— Behavioral health services, including needs assessments, strategic planning and care coordination with local service providers;

— County reimbursements for expert witness and juror fees, investigation, increased security and more;

— School-based mental health services to support students affected directly or indirectly and referrals for youths with certain behavioral health and psychological needs;

— Post-critical incident seminars, emphasizing peer support to assist first responders suffering from traumatic stress; and

— The establishment of a "family resiliency center" to be a focal point for community services including mental health needs, legal services, faith-based assistance and public information.

NEW ACCESSIBILITY RULES SET

House Bill 3163, establishing new rules for accessible parking spaces in Texas, will become law Sept. 1.

According to a governor's office news release, the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation will draft rules that implement the legislation to amend Government Code Sec. 469.052, as follows:

— The international access symbol must be painted on the parking space;

— The words "NO PARKING" must be painted on access aisles next to accessible parking spaces;

— The signs marking accessible parking spaces must include the penalty for parking illegally in the space. Fines and towing are examples of possible

penalties.

Notably, current signs and parking spaces do not need changes until the new rules go into effect. The new rules will be open to receive comment in the Texas Register after drafting and approval, and importantly, the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation anticipates the rules to take effect near mid-2020.

TAX REVENUE IS DISTRIBUTED

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 7 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$876.8 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of August. That is 4 percent more than the amount distributed in August 2018.

Allocations are based on sales made in June by businesses that report tax monthly and on sales made in April, May and June by quarterly filers.

Details on sales tax allocations to individual cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts can be found online in the comptroller's monthly sales tax allocation comparison summary reports at comptroller.texas.gov.

BATTLESHIP VISITS TO STOP

The Battleship Texas State Historic Site in La Porte will close to the public Aug. 26, allowing staff and contractors full accessibility to the ship to safely perform necessary preparation work ahead of a repair project.

The last day the public may explore the 573-foot dreadnought-class vessel will be Aug. 25, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced Aug. 7.

During the closure, thousands of artifacts on board the Texas will be catalogued and secured and exhibit collections removed before it is towed to another site for repair.

Visitors will continue to have access to the nearby San Jacinto Monument, the San Jacinto Battleground and the park's nature trails during the closure.

One store worker volunteered that the notebooks she was standing near for \$2.48 had been \$2.20 regular price last week. On the other hand, notebooks that were regular 79¢ were on sale for 50¢. "They move prices, locations and stuff around a lot," she said.

A grocery store manager in Crosby said, "What do I care about a sales tax free weekend, anymore. We used to carry items for each school in packages, specific to every school but now only big box stores do that. It encourages their monopoly."

But that system has been replaced with the pupils and students getting their requirements specified on-line so that wherever they go they simply have to look for the items required.

"It wouldn't be such a joke if the cut off wasn't at a hundred, about the time you spend anything at all. 'Oops, it isn't tax free,' best of all they included electronics where are you gonna buy a laptop that is worth anything for less than a hundred bucks?"

But, a store clerk when asked if electronics were tax free that weekend peered at a piece of paper and said, "They are not on the list, so it isn't tax free."

This reporter bought some White-Out and a set of ink pens, the White-Out drew the 8¢ tax.

A young couple briskly strode out of a local store, herding school aged children, pushing a capacity cart and when called out to ask if they had saved on back to school with the tax free holiday answered, "We didn't know about it and from the money we just spent it didn't make any difference."

Similarly, another couple with a elementary aged boy and a packed grocery cart answered, "We didn't notice anything at all, and we just did our \$400 big back to school special buy. We maybe saved about \$0.96 on a backpack."

One local business man said, "There's not enough savings for me to fight with the type of folks willing to fight folks over saving a few bucks."

Another stated, "Yeah, people like to save money. Where is the human interest in that? I gotta say notebooks is all I saved on and my kid said I got the wrong kind."

Another friend answered, "The crowds aren't worth the \$8 per \$100 savings."

Another friendly couple answered, "We did all our back to school a week ago to avoid the crowd."

Yet there are those that maintain an optimistic as equally opportunistic attitude, "I love the back to school tax free weekend. Unless you go to a popular mall like Baybrook the crowds aren't bad. Stores have excellent sales on top of the tax break. I actually plan for this weekend way in advance."

It would be enough to hear all this but add to the fact that this reporter was booted from the local Wal-Mart and told that I would have to check with Wal-Mart's Corporate Office to ask questions. Didn't call them.

Jackie reported that in a discussion she had with the new acting director of EPA/Region 6, David Gray, she was able to make the point that THEA/SJRC felt that the PRP work now being conducted should be monitored and inspected by an independent third party.

CONCERN FOR SEMI ACCIDENT DAMAGE

The semi-truck that went over the railing on June 27 and landed in the river, was very close to the perimeter of the waste pits site. EPA took

sonar readings on July 10th of the cap after the truck was removed, and reported that no damage was detected. They furnished a map showing two profiles they had which showed no change in the cap or the outline of the pits. Jackie questioned whether the technique used and the scope was adequate, noting that in 2015 after the tax day flood, divers discovered a 22x25 gap in the membrane that had been missed by other techniques.

Diabetes sets in when we don't make enough insulin or the insulin doesn't work the way it should, and too much sugar stays in the blood.

Diabetes can cause serious damage to the body if not managed properly, contributing to heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, blindness, kidney disease, and amputation. In fact, nearly 30 million people who have diabetes as a primary condition need emergency care, reports the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

It's a disease that requires a tremendous amount of monitoring and self-care.

Following is more information about the types of Diabetes, tips on how to prevent the disease, as well as management strategies if you or a loved one already have or have been diagnosed with Diabetes so that you can take control of it, avoid emergency care, and enjoy an active, independent lifestyle.

Types of Diabetes

With type 1 diabetes, the body does not make insulin. A person who has type 1 diabetes must take insulin

daily to live. Type 1 diabetes accounts for about 5 to 10 percent of diagnosed diabetes in the United States, according to the National Institutes of Health. It develops most often in children and young adults but can appear at any age. Symptoms may include increased thirst and urination, constant hunger, weight loss, blurred vision, and extreme fatigue. If not diagnosed and treated with insulin, a person with type 1 diabetes can lapse into a life-threatening diabetic coma. We have no control over this type of diabetes.

With type 2 diabetes, which is the more common type, the body does not make or use insulin well. Often by making healthier lifestyle choices, such as losing weight or exercising or eating healthier foods, we can keep the disease from worsening and damaging our bodies.

Type 2 diabetes is most often associated with older age, obesity, family history of diabetes, previous history of gestational diabetes, physical inactivity, and certain ethnicities. About 80 percent of people with type 2 diabetes are overweight or obese, reports the National Institutes of Health.

The symptoms of type 2 diabetes are similar to those of type 1 diabetes, but they develop gradually. Symptoms may include fatigue, frequent urination, increased thirst and hunger, weight loss, blurred vision, and slow healing of wounds or sores. Some people have no symptoms.

Prevention and Management Strategies

The good news is that there is a lot that can be done to prevent or delay diabetes. Studies show that people can lower their risk of developing diabetes by losing 5 to 7 percent of their body weight through diet and exercise. In fact, a major study of more than 3,000 people with prediabetes found that diet

and exercise resulting in a 5 to 7 percent weight loss (that's about 10 to 14 pounds in a person who weighs 200 pounds) lowered the incidence of type 2 diabetes by nearly 60 percent. Study participants lost weight by cutting fat and calories in their diet and by exercising at least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week. Walking was the exercise of choice.

- Exercise. Choose an activity you enjoy (such as walking or swimming) and do it for about 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week. Check with your health care provider before starting an exercise program.

- Eat healthy. Load up on fruits, vegetables, low-fat dairy sources, and lean protein. Incorporate more fish, beans, peas, nuts and seeds into your diet and experiment with seasonings such as cinnamon.

- Lose weight if needed. Just a 5 percent weight loss is proven to help prevent or delay the onset of type 2 diabetes.

- Stay on top of your regular screenings, including eye exams. Know your blood sugar, blood pressure, cholesterol, and BMI.

- Take medications for diabetes and other chronic conditions as prescribed by your health care provider.

- Quit smoking. It increases your risk of diabetes and makes it more difficult to manage the disease if you have it.

Exercise, a healthy diet and weight loss play a tremendous role in helping someone prevent or manage their diabetes. The key is to make gradual lifestyle changes.
