I-10 Bridge lanes to reopen in January

HIGHLANDS - TxDOThas announced that the Interstate I-10 highway lanes over the San Jacinto River will return to normal in January.

The lanes have been re-stricted since September when several barges hit the structural supports under the highway, and TxDOT had to close the westbound lanes

On the weekend of January 3rd the westbound lanes will reopen, including the on-ramp at 4 corners, and on the weekend of January 10th the eastbound lanes will return to a normal 3 lanes plus shoulder.

TxDOT said that this was a month earlier than originally scheduled.

Fatal accident on Crosby-Lynchburg Road

TY – A 19-year-old lost his life in an accident in the 10,600 block of Crosby-Lynchburg Road a few minutes into Sunday morning, Dec. 15.

Deputies indicate that Jevson Torres, 19, was driving his brown Silverado when he tried to pass another vehicle. The witness said he then swerved to get back into his lane, realizing that traffic was oncoming. His attempted evasive action was judged by deputies to be faulty and his truck pitched into a counterclockwise yaw.





Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty – Retired Public Servant Surprised by "WEP"

Dear Rusty: I turned 62 in October 2018. A few months prior to my birth month, I went on the Social Security website which said my estimated benefits would be be-tween \$900-\$1000 at full retirement age and between \$600-\$700 at age 62. I receive a pension from a city government where I was a firefighter for almost 20 years where I did not pay Social Security tax on my income, but I have over 20 years invested in Social Security from other jobs. I expected the cut in benefits for retiring early (62), but I was totally caught off guard by my benefits being cut in half again because of the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP). My city pension is about \$1700 monthly, and it's my understanding that WEP is not supposed to reduce my Social Security by more than half of my government pension. My current Social Security benefit is \$348 a month which is considerably less than half of my \$1700 pension. Am I missing something? Shouldn't I be getting \$600-\$700 in Social Security benefits? Signed: Retired Firefight-

Dear Retired Firefighter: WEP rules are complicated and you certainly aren't alone in our dismay over how WEP affects Social Security benefits for public servants in certain states which didn't participate in Social Security. I'll try to shed some light on what happened to your benefit amount.

The first thing you should know is that the estimates you received from Social Security before you claimed were just that – estimates. If you were working in SScovered employment prior to getting the estimate, the amounts given assumed you would continue to work at your ${\bf recent\ SS\text{-}covered}$ earnings until your full retirement age. If you didn't, your full retirement age (FRA) benefit amount would be less than the amount quoted The estimate given at that time didn't take WEP into account either. The WEP reduction tak place before the reduction for claiming early at age 62. WEP affects your "primary insurance amount" (PIA) which is the amount you're normally entitled to at your full retirement age from SS-covered work.


When you applied for Social Security your PIA was recomputed using a special WEP formula. Your PIA is based on vour average indexed monthly earnings" or "AIME" which is the monthly average of the highest earning 35 years over your lifetime in which you contributed to Social Security. Your PIA is determined by breaking your AIME into 3 parts (called "bend points"). multiplying those parts by a certain percentage for each part, and totaling up those three computations. When WEP applies, the first part of your AIME is multiplied by 40%, rather than the normal 90%, of the first \$895 of your

AIME (this is the amount for your "eligibility year" 2018). So, the first part of your WEP AIME would contribute \$358 (instead of the normal \$805) to your PIA and, thus, to your FRA benefit amount. a reduction of \$447. (If you have more than 20 years of substantial earnings in SS-covered employment, the impact of WEP is lessened by about 5% for each year over 20).There is a maximum WEP reduction (\$447 for 2018) and there is also a rule which says your WEP reduction cannot be more than half of your non-covered pension amount. But since half of your city pension is more than \$447, that rule does not change the WEP reduc-

So, using your general numbers, if your FRA benefit (before WEP) was "\$900-\$1000", let's say that your normal PIA was about \$950. After the WEP reduction your WEP PIA would be about \$503, which is what you would get if you waited until your full retirement age claim Social Security. By claiming at age 62, your benefit was reduced by about 27%, which would make your benefit about \$367/month. This isn't far from what you are now getting, consider ing that we're using only estimated numbers in these calculations. Remember, the SS rule doesn't say that your WEP reduced benefit amount can't be less than half of your non-covered pension amount. Instead it says that the WEP reduction to your PIA can't be more than that.

"That's why it's impera-tive that we work collaboratively towards finding ways that our state's agencies can help to ensure that we count all Texans in the upcoming census," she

added. Abbott declares

Gov. Greg Abbott on Dec. 12 certified that exceptional drought conditions pose a threat of imminent disaster in the counties of Bandera, Blanco, Burnet, Concho, Karnes, Kendall, Kinney, Llano, Maverick, Medina, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, Zapata and Zavala.

The declaration states that significantly low rainfall and prolonged dry conditions continue to increase the threat of wildfire across the affected counties. The governor added that drought conditions pose an imminent threat to public health, property and the economy.

It is the tender cusp of

It is that time when emotions run close to the overfill point, when sentimentality and anger and depression and euphoria mix freely together, with not enough space between them to tell the difference from one moment to the next.

I am visiting my parents— and of course this does not

help.
My parents are doing well (thank you for asking). They are in their eighties now, still living in their dream cabin in the woods and, although I know they are growing older the signs are so incremental and their attitude so upbeat, it is easy to deny the passage of time when I am with them and imagine I am a much younge person than I actually am.

Yesterday, we stopped at the local greenhouse in the small town near their cabin. It was unbelievably cold. I don't know why I couldn't believe it; I grew up in the cold and was raised with the idea that extreme cold was a signpost of Christmas and a litmus test for true Christmas spirit. But the truth is, I haven't lived in a very cold place for a while and the cold stole the breath out of me.

The greenhouse was a bit out of our way, but my mother explained, "I like to support them, they put up such nice floral arrangements in the

The shop was surrounded by welcoming signs and Christmas trees propped up against giant bags of earth, waiting for spring. Inside it was warm and smelled of soil and cinnamon.

As my parents were in the greenhouse, bundling up the poinsettia for the drive home, I warmed the car and looked across the street at a mobile home that was a little worse for wear. The yard was piled high with stuff, now half buried in the snow. As I waited, the door flew open, accompanied by a string of expletives.

A man about my age was following a younger man out of the house, screaming at him, yelling terrible things. I watched as the young man—who was wearing the beginning of a thin beard and a winter jacket-was chased out of the house and began walking down the country road alone.

Minutes later, my parents in the car, we were driving home on the road that leads to the greenhouse when we saw the young man, walking. It was several miles to town. "Should we stop, dad?" I

asked. My dad was silent. "It's hard to know what to do," my mom said, quietly.

The young man seems appropriately dressed for the weather. He is walking down the road in a deliberate fashi as though he knows where he was going—I say all this to myself because I know I won't stop. I know I won't take a chance and put this stranger in the car with my eighty-year-old parents and get involved in something that I don't know the first thing about.

We drive by. Snug inside the car, my mother holds the small poinsettia in her lap. I wonder what that young man's Christmas will be like and I don't know what to do. I don't know what to do, in this crowded time of year, with all the emotions that bump against each other. I don't know how to sort out the tangled strands of iov and sorrow that run through

Sitting with my happy, healthy parents, I am quiet as I watch the young man, walking alone down the road on this bright cold day.



Avoid Holiday Heart Health Dangers

BAYTOWN — (December 13, 2019) — Studies consistently show the risk of heart attack increases during the holidays. Whether it's from overindulging at the table, to an increase in stress and reduction in exercise, the holiday season brings virtual shopping list of lifestyle choices that can negatively impact your heart health.

According to Duke University researchers, during November, December and January, more people die from heart attacks than at any other time of the year.

Nadia Fida, MD, an advanced heart failure, pulmonary hypertension and cardiac transplant cardiologist and director of the Heart Failure Clinic at Houston Methodist Bay-

town Hospital, says it's possible to still enjoy the holidays while not increasing your risk of heart attack by avoiding four common dangers associated with the season.

Too much food and

 $too\ little\ exercise$ "Don't entirely forget about your healthy lifestyle, but a little indulgence on special occasions is generally not a problem," Fida said. She suggests substituting low-fat or nonfat yogurt for mayon-

naise in dips and dressings and replacing some of the bread in your stuffing recipe with chopped vegetables. She also recommends heading to the shopping center to do some holiday speed-shopping, or logging some miles around the neighborhood or walking trail.

 $Too\ much\ alcohol\ and$ $smoke\ exposure$

Parties can come fast and furious this time of year, but drinking too much alcohol can raise the level of some fats in the blood and increase the risk of high blood pressure, alcoholism, obesity, stroke, suicide and accidents. With more social gatherings during the holidays, the opportunities for exposure to secondhand smoke. which has been linked to cardiovascular-related death and disability, increase.

Stress and anxiety Whether it's coping with family dynamics, traveling, shopping, cooking, hosting or attending get togethers or worrying about holiday bills, relaxing during the holidays can be difficult. "Acute and chronic stress may contribute to high blood pressure. Relaxation techniques like deep breathing or taking a yoga class may help alleviate stress," Fida said. "Also,

understand your limits and don't aim for being perfect."

Exposure to germs Crowded malls, school plays, indoor parties and visiting relatives: It's no surprise that respiratory infections like colds and flu are more common during this time of year. "People

with heart disease have an increased risk for dying of complications from the flu, so if you haven't already gotten a flu shot, be sure

to get one now," Fida said. In addition, washing your hands frequently, getting enough sleep and making sure other family members are up to date on their vaccinations can also help to cut your risk. If you do get sick, be careful if you have high blood pressure and are taking cold medicines. Decongestants can raise your blood pressure.


