Hurricane Harvey's impact on healthcare

NORTHEAST HARRIS COUNTY - The U.S. Census indicates that this area of Harris County from Kingwood to Lynchburg went from 14% without health insurance to about 21% following Hurricane Harvey. This is generally thought to be a product of locals having to make the difficult choice of spend the money to have health or spend the money to restore living.

Recently leaders in the health field and Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia, along with other public officials, addressed the state of health in Harris County on November 13 talking

Commissioner Garcia announces Historic Public-Private partnership to monitor air quality in Harris County

\$1 million dollar grant to purchase air monitors and provide up-to-date air quality information

HARRIS COUNTY, TX December 17th, 2019 – This week Commissioner Adrian Garcia announced that Harris County and Precinct 2 will receive a \$1 million dollar grant from the American Chemistry Council Foundation (ACC) to purchase air quality monitors, more stringent data analysis and collaboration with industry partners. This is the first time the ACC Foundation has developed and awarded a local government grant for a community air-monitor-

ing network.
"This grant is a result of conversations that began

in the wake of a series of industrial incidents in Precinct 2. We learned how potentially vulnerable our industry partners were and that more needed to be done to ensure their success and not their failure," said Commissioner Adrian

access to reliable and timely air-quality data at all times, and especially during a chemical emergency. Thanks to this collaboration, the County will be able to address data and communications gaps to ensure residents have the information they need to make decisions about what actions to take for their families' wellbeing in the unfortunate event dangerous chemicals are released," he continued.

The joint effort of members of the East Harris County Manufacturers Association (EHCMA), Texas $Chemistry\ Council\ (TCC),$ American Chemistry Council (ACC) and Harris County will enhance the availability, transparency and interpretation of air monitoring data. The grant will support the following initiatives:

-The purchase of one stationary air monitor with gas chromatography capabilities. Estimated cost \$350k.

-Provide funds to support the ongoing engagement of the Houston Area Research Council to receive, analyze, interpret and communicate air-monitoring data in the event of significant safety events that could affect air quality. Estimated Cost: \$200k

-Provide funds to purchase handheld air monitors or other air monitoring equipment deemed appropriate to ture County air monitoring capabilities at key locations around the Houston Ship Channel. Estimated Costs: \$450k

"The chemical industry is deeply integrated into the communities and economies of Harris County. Our companies take their responsibility to be good neighbors very seriously. said Chris Jahn, President and CEO of ACC

"Local industry reached out to Commissioner Garcia soon after several incidents in the first quarter of 2019 and shared with him our commitment to learn from the events. In 2020 and beyond we will be strong safety performance

throughout the chemical industry and among our commercial partners including those in the transportation, distribution and storage sectors. We look forward to collaborating with Harris County, Precinct 2 and the citizens of east Harris County," added Jahn.

"Chemical manufacturers operating in Harris County have high standards of operational safety and environmental performance. Process Safety Management ideals and lessons learned have helped industry continuously improve safety performance over the past

Four years later a plea deal in kidnap murder

Of four men charged in the February 2015 murde of two Robert E. Lee High School students one has been convicted but recently another had accepted a plea deal from District Attorney Cheryl Lieck. Valentin Lazo, 32, ac-

cepted a plea that puts him in the penitentiary with a twenty five year sentence for his association with the murder of Alejandro Chavez, 18, and Jarvis Morgan, 17.

Also charged in the murder are Juan Jose Chavez.

21 and Brandon Flores, 23. The teens were shot to death allegedly after Lazo and Richard Gonzales, 25, wrestled a gun from Jarvis Morgan and subdued the teens, threw them into the trunk of Morgan's vehicle and drove the students to a remote location in Chambers County, the property of Juan Chavez's grandmother.

Lazo's role in the murder include the struggle

with the students, and using his truck to break open the locked gate at Chavez's grandmother's property. Lazo will likely get credit for the four years he has served in jail. But, the district attorney seems confi-dent that he will serve most of the twenty five years he has agreed to serve.

Meanwhile, Richard Gonzales is awaiting his trial scheduled for April of this year in the Chambers

County Jail. Last April District Attorney Lieck convicted Jose Juan Chavez of Capital Murder.

After flight to Mexico to avoid prosecution for the murder, Brandon Flores was extradited to Chambers County in 2018 in time to testify against his former friends.

Gonzales was no-billed by a grand jury but in 2017 Gonzales was sentenced to 13 and a half years in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon. Charges related to Gonzales going back into the store with the other charged suspects after the murders were committed.

The testimony of Bran-don Flores, charged with capital murder, that fled to Mexico after the murders has been crucial in the gathering of evidence in the case but has been born out by video and other evidence as to what all transpired in the kidnapping and mur-

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty – How Can We Change Social Security's Earnings Limit?

Dear Rusty: How do we change the Social Security earnings cap amount? Do I need to go through my Congressman? Social Security is withholding my benefit because they say I earned too much. The system is very unfair! Signed: Disgruntled Worker

Dear Disgruntled: The Social Security earnings test has been a part of Social Security's rules and regulations since the original Social Security Act of 1935. In fact, benefits were originally paid only if someone was not working at all, and if a beneficiary worked after they started collecting, they lost all benefits. The law has undergone changes over the years to bring it to where it is today, which is to limit the amount of earnings someone can have while collecting Social Security prior to their full retirement age before taking back some benefits.

If the earnings limit is exceeded, and you have not yet reached your full retirement age, Social Security typically withholds your benefits until they recover what you owe for exceeding the limit. The limit is adjusted annually based upon changes to the National Wage Index, and the annual limit for 2020 is \$18,240, up from \$17,640 last year. There is also a "first year rule" which will subject those who haven't vet reached their full retirement age and claim benefits mid-year to a monthly limit (1/12th of the annual limit) for the remainder of that year. The earnings limit increases significantly (by about 2.6 times) during the year you reach your full retirement age (FRA), and goes away entirely once your FRA is at-

As you are probably aware, exceeding the limit will cause Social Security to take back \$1 the limit, or if you're subject to the "first year rule" they will take back your entire benefit for any month you exceed the monthly limit. In the year you reach your FRA (but before your FRA) the "penalty" for exceeding the limit is less severe -\$1 for every \$3 over the limit. What you may not be aware of is that when you reach your full retirement age, Social Security will give you time credit for any months you did not receive benefits because

you exceeded the earnings limit and receiving that time credit at your FRA will result in your benefit being increased. For example, if, over the years before you reached vour FRA, Social Security withheld 12 months of benefits due to you exceeding the earnings limit, when you reach your full retirement age Social Security will recalculate your benefit to account for those 12 months by changing your claim date to 12 months later than when you actually applied. That will increase your benefit somewhat and, as a result, you may be able to eventually recoup some, or all, of the benefits which were withheld (depending upon your longevity).

How can we change the

earnings cap? Well, the

earnings limit already increases automatically each year with changes to the National Wage Index. But if you mean how can we eliminate it, I'm not optimistic that is possible since it would require full Congressional approval as well as Executive Branch approval to do so, and since Congress is now more focused on Social Security's broader issue of the Trust Fund being depleted in about 2035 (which will result in an across-the-board cut in benefits unless Congress acts sooner). Nevertheless, you should certainly feel free to bring your concerns about Social Security's "earnings cap" to the attention of your Congressional Representatives. Congressional Representatives are always willing to hear and understand the concerns of their constituents, and Social Security is very much a topic of discussion in Congress today.

Paxton lauds 5th Circuit ruling against Affordable Care Act

AUSTIN — After the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit declared the individual mandate in "Obamacare" unconstitutional on Dec. 18, Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton expressed his agreement.

agreement.
"The Fifth Circuit's holding is clear: the federal government cannot order private citizens to purchase subpar insurance products that they don't want." Paxton said. "The individual mandate is the centerpiece of Obamacare and I am glad the Fifth Circuit recognized that it is unlawful."

Paxton said he looks forward to demonstrating in federal district court that the rest of the law cannot stand without the individual mandate, and added:

"Yesterday's decision is a win for the rule of law," he said. "Finally being rid of this law will be a victory for all Americans."

ry for all Americans."

The lawsuit against the federal government was filed in U.S. District Court in the Northern District of Texas by Paxton and a list of other state attorneys general. Paxton said it would be up to the lower court to determine whether any part of the U.S. Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, referred to as "Obamacare," can remain, in light of the mandate's unconstitutionality.

In Texas and 38 other states where the federal government administers health exchanges, health insurance premiums rose an average of 105 percent from 2013 to 2017, Paxton said.

The U.S. Supreme

Court upheld Obamacare in 2012, but a majority of the justices agreed that the law's individual mandate was constitutional only because its accompanying tax penalty could justify forcing individuals to purchase health insurance under Congress' taxing ower. Devoid of that pen alty, Obamacare's individual mandate cannot be preserved as a tax, rendering Obamacare entirely unlawful, Paxton said.

Jobless rate stays low

The Texas Workforce Commission on Dec. 20 announced that the Lone Star State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady at 3.4% in November.

The rate marks the sixth consecutive month of record low unemployment in the state. Also, 3.4% is the lowest unemployment rate since series tracking began in 1976, according to an agency news release.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) recorded November's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.1%, followed by the Amarillo and Austin-Round Rock MSAs each with an adjusted rate of 2.5%. The College Station-Bryan and Lubbock MSAs each recorded the third lowest rate at 2.6%.

was partisan. All 23 Republicans voted not to approve both articles and all
13 Democrats voted to approve both articles.

As of the deadline for this column, the articles of impeachment had not been forwarded to the U.S. Senate, where the president would be tried in accordance with Article 3 of the U.S. Constitution, with the Honorable John Roberts, chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, presiding.

"They'll all be wearing sparkly clothes," she said, sounding dejected. "This is just black... not sparkly."

I almost said, "Sparkles are fun!" because they are—and because she sounded so sad that I wanted to say something to cheer her up. But I realized this was probably not the right thing to say so I stood silent, my back to the couple reviewing the unseen, unsparkled outfit that I suspected was going to be worn very soon.

"I think it will look good," the man said—rather unconvincingly, I thought.

The woman stood silent, holding the black garment, visualizing (I am quite sure) a room full of happy women in sparkly dresses.

She sighed. "Okay. Let's go." She took the black garment to the front counter without trying it on and moments later they were gone. They whole transaction took less than ten minutes and seemed completely void of holiday cheer.

I went home with my sparkly jeans and wore them out that night with an old friend. We stayed up late, laughing at the crazy things we had done together over the years and sharing crazy plans for the new year. But, after he was gone, for some reason I thought again of the unhappy woman I'd seen earlier in the day.

Piana also pointed out that industry is making private air monitoring data available to TCEQ and Harris County to ensure they have the data necessary to make informed decisions about public health and safety during industry events. The Houston Regional Monitoring network board approved providing monitoring data to Harris County during a

recent board meeting.

Industry members reinforced a commitment to work with Harris County and to develop a model that can be used in other jurisdictions in the region and across the nation.
"Industry values the

partnership with Harris County, especially Commissioner Garcia in Precinct 2 where many of our industry facilities operate," said Hector Rivero. President of TCC. BAYTOWN — (December 20, 2019) — Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital achieved a significant milestone this fall when colorectal surgeon Dr. Ziad Kronfol performed the hospital's 1,000th robotic surgical procedure.

Utilizing the da Vinci robotic surgical platform, Kronfol performed the minimally-invasive procedure on October 31 on a male colon cancer patient. Used by colorectal, general, cardiothoracic, obstetrics and gynecology and urologic surgeons at Hous-ton Methodist Baytown, robotic surgery procedures help reduce the risk of complications, pain and recovery time for patients.

"It was an honor to per-form the 1,000th robotic surgical procedure at Houston Methodist Baytown," Kronfol said, "Robotic procedures offer improved visualization and instrument articula-tion, which enables a more precise dissection and uti-lizes the smallest incisions possible. This allows the patient to recover faster and return to normal activities much faster than be-

In robotic surgery, the robot translates surgical

movements to perform fine, controlled maneuvers inside the body through very small incisions. The robot improves the dexterity of the surgeon's hand, allowing for complex operations to be performed with increased accuracy. The da Vinci platform provides 3D, high definition vision and utilizes four interactive mechanical arms.

Denise Martinez, Houston Methodist Baytown's director of perioperative services and the ambulatory surgery center, says the milestone procedure is a testament to the trust Baytown area patients have placed in the hospital's skilled surgeons.
"Our patients benefit

from the skill and exper-

tise of our surgeons' use of the da Vinci robotic system to perform minimally invasive procedures that allow for quicker recovery, which helps them return to their normal activities much

quicker," Martinez said. Bariatric surgeon Dr. Laura Choi, chair of Hous-ton Methodist Baytown's Robotic Committee, said surpassing the 1,000th procedure threshold is a celebration of the commitment the surgeons and the hospital have made to pro-viding unparalleled care to the community.
"The 1,000-case mile-

stone is important because it not only reflects the initial investment in this state-of-the-art technology by Houston Methodist Baytown, but the commitment of the surgeons and surgical teams to provide a value proven innovation to our community," Choi said. Resolve to End Joint Pain

BAYTOWN - (December 27, 2019) — Thousands of joint pain sufferers in the U.S. will find relief in 2020 thanks to technological advances that make total joint replacement surgery one of the most common orthopedic surgi-

cal procedures.
The American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS) reports more than 700,000 total knee replacement surgeries and nearly 400,000 total hip replacement procedures are performed each year in the U.S. If one of your New Year's resolutions is to be free from the agony of joint pain so you can get back to enjoying the things you love, Karthik Jonna, MD, orthopedic surgeon with the Houston Methodist Joint Pain Program at Baytown, says improve-ments in surgical techniques and artificial joint construction and materials make the procedures an effective option for combat-



The promise and temporary annoyance of Highway 99 coming in remains mysterious but overpasses are now visible. About a mile west of Texas 146 a concrete wall juts from a frontage road as one of three new segments of the Grand Parkway begins.

country aspect of this vicinity soon will bloom into neighborhoods. Work is about 30 percent completed on the three newest segments of 99, adding about 53 miles of tollway. It implies that FM 2100 in the northern section of Huffman will be calling for completion and construction delays near the Commons in the near future.

Certainly the traffic situation is going to get a lot worse before it gets better for commuters, a sure sign that growth is here, but preparation has not been accomplished.

about the economic impact and healthcare needs.

A survey provided a picture of Hurricane Harvey depriving locals of access to quality healthcare. In addition to the data and research on health care in Harris County the research suggests ways to improve it.

Some 32 Billion dollars was spent on unnecessary Emergency Room visits in America last year. Fifty-six percent of Hispanics are uninsured, four times the rate of whites and roughly three times that of blacks and Asians. Undocumented Hispanics accounted for only about six percent of the total

Life expectancy varies widely depending on which part of the county one lives and the population has superceded regional health care infrastructure. Life expectancy in Harris County is said to be about 78.7 years. But it may be as low as 65 or as high as 89 depending on where you

live in the county. It was found that obesi-

ty, high blood pressure and diabetes were most numerous chronic health prob-lems affecting county residents. Thirty-two percent meet the definition for obesity, 29 percent suffer from hypertension and 13 percent have diabetes.



But there is a difference of opinion between private enterprise and county government as to what the nature of insurance problems are.

Freddy Warner, Chief Government Relations Officer at Memorial Her-mann Health System, sees solutions to the healthcare industry somewhat differently but all agree uninsured contributes to an overall problem by driving

up costs.
In 2018, close to 5 million uninsured people lived in Texas, about 17.7% of the population, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. The uninsured rate in Harris County was 22% compared to a national uninsured rate of 8.5%.

According to Warner, "I think that it's important for the business community to understand some of the fiscal dynamics that underpin healthcare policy at the federal level and also at the state level. I think it's important for people to understand the challenges that health-care providers, hospitals, physicians have in serving a state and serving a re gion that has such a high percentage of uninsured.

Warner said the focus should be on expanding healthcare to provide access and lower the costs of care so that there are better ways to prevent emerand provide health care.
