Schools, businesses and public events were closed last Friday, due to a water main break on the east side of Houston in a line that fed about half the city Houston ISD schools, colleges and many businesses were also closed, or events cancelled, as a precaution against contaminated water or low water pressure. The City of Houston issued a "Boil Water" notice for most of the city

Water districts on the East side of the county, including Crosby, Highlands, and Baytown, did not experience any pressure or supply problems. Crosby gets its water directly from Lake Houston.



repair work on a small leak, according to authorities, when the whole pipe burst open flooding nearby streets and the six lane East Loop under Clinton Drive. Several feet of water covered the streets, stopping traffic and flood-ing about a dozen cars. Houston Fire Department said they conducted three deep water rescues. The location of the burst pipe was near the intersection of Clinton Drive and N. Carolina streets in the Clinton Park neighbor-hood, and buildings in that area had water inside, as outside it was several feet

Water supply and water pressure were affected throughout the east side of Houston and into midtown. Schools and businesses were forced to close without water, and many indicated they would also be closed on Friday, until the pipe could be repaired

and water quality restored. Jacinto City avoided the problem by switching from city water supply to its own well system, filling the city water tower and maintaining pressure and a safe water supply, according to City Manager Lon

Squyres. Authorities held a press conference at 6100 Clinton Drive, near the break, to inform the public of the severity of the problem and what measures were being taken to solve them. May or Turner and County Judge Hidalgo expressed concern about water quality, and availability of ade-quate pressure in case of fires. Tank trucks with water were being sent to the area as a precaution, they said.





Babin urges federal agencies to proactively prevent spread of Coronavirus

WASHINGTON, DC -January 29, 2020 - U.S. Congressman Brian Babin (TX-36) sent the following letter to Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar urging the Administration to take every precaution necessary to ensure the protection of American citizens – including possibly shutting down air travel to the U.S. from China:

Dear Secretary Azar,

I write to you today to urge you to take action to inhibit the spread of the Wuhan coronavirus, which at this time has infected more than 6,000, killed more than 100, and $\begin{array}{c} \text{spread across three} \\ \text{continents.} \end{array}$

Unfortunately, these

numbers merely represent what we currently know about the virus, when in reality the statistics may be much worse. As China did with the SARS virus epidemic in 2002 and 2003, which killed nearly 800 people worldwide and infected more than 8,000, Chinese authorities once again have suppressed information regarding the Wuhan coronavirus on Chinese social media channels and in the international community, downplaying the numbers of infected and admitting the severity of the contagion only after being forced to recognize that human-tohuman transmission of the disease was possible. Therefore, I would caution you and your department against taking the official statistics and calls for "openness and transpar-

ency" from the Chinese

the Party's abysmal record on conveying information to the global community that could threaten its power or international image.

As of last night, some

200 Americans were evacuated from mainland China after passing initial health screenings and made it safely to Alaska, where they were screened by technicians from U.S. Centers for Disease Control, I have complete confidence in America's doctors and scientists and know that we are doing all we can to produce an effective vaccine, but I urge you to be proactive in your efforts to stop the spread of this disease. In addition to screening all travelers from the People's Republic of China, I hope you emu-late Australia and the U.K. in mandating a twoweek quarantine for individuals who could have been exposed to the coronavirus, and consider banning entry to the U.S. to those traveling from China.

When the safety of our citizens is threatened by the possibility of a global epidemic, no options for prevention can be left off the table. It is crucial that we work effectively and ardently both with our allies internationally and within our own country to prevent the rapid spread of this virus.

I thank you for your attention to this matter and your vigilant endeavors to protect the American people and global health.

Governor gives update on actions to combat coronavirus

AUSTIN — As the worldwide threat of novel coronavirus increased, state agencies already were working together to ensure the health and safety of all Texans, Gov. Greg Abbott said Feb. 27.

After a briefing from state and federal health officials on coronavirus (COVID-19), Abbott provided an update on steps the state is taking. He said the Department of State Health Services has activated the State Medical Operations Center to serve as a touchpoint for any requests from local entities. The center also ensures consistent collection, tracking and reporting of public health

activities and data. Also, DSHS is preparing state laboratories with testing capabilities for the novel coronavirus and is updating public health response plans in the event of the spread of the virus. Abbott said multi-level and multiagency coordination and communication efforts are practiced daily to ensure up-to-date information is flowing between federal, state and local

Furthermore, DSHS is coordinating with the Texas Department of Emergency Management, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Medical Assouniversity systems to provide educational materials and the latest developments in research and treatment methods for the virus

And, relevant agencies will implement disinfecting measures at places such as driver license offices and schools and ensure that high-risk populations such as those in day-care centers, nursing homes, assisted living associations and healthcare facilities are prepared and properly cared for, Abbott said.

trol and Prevention has confirmed multiple cases of COVID-19 in people under federal quarantine at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland. The first was a traveler who re-turned on a U.S. State Department-chartered flight from Wuhan City, China. The others re turned on a State Department flight for passengers from the Diamond Princess cruise ship quarantined Yokohama, Japan. The individuals will remain isolated at medical facilities until they test negative for the virus and are no longer at risk of spreading it. The CDC has the latest information on the number of people under quarantine who are infected and is updating its national numbers each Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

New cards being issued

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Feb. 27 announced that it is now issuing redesigned, tamper-resistant Texas driver's licenses, identification cards and license-to-carry cards.

The cards have a new look with an updated design and enhanced secu-rity features. The driver's license and ID cards also have visible and discrete identifiers on the front.

The DPS said that previously issued driver's licenses are still valid until the expiration date listed on the card and, beginning Oct. 1, travelers will need a valid passport, U.S. military ID or a REAL ID compli-Meanwhile, the U.S. ant driver's license (one with the gold star) to



travel on commercial airlines or enter federal fa-

Paxton welcomes ruling Texas Attorney Gener-

al Ken Paxton_on Feb. 26 applauded a federal district court ruling holding that a 1998 comprehensive settlement agreement with R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company and other tobacco companies stands and the agreed payments to the state for smoking-related healthcare costs must be enforced.

The U.S District Court for the Eastern District of Texas rejected Reynolds' argument that selling acquired brands included in the settlement nullified its obligation to Texas taxpayers, declaring that "Reynolds remains as liable today as it was when it entered into the Texas Settlement in 1998.

"I applaud the court for holding tobacco companies accountable to the $terms\ of\ the\ settlement\ to$ which they agreed. Texas taxpayers are owed substantial back payments and we will not allow any company to shirk their obligations to the people of this state," said Paxton. "No matter how large the company or how long the fight, my office will continue to fight for the compensation that taxpayers are owed."

Vaping case count: 250

The Department of State Health Services on Feb. 25 reported some 250 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who used e-cigarettes before developing symptoms. Four of them have died.

Patients range in age from 13 to 75 years old with a median age of 22 years. About one-quarter of the people affected in Texas are minors. Threequarters are male and nine in 10 report vaping THC or marijuana possi-bly in conjunction with other substances. Almost all patients were hospitalized and the DSHS said many required intensive

Learn your risk of colorectal cancer

BAYTOWN — (Febru-cancer may be the third most commonly diagnosed cancer and the second leading cause of cancer death in both men and women in the U.S., but if detected early, it has a very high survival rate.

With March designated as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, Dr. Ziad Kronfol, a colorectal surgeon at Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital says this is the perfect time to schedule a screening test to detect the disease. He says finding the cancer as early as possible is essential to preventing it from developing into a potentially deadly condition.

"Through screening tests such as colonoscopy, polyps can be found and removed before they be-come cancerous," Kronfol said. "Colorectal cancer generally develops from polyps in the colon or rectum. If a cancer is found during screening, the earlier it is found the greater the chance it can be surgically removed laparoscopically with small incisions.

While screening methods are readily available and reliable, according to the Health Resources and Services Administration. fewer than half of adults







ter the person.
Board Policy states that a district facility be named for a deceased person who has attained prominence locally and/or nationally in the fields of education, science, art, statesmanship, political science, or military achievement; an early pioneer of the area encompassed by Goose

Creek CISD or the state of Texas; or an outstanding president of the United States. The policy also says that students and other citizens shall be called upon to nominate persons

representing all cultures that may be considered for school names.
Guidelines for naming facilities in Board Policy state that the nominee must have made a significant contribution to society

or the school district, and

the name should lend pres-

tige and status to an insti-

tution of learning.
As part of the naming process, the Goose Creek CISD Board of Trustees will hold a Public Forum either immediately before the April 8 board meeting or on a separate date de-pending on the number of nominations received by March 27. The forum will allow community members to present their suggestions for the naming of the new junior school, but all nominations received in

writing will be considered by the board.

During the forum, presentations will be limited to three minutes per person, with no more than five individuals speaking per nomination. Board members will consider the name for the school at the Board Meeting May 4,
