Oil pollutes Crosby waterways



Those voters should expect to start receiving the applications in their mailboxes this week. To receive a mail. ballot for the July 14 Primary Runoff Elections. voters must complete their applications and return them promptly by July 2

(received, not postmarked) "All registered voters 65and older are eligible to vote by mail," said Harris County Clerk Chris Hollins. "Our goal is to keep our voters 65 and up safe amid the current health crisis by giving them the opportunity to vote from

Once applications are received and approved, mail ballots are sent to voters no later than the seventh calendar day after applications are received.

524,219 people voted in the March 2020 Primary Elections. Of those, 53,910 voted by mail.

CHAMBERS COUNTY, June 8, 2020 – Chambers County, along with other counties in our 16 County region, continues to see increases in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations We have reported 15 new cases in one week (22% increase), and 40 new cases since Texas began the reopening process May 1st (93% increase). Three of the new cases in the past week are pediatric cases, which should cause us to take pause and re-evaluate our current activities and hygiene practices.

Public Health would like to urge you to minimize activities outside of the home, as we should remain vigilant and take steps to protect our families, coworkers. neighbors, first responders, and ourselves. Take an honest self-assessment before outside of the home. Know if you are healthy enough to leave home, or if you might fall into a high-risk category.

Continue to practice protective measures! Social distancing, wearing masks, handwashing, and cleaning of surfaces will help reduce the transmission of the virus. All positive cases are thoroughly investigated by the Public Health Epidemiology Team, and cases are isolated at home for the monitoring period. Those identified during case investigations to be at possible risk of contact. exposure, or infection are contacted for further case investigation. Managing pregnancy during a pandemic

BAYTOWN - (June 5. 2020) — It's not unusual for expectant mothers to be preoccupied with a million questions. In addition to all the usual concerns during pregnancy, there are new concerns about how to reduce the risk of COVID-19.

Learning how to protect vourself and your baby can help you be calm and confident as you navigate pregnancy and childbirth.

Dr. Paul Redman, obstetrician-gynecologist at the Houston Methodist Childbirth Center at Baytown, understands the stress new mothers are going through during this challenging time. He provides answers to some common questions about preparing for a healthy and safe birth experience.

Q: What can I do to protect against COVID-19 during

A: You can prevent illness by avoiding people who are sick and limiting social contact with others. especially in large groups. Avoid public spaces and protect yourself and others by keeping a safe distance. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily and continue to be extra vigilant about hand washing.

Q: Should I continue with prenatal care visits?

A: It's important to stay on track with your prenatal visits. Some of your prenatal care visits may be done virtually, which allows you to see your doctor while staying at home. In-person visits are needed for ultrasounds, fetal testing and blood work.

Q: Is it safe to give birth in a hospital?

A: The Houston Methodist Childbirth Center at Baytown has protections in place to provide a safe and secure birth experi-

ence. There's an essential visitor policy that allows maternity, postpartum and NICU patients to have one healthy partner or parent. All patients and essential visitors are screened for elevated temperatures and other symptoms before entering the hospital and are required to wear a mask. All staff members use safe social distancing best practices and wear protective gear when interacting with you and your baby. Mothers and babies stay together in the same room, and vour baby's routine care will be provided in the same room.

Q: Why choose a hospital birth over a home birth or other setting?

A: Having your baby in a hospital gives you peace of mind knowing that if complications arise, you and your baby are in good hands with physicians and nurses trained to handle complex cases. In a hospital setting, you'll have the support you need during a critical time for you and your baby.

Q: Should I consider

breastfeeding? A: Breast milk protects against many illnesses and provides all the nutrition most infants need. If you're worried about breastfeeding after being sick with COVID-19, talk to your doctor. In early studies, COVID-19 has not been detected in breast milk, but researchers are still learning more.

Q: What should I do if I'm having trouble breastfeeding?

A: If you choose to breastfeed your baby, you'll have breastfeeding support from a lactation consultant if you need help getting started. After you go home, a lactation nurse can consult with you over the phone or on video conference to address any challenges with feeding your baby.

Social Security Matters

How Do I Apply with Social Security Offices Closed?

Dear Rusty: I am 64 years old and would like advice on how to move forward to apply for Social Security now instead of waiting until I am the "magic" age of 66.5 years. Signed:

Ready for Retirement Dear Ready for Retirement: All Social Security offices are currently closed to public visits, but they are still providing (although telephone wait times are usually longer these days). You can apply over the phone if you wish. However, the most efficient way to apply for your Social Security benefit, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, is to apply online. You will need to create your personal "My Social Security" account prior to apply ing online, but that is easy to do at www.ssa.gov/myaccount. For information, Social Security uses a "two-factor" identification process for securi-

ty purposes, usually by asking you to enter, in addition to your password, a special ID code sent to your cell phone (or email).. Once you have set up your personal account, you can use the online application process at www.ssa.gov/retire. Here is a link to a short video from Social Security which ex-

plains the online application process: www.ssa.gov/hlp/video/ iclaim_r01.htm. When you start the online process, be sure to write down the reentry code, which will allow you to save and reenter your online application as many times as needed before you finally submit it. Once it is submitted,

Social Security will call you or write you to get any additional information they need. A couple of things I want to be sure you are aware of:

By claiming before your full retirement age (FRA) your benefit amount will be permanently reduced. The reduction is about 0.556% per month prior to your FRA that you claim (at 64, a reduction of about 15%).

Finally, if you are still working, you'll be subject to Social Security's earnings test until you reach your full retirement age. If you start benefits midyear 2020, you'll be earnings limit of \$1520, and if you exceed that limit you won't be eligible for benefits for that month. The following years you'll be subject to an annual limit, until you reach your FRA when there is no longer a limit to how much you can earn.

Storm preparations begin while state continues to *battle COVID-19*

 $\begin{array}{c} {\rm AUSTIN-As\ Tropical} \\ {\rm Storm\ Cristobal\ moved} \end{array}$ north in the Gulf of Mexico from the Yucatan Peninsula toward Louisiana, the weather system's potential impact on East Tex-as grew and Gov. Greg Abbott on June 5 addressed the situation in a news conference.

Abbott said preparedness is the key in any hurricane season. He added that the Texas Department of Emergency Management and a roster of state agency departments, local responders and FEMA were ready. Meanwhile, he said, the state's ongoing efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 also continue and East Texas residents in particular should be extra mindful of both threats.

Cumulative figures posted June 6 by the Texas Department of State Health Services showed that some 74,978 people in Texas had been diagnosed with COVID-19 and 1,830 deaths resulting from the virus pandemic had been confirmed.

Officially, hurricane sea son started June 1 and will continue through Nov. 30. While Cristobal is not expected to generate hurri-cane-force winds, it may bring high winds, heavy rain and flooding.

State extends SNAP

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission will provide approximately \$177 million in emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program food benefits for the month of June in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Gov. Abbott announced

More than 900,000 SNAP households will see the additional amount on their Lone Star Card by June 12. The emergency June allotments are in addition to the \$414.7 million in benefits previously provided to Texans in April and May, Abbott added.

Church Street and 655 feet to the south along the San Jacinto River Authority's clean water basin.

Precinct One Investigators, working with Harris County Pollution Control and the San Jacinto River Authority, spent the day using an excavator to search for that source. They believe the perpetrator buried barrels or containers of oil on the property repeatedly over an extended period of time. possibly years. Investigators characterize the size and volume of the contamination as one of the largst and most significant they have ever worked.

The Harris County District Attorney's office allowed a search warrant.

That warrant was executed Monday at the property of Wesley Zarsky. This allowed investigators to dig and take samples from the soil. Those samples will undergo chemical analysis. If investigators can prove the chemical on the property is in fact what has been seeping in the ditches, they can seek criminal charges based on findings identifying the substance and the source of the pol-lution. No suspects have been named in the investi-gation as yet. No one is currently charged or in custody, however the investigation is still underway.

A temporary restraining order is in place forcing the owner of the property to begin clean up and not to dump anything more on the property.

Investigators estimate clean up costs already have

surpassed \$1 million. "It's not right. People do not deserve to have contaminated soil and water nearby," said Constable Alan Rosen, "It's just not going to be tolerated."

Ruptured barrels of oil are buried deep in the ground layer upon layer on the property but it is still not clear who placed the

barrels there. Some locals believe that if one finds oil on their property that some industrial entity will haul it away for free but that is not the case and used oil disposition can be expen-

Constable Rosen said at the location, "You can smell it, you can see it and it is oozing out of the ground as

TCEQ to monitor Air Quality in area by using sensor equipped helicopters

Precinct 2 Community Liaison Cindy Miller reports that two helicopters, a black one (tail number N808LL and a white one with yellow & black stripes (tail number N300AR), will be flying in our area from May 18th through June 30th, sometimes at very low altitudes and at length over various areas and companies

The helicopters are a part of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) aerial survev for air emissions. The helicopters are equipped with a specialized infrared camera that can image volatile organic compounds (VOC) and other hydrocarbons invisible to the eye. VOCs pose serious health hazards and sight of these helicopters attempting to identify the sources of the VOC's in our area should be a welcomed event. Included are photos of the helicopters for your help in identifying them when they are in your area.

VOC are a class of compounds present in $% \left\{ 1,2,...,n\right\}$ common things like gasoline and solvents. VOC can combine with nitrogen oxides in the presence of sunlight to form ground-level

The helicopter will perform surveys over and around petrochemical operations and other industrial type facilities. During these surveys the helicopter may hover and fly a path over and around a facility or area multiple times in a manner that allows for the collection of $% \left\{ 1,2,...,n\right\}$ images and other information on potential emission sources. The helicopter may fly a non-grid style search pattern over some areas to avoid tall structures. At times the helicopter may fly or hover at an altitude as low as 250 feet above ground.

The helicopter flights are scheduled to conclude by June 30, 2020

Governor announces phase III to open Texas

Greg Abbott today announced the third phase of the State of Texas' plan to safely open the economy while containing the spread of COVID-19. Under Phase III, effective im-mediately, all businesses in Texas will be able to operate at up to 50% capacity, with very limited exceptions. Business that previously have been able to operate at 100% capacity may continue to do so, and most outdoor areas are not subject to capacity limits. All businesses and customers should continue to fol-low minimum standard health protocols laid out by the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS).

As with previous phases, the Phase III plan is based on the advice and support of the four doctors on the Strike Force to Open Texas medical team. Via Texas medical team. Via Executive Order, Phase III

begins immediately.
"The people of Texas continue to prove that we can safely and responsibly open our state for business open our state for business while containing COVID19 and keeping our state safe," said Governor Abbott. "As anticipated, the new positive cases that we are seeing are largely the result of isolated hot spots in the same said. in nursing homes, jails, and meat packing plants. Thanks to the effectiveness of our Surge Response Teams, we have the ability to contain those hot spots while opening up Texas for business. As we begin

Phase III, I ask all Texans and Texas businesses to continue following the standard health protocols and to heed the guidance of our state and federal of-ficials who continue to closely monitor COVID-19."

Between May 26th and June 2nd, over 45% of new cases came from jails or prisons, meat packing plants and nursing homes. There are currently 1,487 Texans hospitalized due to COVID-19. There are 20,679 active cases in the state and 45,858 Texans are estimated to have recovered.

Effective June 3:

All businesses current-ly operating at 25% capac-ity can expand their occupancy to 50% with certain exceptions.

Bars and similar establishments may increase their capacity to 50% as long as patrons are seated.

Amusement parks and carnivals in counties with less than 1,000 confirmed positive cases may open at 50% capacity.

Restaurants may ex nand their maximum table size from 6 to 10 persons.

Effective June 12:

Restaurants may expand their occupancy lev-

Counties with 10 or less active COVID-19 cases may expand their occupancy limits to 75%. Counties that fit this category but have not previously filed

Amusement parks and carnivals in counties with more than 1,000 confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 may open at 50% capacity.

Additional Openings:

Special provisions have been made for outdoor gatherings, such as Fourth of July celebrations, but it is imperative that local officials and public health ficials and public health officials collaborate on safe standards. These provi-sions are included in the Governor's Executive Order and are also available on the Open Texas webpage.
