County mandates masks; Governor refuses statewide order

As hospital admissions for COVID-19 continue to Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo signed an order requiring businesses to generate, post, and implement health and safety policies which include, at a mini-mum, a requirement that workers, customers or visitors wear face coverings. The order took effect on Monday, June 22, 2020 and runs until Tuesday, June 30, 2020.

The order directs all commercial entities pro-viding goods or services to require that all employees or visitors to a business premise wear face cover-

ings in areas that involve any proximity to co-work-ers or the public. Face coverings may include homemade masks, scarfs, bandanas, or a handkerchief. Commercial entities must post the health and safety policy in a conspicuous location sufficient to provide notice to employ-ees and visitors of all health and safety requirements.

"There's no magic wand government can wave to make this virus go away. but we can take steps to ensure that we provide our community with the guidance and tools it needs to fight back," said Harris

County Judge Lina Hidalgo. "This isn't just the right thing to do for our health and safety, it's also good for business. We owe it to our community to ensure that those who do have to go out can have the confidence in knowing that the businesses they are patronizing are looking out for their customers, workers, and com-

munity as a whole."

Stay on scheduled with your mammogram

BAYTOWN — (June 18, 2020) — Normal life has been turned upside down by the pandemic, requiring all of us to adjust routines and reschedule events. But there's one self-care activity that should not be rescheduled — getting an annual mammogram. It's important to contin-

ue the focus on combatting COVID-19 without losing sight of the ongoing war against other major health threats. The statistics on COVID-19 are shifting every day, and it's unclear how we may be affected in the future. Ask Rusty – SSDI Denied; Will Claiming Early Hurt Spouse or Survivor Benefits?

Dear Rusty: I applied for Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits and was denied. So, because l turn 62 this month, I plan to file for my early SS retirement benefits. Since I've not worked a lot due to health issues I won't get much and I realize my benefit will be reduced by about 30% from my full retirement age amount, but we need the extra income to help with my husband is 57 and still works. Social Security will be our only retirement so he will be working for as long as he can. My question is, how will my early retirement affect any spousal benefits I might qualify for in the future? Or my widow's benefits if he should die before I do? Signed: Worried

Dear Worried: Claiming your own SS

benefit at age 62 will cause your spousal benefit to be less when your spouse benefit starts (when your husband claims). That's because your spousal benefit will be in the form of a "spousal boost" which will be added to the reduced SS benefit $\,$ you will get by filing at age 62. The amount of your spousal boost will depend upon how old you are when your husband claims (which is when your spousal benefit kicks in). If you've reached your full retirement age (FRA) of 66 years and 8 months. your spousal boost will be the difference between 1) your SS retirement benefit amount at your FRA (regardless of when you claimed) and 2) half (50%) of the benefit your husband is entitled to at his FRA (regardless of when he claims). At your FRA you get the full amount of the spousal boost; but taken before your FRA the spousal boost will be actuarially reduced according to the number of months prior to FRA spousal boost is added to the benefit you are already receiving, you claiming your reduced

benefits at age 62 means your spousal benefit will also be reduced. But your spousal benefit (while your husband is living) is entirely different from your survivor benefit if your husband dies before you.

As your husband's widow, provided you have reached your FRA you will get 100% of the amount he was receiving (or entitled to receive) at his death, instead of your smaller benefit from claiming at age 62. In other words, that you claimed your own benefit at 62 doesn't affect vour survivor benefit. But if the survivor benefit is claimed before you reach your full retirement age it will be reduced due to claiming it early (the reduction is about 4.75% for each year early). Note that you do not have to claim the survivor benefit immediately; you may wait to claim until it reaches maximum at your FRA.


One final point: Statistically, about 2/ 3rds of all initial SSDI disability applications are denied. If you believe strongly that you've been unfairly denied, you can appeal that denial, even if you go ahead and claim your own SS benefit at age 62. To appeal the SSDI denial you should submit form SSA-561 -Request for Reconsideration, which you can find at this link: vww.ssa.gov/forms/ssa-561.html.

Governor, education commissioner say schools will open in fall

AUSTIN — While COV-ID-19 testing, contact trac-ing, case counts, hospitalizations and hospitalizations and deaths increased last week, more and more Texans ventured out of their homes with the deadly coronavirus showing no sign of abatement.

Gov. Greg Abbott recent-ly renewed his COVID pandemic disaster declara tion for all counties affect ed by the disease. Even so. Abbott and Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath on June 18 sounded a hopeful note, saying schools would resume normal operations in the fall. "It will be safe for Texas public school students, teachers and staff to re-turn to school campuses for in-person instruction this fall, but there will also be flexibility for families with health concerns so that their children can be educated remotely, if the parent so chooses," said Morath, adding that de-tailed guidance would be

issued soon. Texas State Teachers Association President Noel Candelaria reacted, saying teachers and other school employees "need to be di-rectly involved in planning for the safe reopening of school facilities" and a rush to reopen schools puts at risk the health and safety of millions of Texas school children, educators, families and communities.

Cumulative figures posted June 21 by the Texas Department of State Health Services showed some 111,601 people in Texas diagnosed with COVID-19 and 2,182 confirmed deaths resulting from the disease

Meanwhile, Gov. Abbott and Dr. John Zerwas, University of Texas System executive vice chancellor for health affairs, on June 16 said the Lone Star State's hospital capacity can accommodate an uptick in COVID-19 cases. Texas Department of State Health Services Commissioner John Hellerstedt and Texas Division of Emergency Management Chief Nim Kidd joined Abthe announcement.

Juneteenth gains momentum

Protest marches in Texas and other states continued last week, following the May 25 killing of Texan George Floyd by Minneapolis police. Marches in the Lone

Star State and elsewhere incorporated the Black Lives Matter movement. The marchers also called attention to Juneteenth, the annual celebration that memorializes the June 19, 1865, announcement by Union Army Gen. Gordon Granger in Galveston that slavery was banned and all slaves were set free

Until then, news of President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, signed Jan. 1, 1863, and the fact that the war ended on April 9, 1965, had been withheld from the estimated 250,000 slaves then in Texas.

Gov. Abbott, in a June 19

Twitter posting wrote, "Today marks the 155th anniversary of the date that news of the Emancipation Proclamation arrived in Texas We celebrate and recognize the freedom Juneteenth represents. Texas continues to stand for liberty for all."

U.S. Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee, D-Houston, authored a resolution that was re-ferred to the House Committee on Oversight and Reform on June 19. The legislation, cosponsored by 207 representatives, would make "Juneteenth Independence Day" a national observance. U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, offered a similar resolution cosponsored by 57 senators.

Paxton reacts to DACA ruling

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton expressed his disappointment with the U.S. Supreme Court's June 18 ruling to uphold the Obama administration's 2012 Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals pro-

The case, Department of Homeland Security et al. v. Regents of the University of California et al., was brought to the high court via the San Francisco-based 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

Paxton said he looks forward to litigating the same issue, the constitutionality of the Obama administra-tion's action creating the program, in a case now pending in a South Texas U.S. district court

As of Dec. 31,2019, some 107,000 Texans were counted by the federal gov-ernment as DACA recipients, meaning they have applied and been cleared to reside in the U.S.

decreases The Texas Workforce Commission on June 19 announced that in the month of May, the Lone Star State's unemployment rate dropped slightly to 13.0%, the first decrease recorded since March, when COVID-19 sent a robust economy on a downward trajectory.

During May, Texas added 291,000 private-sector positions led by the leisure and hospitality sector, followed by the education and health services sector and the trade-transportationutilities sector.

Among Texas' Metropolitan Statistical Areas, the Amarillo MSA recorded May's lowest unemployment rate with a non-sea sonally adjusted rate of 8.5%, followed by the College Station-Bryan MSA with a rate of 8.6% and Abilene MSA with a rate of







spike in new cases.

Both Abbott and Fauci have emphasized that the simple wearing of face masks, washing hands of-ten, and keeping a social distance away from others are effective means to curtail the virus.

In spite of this, Abbott has not wanted to issue a mandatory order for these measures, but did allow local governments to implement them within businesses, as done by Harris

Abbott said "Closing down Texas again will always be the last option."
