Digital Access Program provides Computer Devices and Hotspots

Keeping our children home from school is a smart move to protect them from COVID-19, but many Harris County families don't have the means to get their kids connected virtually and learning online. In Texas, one in four students do not have devices at home for virtual learning, and 34% of these students lack adequate access to the internet. 66% of these students are African-American, Hispanic, or Native

To begin to address these substantial inequalities, Harris County Commissioners Court approved the creation of the Digital Access Program in early August. The program designates \$32 million in Federal Cares Act dollars to provide 82,000 WiFi hotspots and 211,000 devices to families in need. Harris County will partner with Texas Education Agency's "Operation Connectivity" and T-Mobile's "Project 10 Million" for distribution of the devices and hotspots, respectively.

COVID-19 Relief Fund Distributes Funds to Over 20k Households

The Harris County COVID-19 Relief Fund is in the process of distributing its final grants and is close to completion. The \$30 million fund opened its application in late June for the most vulnerable residents of Harris County suffering the financial effects of COVID-19. Over the span of two days, the fund hosted 1,898,555 sessions on its website (including visitors who visited the website multiple times), and assisted 24,136 people over the phone. All \$30 million has been released to intermediary organizations to distribute to families, and 20,618 households have been served by the fund to date. An estimated 400 to 450 additional families will receive re-granted funds that could not be distributed. A final count of all families served, as well as an evaluation and assessment of the program will be available in October.

Families looking for COVID-19 related assistance are encouraged to call the 211 Texas/United Way helpline to find an organization in their geographic region. A tax rate of 0.050000 per \$100 valuation has been proposed by the governing body of Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2020 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for Harris County Emergency Services District 50 from the same properties in both the 2019 tax year and the 2020 tax year.

The voter-approval tax rate is the highest tax rate that Harris County Emergency Services District 50 may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate, unless the de minimis rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50 exceeds the voter-approval tax rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

The de minimis rate is the rate equal to the sum of the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50, the rate that will raise \$500,000, and the current debt rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that Harris County Emergency Services District 50 is proposing to increase property taxes for the 2020 tax year.

A public hearing on the proposed tax rate will be held on October 05, 2020 at 6:00 PM at 1210 Dell Dale Avenue, Channelview, Harris

The proposed tax rate is greater than the voter-approval tax rate, but not greater than the de minimis rate. However, the proposed tax rate exceeds the rate that allows voters to petition for an election under Section 26.075, Tax Code. If Harris County Emergency Services District 50 adopts the proposed tax rate, the qualified voters of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 may petition the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 to require an election to be held to determine whether to reduce the proposed tax rate. If a majority of the voters reject the proposed tax rate, the tax rate of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 will be to -approval tax rate of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

Goose Creek forms study group instead of name change

marathon 8 hour school board meeting last Wednesday night, Sept. 9, the Goose Creek CISD board decided not to change the name of the Robert E. Lee High School until a study committee from the community made a recommendation.
The vote not to rename

the school was 4 to 3, and to set up a study committee 5 to 0 with two absten-

The vote came after the board listened to about 51speakers giving their views. 27 of these favored no change, 21 wanted the name removed, and 3 others spoke otherwise. Board chair Jessica

Woods told this newspaper that the study committee would consist of about 30 community members. Their report will not come until late in the school year

she thought.
A poll by the local newspaper in Baytown has indicated that 73% of the people do not want a name change, because of the heritage and reputation of the school, not because it hon-ored a Civil War Southern general. 27% were in favor of a name change.

The high school currently has an ethnicity of 71% Hispanic, 14% Black, and 12% White.

Opponents of the name change have pointed out that the cost in signage and uniforms to change the name would be between \$150,000 to \$400,000 and thought the money should be allocated to other needs.

Chambers County rescinds tax vote

NO TAX INCREASE Commissioners Court Rescinds Order Which Provided the Option of Increasing the Voter-Approval Tax Rate

CHAMBERS COUNTY On September 8, 2020 Chambers county Commissioners Court voted to rescind an order passed in July which authorized the calculation of the voterapproval tax rate at up to 8% for disaster relief.

The court plans to adopt a No-New-Revenue Rate of 0.539490/\$100 to fund the 2021 Chambers County Budget at the next meet-ing of Commissioners Court on September 22, 2020.

"We are pleased to provide a tax decrease for the coming tax year," said Chambers County Judge Jimmy Sylvia. "Commissioners Court is committed to doing all that we can to avoid placing undue financial burden on our citizens as we continue to fight this global pandemic. Chambers County will continue to work hard to provide a balance of superior County services and low taxes to the communities that we

Two Baytown policemen indicted by **Grand Jury in separate incidents**

Baytown Police Officer indicted for Assault in videotaped arrest

A Harris County grand jury last week indicted a Baytown Police officer who was fired for striking a by-stander who was with a person recording video of a traffic stop. Nathaniel Brown was

indicted for Assault, which is a Class A Misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and/or a \$4,000

fine.
"The grand jury has made clear that our com-munity won't tolerate unnecessary violence by

anyone including police officers," Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg said. "We need one stan-dard for everyone and the law must be applied equally in order for people to continue to believe in our justice system."

Brown, a nine-year veteran of the Baytown PD, was fired after the incident on June 2. The confrontation began when Brown and other officers were arresting the driver of a Mercedes-Benz sedan who stopped outside Baytown Market, a convenience store at 2900 Market St. in Baytown.

Grand Jury Indicts Baytown Police Officer for Aggravated Assault in Pamela Turner's shooting

A Harris County grand jury indicted Baytown Police Officer Juan Delacruz Monday for the death of 44-year-old Pamela Turner.

The charge is aggravated assault by a public servant, a first-degree felony that carries a punishment of five

years to life in prison.
"Pam Turner's killing was a tragedy; it is important to acknowledge that her family and the community are in pain," Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg said.

"Every aspect of the case was independently investi-gated by the Texas Rangers and our Civil Rights Division prosecutors. Ultimately, we presented all of the evidence to a grand jury that determined the Baytown Police of-ficer should be charged with a crime for his actions when he shot Ms. Turner. We respect their decision and we will be moving forward with prosecution," Ogg said.

The incident began when the officer approached Turner in the apartment complex in the 1600 block of Garth Road where they both resid-

HMB Advanced procedure prevents amputation

BAYTOWN — (September 10, 2020) - Herbert Lewis knew the ankle wound causing great discomfort was not normal, but he had no idea of the

danger it posed.

The pain and stubborn refusal of the wound to heal caused the 70-year old Louisiana native and Davton resident to visit the emergency department on two occasions. However, by November 2019, the entire area over his Achilles tendon was necrotic due to lack of blood flow. The wound had gotten so bad that some doctors recommended amputation.

"The wound grew out of proportion because my diabetes was out of whack,' Lewis recalls. "It burst on my foot like someone had poured acid on me. It just kept getting worse until amputation was suggested as the only remedy, but Dr. (Sara) Edeiken said she could do a procedure that

could save my foot." A vascular surgeon at

Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital, Edeiken recommended performing a vascular bypass procedure in an attempt to restore blood flow and save the foot of the retired Exxon Mobil employee who's lived in Dayton with his wife, Vickie, for over 23 years. "The procedure called

for doing a bypass with his vein from the groin to the peroneal artery about halfway down the calf" Edeiken said. "Essentially, we create a new highway for the blood to travel past blocked arteries. While the procedure was a success, it was also clear that Mr. Lewis would require reconstructive surgery for the wound."

Bypass surgery was just the first step on Lewis'

At that point, Houston Methodist Baytown plastic

surgeon Bufford Moore, MD became a member of Lewis' care team. Moore performed a series of surgeries to clear away the dead tissue and help the wound begin to heal, including using a tissue substitute called Integra designed to speed up the process. Lewis would also require treatment in the

Houston Methodist Wound Care Clinic-Baytown, one of just two wound care programs in the Houston area accredited by the Undersea & Hyperbaric Medical Society (UHMS).

"Today, the only remaining open wound is a very small area on the back of his leg. He is very nearly healed," Edeiken said. "We

have started him on physical therapy and allowing him to walk around on that leg. It has been a long road, but he has come a long way and we are very excited for his future."

Edeiken assesses Lewis wound in the wound clinic every two weeks. He has home healthcare nurses who see him between visits to help with wound dressing changes and to keep an eye on the wound. Lewis said he has had no reservations about visiting Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital during the COVID-19 pandemic thanks to the steps the hospital has taken to en-

sure patient safety.
"Everybody at the hospital has gone out of their way to see to it that everybody is checked before entering and keeping the hospital clean. I see people

Allan Jamail wrote the following in response to the honor bestowed by the Galena Park trustees:

I want to thank the GPISD Trustee's and whomever else for having nominated me to the Texas Education School Board (TASB) 2020 Media Honor Roll.

Years ago I began donating my photojournalism services to both the GPISD and the North Channel Star Newspaper. Having begun my kindergarten in 1950 in the small wooden building on 7th street, then the elementary school. junior high school and high school all in Galena Park. I wanted to make sure the students, faculty and citizens got recognition for their outstanding performance. And to also help the newspaper with its goal of providing community news to the North Channel area citizenry.



I've never been, nor do I want to be compensated or reimbursed for my time, travel expenses by the district or the newspaper, my reward comes from just knowing I'm helping to provide recognition to those I'm donating my services to.

My Galena Park education has enabled me to become a public service servant. After high school in 1962 I moved to neighboring Jacinto City where I served several terms as a city councilman, mayor, chief of police and emergency management director. Texas Department of Transportation officials noticed more personal protective equipment face masks, wipes and gloves — on the side of roads and highways, so they called in the big guns for a new round of 'Don't mess with Texas commercials. The celebrities featured include George Strait, Matthew McConaughey and Eva Longoria. "Find a trash can, or keep a litter bag in your car, and wait to toss it until you get home," Longoria said via her Instagram page. "#DontMessWithTexasactually

means don't litter!" "Capital Highlights" reader Anna Blythe, who reads the column in the Weimar Mercury, wrote recently that she thinks the "Don't mess with Texas" campaign needs a reboot. She said she's seen much more litter in recent years along Interstate 10 from Baytown to Flatonia. "I hate to see all the trash on our roadways in our great state of Texas," Blythe said. About 362 million pieces of litter accumulate on Texas roads every year with items discarded from vehicles accounting for half the mess, TxDOT officials report. Those caught littering can face a fine of \$500. Cotton-packaging problems

Plastic is a serious problem for cotton farmers, too.During the past three years, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has found an increase of plastic in samples that likely originated from the round module wraps used to package cotton, the Texas Farm Bureau reports. Every bale of cotton is graded by the USDA in classing offices across the country. In 2018, the USDA classing office in Corpus Christi received more plastic-contaminated bales than any other classing office in the country. When small pieces of plastic tear from the wear and embed themselves in the cotton lint, that lowers the crop's quality and price. Roadside litter can contribute to the problem. Plains Cotton Growers CEO Steve Verett says the industry is working to fix the problem: "We have to recognize we

mium fibers in the world. That's what we've lived off of for many years in the U.S. and we can't let. this plastic wrap issue become our Achilles heel."

Ag land values remain strong Despite the recession,

the value of Texas agricultural land has increased, according to a new U.S. Department of Agriculture report. The average value of the state's agricultural land, including buildings, is up 2.4 percent this year at \$2,170 an acre in the USDA's 2020 Land Values Report.Across the country, average ag land values are either lower or unchanged from 2019's record highs, according to Morning Ag Clips. The amount of farmable land has decreased because of urban sprawl. Because of this, farmland is appreciating in value, which is good for investors but can be a mixed bag for farmers. In Texas, 236,000 farmers and ranchers paid \$698 million in property taxes, or about \$3,000 each, according to an article by Pew Charitable Trusts. Ag land can qualifv for certain tax exemp-

Texans host Ravens in Home Opener; Cowboys host Falcons in their Home Opener

The Texans and their new multi-million dollar quarterback host the Baltimore Ravens in their first home game of the season at what will be a fanless NRG Stadium. Up I-45, the Dallas Cowboys will play their home opener at AT&T Stadium in what owner Jerry Jones hopes will host close to 50,000 fans.


There isn't much to choose from on the college schedule for the second straight week, but things should pick up the weekend of Sept. 26 when the Big 12 and SEC kickoff their seasons. We will definitely take a look at a number of key college games next week and hopefully the weeks to come.

This week's column will once again take a look at NFL games only. The State of Texas has two interesting games on the docket on Sunday as the Ravens and reigning MVP Lamar Jackson visit Watson and the Texans, while the highflying Atlanta Falcons will pay visit Arlington to take on Dak Prescott and the Cowboys.

Other interesting games on tap this weekend feature the Rams at Philadelphia, the 49ers also head east to take on the Jets, while Minnesota visits Indianapolis. The defending Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs hit the road for the first time to face the Los Angeles Chargers in their new home, Sofi Stadium in an AFC West matchup, while New England also heads west to face Seattle on Sunday Night Football.

Week 2 concludes with New Orleans facing the Las Vegas Raiders in their first game in Sin City and their -new billion-dollar stadium. So, without further ado, let's take a closer look at Week 2 in the NFL.

Los Angeles Rams at Philadelphia: The Eagles host the Rams in their home opener looking to go to 2-0 on the season. The Eagles are hoping quarterback Carson Wentz (4,039 passing yards, 27 TDs) can stay healthy for an entire season. He's had a history of injury troubles in his first four years in the league. Philly fans are expecting a breakout season for secondyear running back Mile Sanders (818 rushing yards, 3 TDs/50 receptions 509 yards 3 TDs) and if the second-year man from Penn State is as good as advertised, that will be a huge bonus for Wentz and the offense. Teams will have to deal with the running game first, which should open up the play action in the passing game. The Rams are hoping for a bounce back season from Jared Goff (4,638 yards, 22 TDs), but he will be without running back Todd Gurley who left LA for



Atlanta in the offseason. Look for the Eagles to move to 2-0 with a win over the Rams on Sunday. My pick, Philadelphia 26, Los Angeles Rams 16

San Francisco at New York Jets: The defending NFC champions make the long trip east to New Jersey to face a Jets team that should be improved from last year's 7-9 record. This could be a breakout year for third-year quarterback Sam Darnold (3,024 passing yards, 19 TDs in 13 games) and it would help if running back Le'Von Bell (789 yards, 3 TDs) returned to the form he had when he was putting up eye-opening rushing and receiving numbers for the Steelers. The 49ers will once again rely on the right arm of quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo (3,978 yards, 27 TDs) and the pass catching ability of tight end George Kittle (85 receptions, 1,053 yards, 5 TDs). Something tells me the Jets show up and pull off the upset in their home opener on Sunday. My pick, New York Jets 24, San Francisco 20

Denver at Pittsburgh: The Steelers open host the Broncos in their home opener in what should be a competitive game Both teams are coming off subpar years, but both could contend for a Wild Card spot this

year as both teams improved in the offseason. The Broncos could be sneaky good on defense with the return of defensive end Bradley Chubb and the signing of former Tennessee Titan defensive tackle Jurrell Casey. The key to Denver's success or failure this year will be how well quarterback Drew Locke (1,020 yards, 7 TDs in five starts) plays in his second year in the league. He showed flashes as a rookie and has two solid running backs to help him out in speedy Phillip Lindsey and the productive Melvin Gordon. Steeler fans are hyped about the return to health of quarterback Ben Rotlisberger, who passed for more than 5,000 yards and 34 touchdowns in 2018. His 2019 season was cut short in the second game when he sustained an elbow injury. While the offense struggled without him, the defense played well and could be one of the best units in the league in 2020. Look for the Steelers to treat their fans, if any are allowed to attend the game, to a happy home opener on Sunday. My

pick, Pittsburgh 23, Denver

Minnesota at Indianapolis: This should be an interesting game as the Vikings visit the Colts in Indy's home opener. This will be a good test for new Colts QB Phillip Rivers (4,615 yards, 23 TDs), who left the Los Angeles Chargers for the Midwest and a chance to return to the playoffs after a two-year absence. Rivers has a lot of talent to spread the ball around to led by running back Marlon Mack and rookie Johnathan Taylor (who gained more than 6,000 yards in three years of talented wide receivers led by the speedy T.Y. Hilton. The Vikings have a top 10 defense and will provide a stern test for Rivers and Co. on Sunday Minnesota quarterback Kirk Cousins (3,603 yards, 26 TDs) and running back Dalvin Cook (1,135 yards, 13 TD/53 receptions, 569 yards) will give the Indy defense a real test on Sunday. Look for Rivers to make the plays down the stretch to get his first home win as a Colt. My pick, Indianapolis 26, Minnesota 20

Buffalo at Miami: Many so-called experts have picked the Bills to win the AFC East and end New England domination of the division. If they are to do so, they will need to win on the road. This will be a good test for Buffalo as they will face an improved Miami team in what could be a steamy day in South Florida on Sunday. Buffalo fans are hoping quarterback Josh Allen (3,089 yards, 20 TDs) continues to improve and he has a new toy to throw to in former Minneso ta wide receiver Stefon Diggs (1,130 yards, 6 TDs). Diggs should open up the vertical passing game for Allen and if second-year running back Devin Singletary (775 vards, 2 TDs) has a breakout season that many are expecting, the Bills could very well be the team to beat in the AFC East this year. Look for the Dolphins to play hard, but the difference maker in this game will be Buffalo's defense, a top 10 unit in the entire league. My pick, Buffalo 27, Miami 14

Atlanta at Dallas: The Falcons bring their high-flying offense into AT&T Stadium to take on the Cowboys in their home opener. A year ago, Atlanta got off to a rough start, but



won six of its last eight games to head into the offseason with a ton of momentum. Atlanta is led by quarterback Matt Ryan (4,466 yards, 26 TDs) and wide receiver Julio Jones (99 receptions, 1,394 yards, 6 TDs). They als added running back Todd Gurley in the offseason, hoping he reverts to his 2017, 2018 self and not the subpar rupper he was in 2019. The Cowboys are pretty good on offense as well led by quarterback Dak Prescott (4,902 yards, 30 TDs), running back Ezekiel Elliott (1,394 yards, 12 TDs) and three talented wide receivers in Amari Cooper, Michael Gallup and rookie CeeDee Lamb. This should he a fun. high-scoring game to watch with Prescott being difference maker in this one My pick, Dallas 34, Atlanta 31

Baltimore at Houston: The Ravens and Teans meet at 3:25 in a nationally televised game on CBS, which will probably attract Jim Nantz and Tony Romo to call the game. The Houston defense will have its hands full trying to contain Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (3,127 passing yards, 36 TDs/1,206 rushing yards, 7 TDs), running back Mark Ingram (1,018 yards, 10 TDs) and tight end Mark Andrews (64 receptions, 852 yards, 10 TDs) and speedy wideout Marquis Brown The Ravens defense will also have its hands full trying to corral Watson (3,852 yards, 26 TDs/413 rushing yards, 7 TDs) and his new weapons on offense in running back David Johnson and wide receiver Brandin Cooks. The Texans must be able to run the ball against the stout Baltimore front seven if they hope to pull off the upset Look for head coach Bill O'Brien to use Johnson and fellow running back Duke Johnson as receivers out of the backfield to get one-onone coverage with the Ravens linebackers. The LA defense is underrated led by defensive end Joey Bosa and linebacker Melvin Ingram. violation after he parked near the gas pumps at the store. As officers handcuffed that man, eyewitnesses under the awning in front of the store commented about the arrest. One of the witnesses began filming the entire episode on his cell phone.

After showing the driver being handcuffed, the video then shows Officer Brown walking across the parking lot and confronting the witnesses. Brown asks one witness, 24-year-old Skylar Gilmore, to put his hands behind his back then throws him to the ground. The officer then

used a knee to strike Gilmore in the shoulder and face. Gilmore and another witness, 23-year-old Isaiah Phillips, were arrested for disorderly conduct-language, for their public use of profanities while watching the arrest. The officers also filed a charge against Gilmore for interfering with public duties.

When the facts surrounding the incident, including the video, came to light, the District Attorney's Office dismissed the charges against the two witnesses. Brown was fired from Baytown PD days later.
