Manslaughter charged on driver who drove around gates

Harris County Sheriff's Office reports a crash in-volving an SUV and a train on Sheldonn Road.

A woman has been charged after a deadly crash involving an SUV and an Amtrak train in northeast Harris County

on Wednesday afternoon.

Brittinie Green is charged with manslaughter, according to the Harris Court Sheriff of the Court ris County Sheriff's Office.

The crash occurred around 5 p.m. Wednesday in the 10500 block of Shel-

don Road near Beaumont Highway. Deputies say Green was

driving a BMW X3 with a passenger, Rhonda Clay, in the front seat.

The sheriff's office says Green drove northbound in the southbound lane of Sheldon Road, went around two vehicles that were stopped for the railroad crossing arms and then drove around the rail-

Deputies say the BMW then crossed over the railroad tracks and was struck by a westbound Amtrak train.

Clay was ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene, authorities said. Green was taken to the

NORTHEAST HARRIS COUNTY – As the final week of regular season approaches this weekend local teams are fairing very well indead.

Crosby (7-2 6-0) and not less than 42 points in a game will welcome the Nederland Bull Dogs (6-2 5-1) next Friday. This following their convincing thrashing of Santa Fe 50-0 last week. Crosby leads 15-5A with a perfect in district record. Crosby has proved the more physical team against opponents with Quarterback Reggie Branch leading the air attack and rushing well.

According to Head Coach Jerry Prieto, "We got off to a fast start on offense. We scored 4 touchdowns in our first 10 plays of offense. Jaylen Herman had a big first half with two touchdown receptions and threw a touchdown as well on a double pass. Johnathon Fuselier and Braden Womack had interceptions on defense and our defense in total didn't give up very



Goose Creek Memorial (5-3 4-2) defeated the LaPorte Bull Dogs(4-4 2-4) 28 to 16 and it looks like for the fifth time in school history the Patriots will go to the play-offs. The last

time was the 2013 season.

Dylan Pitre was the leader and quarterback for the Patriots. Although he had an interception and there was a fumble they held relatively well against the Bulldogs that threw three interceptions includ-ing two to cap the contest and two fumbles. The Patriots are enjoying a three game streak since the squeakier 15-14 against Sterling.

The Bulldog drew first blood with an interception and were up 7-0 early in the first quarter but Dylan Pitre matched the score

Patriot defender Bryce Johnson stole the Bull Dog's quarterback's ball and dashed in for a 14-7 lead. With seconds before the half Goose Creek Memorial went up on a pass and run 21 to 7.

MS-13 members charged with murder by U.S. Attorney

HOUSTON - Five local members of the violent Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13) international street gang are set to appear in court following charges of conspiracy and murder in aid of racketeering, announced U.S. Attorney Ryan K. Patrick.

Wilson Jose Ventura-Mejia, 24, Jimmy Villalobos-Gomez, 23, Angel Miguel Aguilar-Ochoa, 35, Walter Antonio Chicas-Garcia, 23, and Mar-

lon Miranda-Moran, 21 will appear for their arraignments and detention hearings via video before U.S. Magistrate Judge Sam S. Sheldon at 10 a.m. All are El Salvadorian nationals who illegally resided in Houston. Also charged is Franklin Trejo-Chavarria, 23, who is currently in custody in El Salvador.

A federal grand jury returned the indictment Nov. 12. All are charged

with conspiracy and murder in aid of racketeering

The indictment alleges they committed a 2018 murder in furtherance of the MS-13 enterprise. The victim was allegedly beaten to death with machetes in order for the defendants to further their positions in the enterprise.

If convicted, they face a potential death sen-





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

State is planning for first COVID19 vaccinations

Plans for first vaccina-

Texas is preparing to distribute the COVID-19 vaccination to medical staff and other first responders later this month. "Texas is ready to distribute these vaccines in the coming days," Gov. Greg Abbott tweeted Sunday, sharing a Wall Street Journal news story about United Airlines operating charter flights to position doses of Pfizer Inc.'s COVID-19 vaccine for quick distribution if the shots are approved by regulators. Earlier, Abbott and the State Department of Health Services announced their guiding principles of vaccine distribution. Texas will initially allocate vaccines based on the

- following criteria:
 Protecting health care workers
- Protecting frontline workers
- Protecting vulnerable populations who are at great-
- er risk.

 Mitigating health ineq-
- Data-driven allocations using the best available sci-entific evidence and epidemi-
- ology.

 Geographic diversity and rural communities.
- Transparency with the

Researcher spotlights 'invisible incentives'

The Texas Enterprise Fund took a hit for lack of transparency in a new research paper from the National Freedom of Information Coalition.The paper by journalist Steve Miller s titled "Invisible Incentives: How Secrecy Impedes Evalu-



ation and Accountability of Economic Development Subsidies." Part of the paper spotlights the Texas Enterprise Fund, which the Legislature created in 2003 to provide taxpayer money to companies in exchange for the promise of jobs. "But in numerous cases, the money has been paid and the companies left shortly after the deal was completed, taking the jobs with them," the paper's author writes. "The public rarely hears of it and the money spent is rarely recouped, although because of the onacity surrounding the TEF, it's difficult to discern if any financial recovery by the state is achieved."The problem is the same across most states, according to the paper, which concludes with this recom-mendation: "Opening the records, fully, is the best start to handing the decision to the public."Renae Eze, Gov. Greg Abbott's spokesperson, responded in a statement to the researcher's assertions.
"When he first entered of-

fice in 2015, Gov. Abbott established procedures to ensure the protection of taxpayer money and trans-parency in the spending process, including changing the Texas Enterprise Fund requirements to be performance-based, meaning these companies must first meet their contracted job requirements before any state money is paid out," she stated. Companies must also remain and maintain those jobs for an extra year on the contract period. If a company falls short, it will be held accountable to the hardworking peo-ple of Texas through provisions that enable us to clawback our grant."

\$1 billion less Two key Texas funds received about \$1 billion less this year because of the economic downturn, state Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced The State Highway Fund and the Rainy Day Fund each received more than \$1.1 billion in the annual transfer of severance tax money, Hegar said. That's about \$500 million less for each fund than a year ago. The transfer amounts are based on crude oil and natural gas production tax revenues in excess of 1987 collections. If either tax generates more revenue than the 1987 threshold, an amount equal to 75 percent of the excess is transferred. tenance and right-of-way acquisition. The economic contraction associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and recent volatility in oil prices contributed to the transfer amounts being lower than the \$1.66 billion each fund received in fiscal 2020, Hegar said."The Rainy Day Fund and the State Highway Fund are critical pieces to ensure Texas' continued economic strength," Hegar said. "The State Highway Fund is a key funding source for the transportation infrastructure that is fundamental to our economy, and the importance of maintaining a healthy Rainy Day Fund to help weather unforeseen economic downturns has never been more clear than it has been in recent months."With this most recent transfer, the new balance of severance taxes will be about \$10.7 billion.

Billion-dollar breakthrough?

Texas A&M researchers announced a breakthrough in fighting agricultural plant diseases.Kranthi Mandadi, a Texas A&M AgriLife Research scientist and associate professor in Texas A&M's Department of Plant Pathology and Microbiology, has been working on developing new biological technologies. Mandadi and his team are AgriLife Research and Exten-

sion Center in Weslaco.The diseases cause billions of dollars of damage each year. The U.S. citrus industry alone would save \$3 billion a year through control of just one of these diseases - citrus greening. Additionally, the pathogen that causes Pierce's disease in grapes is the No.1 threat to the \$1 billion wine

industry in Texas. The new technologies allow scientists to better study the pathogens and combat them.



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
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Aggies look for big road win at Auburn: Texans look to slow down Colts in AFC South



Jimbo Fisher's Texas
A&M Aggies were supposed
to play LSU last Saturday
and if the game was held, it
was A&M's first game since
they dominated South Carolina on Nov. 7. Games
against Tennessee and Mississippi had to be postponed
due to players and football
staffers testing positive for
COVID-19. The Tennessee
game has been rescheduled
for Dec. 12. No word yet on if
the Ags will host Mississippi
on Dec. 19, the day of the
SEC title game.

This Saturday, the Aggies have a tough road test at Auburn with hopes of closing fast and impressing members of the College Football Playoff (CFP) panel. If A&M can win out and finish with just one loss to No. 1-ranked Alabama, the CFP Selection Committee should consider the Aggies for one of the four CFP berths, that's why this game is so important to Fisher's team.

Tom Herman's Texas Longhorns would also like to finish strong and perhaps land a Jan. 1 bowl game. UT will visit a Kansas State team that was blown out by Iowa State, 45-0, two weeks ago.

In the NFL, the Texans will be out to throw a monkey wrench in the Colts' AFC South title hopes. Two weeks ago, Houston played perhaps its most complete game of the season when the Texans beat New England 27-20 in NRG Stadium. The loss could have brought an end to Bill Belichick's 2020 playoff hopes and has a lot of Patriots fans wondering, "is it time to rebuild?"

The Cowboys travel to Baltimore for a second straight Thursday games (they hosted Washington on Thanksgiving Day) and showed signs of life two weeks ago with a 31-28 win at Minnesota. While the Cowboys were winning on



the road, the Ravens dropped a 30-24 overtime decision at home to the Titans to fall to 6-4 on the sea son.

Before we take a look at the above mentioned games and a handful of others, let's review last week's record. A 7-3 week (two AISD varsity games were postponed) upped the season record to 75-36 (68%).

Now, onto this weekend's games.

INCAA

This one is a battle for survival in the Big 10 as both teams enter this game with one loss. Two weeks ago, Indiana lost a hard-fought, 42-35 decision at Ohio State. The Hoosiers were down by double digits in the second half and could have given up, but quarterback Michael Penix, Jr. (1,561 yards, 14 TDs) and wide receiver Ty Fryfogole (31 receptions, 642 yards, 7 TDs) made big-play after big-play to bring IU back. Wisconsin had a tough time moving the ball in its 17-7 road loss at Northwestern and the Badgers will need a better outing from quarterback Graham Mertz (375 vards, 8 TDs) if they hope to beat the high-scoring Hoosiers. My pick, Indiana

Texas A&M at Auburn: No. 5-ranked Texas A&M heads to the plains of Alabama to take on an Auburn team that struggles on offense, but has playmakers on defense. A&M QB Kellen Mond (1,468 yards, 16 TDs) needs to continue to be his consistent self and let running back Isaiah Spiller (643 yards, 5 TDs) do his thing on the ground and fellow run-

ning back Ainias Smith (26 receptions, 312 yards, 5 TDs) help out in the passing game. I think the A&M defense will get to Auburn quarterback Bo Nix (1,407 yards, 4 TDs) early and force a turnover or two. The Aggies need to start fast and take the starch out of the War Eagles. My pick, Texas A&M 26, Auburn 16

Liberty County murder suspect captured in Mexico

 $HOUSTON-The\ U.S.\ Bor$ der Patrol arrested a man charged with capital murder after being tied to the fatal shooting of one woman and sexual assault of another in September, according to the Liberty County Sheriff's Of-

fice.
The U.S. Marshal's Office and Mexican authorities joined the search for Jose Marin Soriano, 59, after he reportedly crossed the border into Mexico shortly after the incident.

Soriano was arrested Sunday at noon while attempting to cross back into the United States by the U.S.-Mexico border crossing at the San Ysidro Port of Entry, according to the Sheriff's Office. He is being fornia Sheriff's Office and waiting to be extradited back to Texas as soon as all legal documentation can be completed, officials said.

These incidents occurred on County Road 3415 at County Road 3425 around 6:30 p.m. on Sept. 19

Deputies said they received a frantic 911 call by a woman who said she was chained to a bed while her friend was killed in a car outside the residence. When deputies arrived at the scene, they found a woman dead inside a burned vehicle across the road from the residence. Deputies said they also found another woman chained at the ankle and a rope tied

around her neck inside the house located in the Rancho San Vicente subdivision in north Liberty County.

After investigating, depu ties said it appears that both women cleaned houses for Soriano, who lives at the res-

Deputies said Soriano had some revealing photos of the now-deceased woman and he had told the victim that he would delete the photos if she would meet him at his home. It is unknown if Soriano took the photos or if the woman, who is now dead, sent the photos to him at some point.

When the two women arrived at Soriano's home, deputies said he pulled a gun and sexually assaulted the wom-an chained to the bed. In an attempt to escape the house, the now-deceased woman got into her vehicle and attempted to back out of the yard, but the car crashed into the woods

For unknown reasons, investigators said the vehicle caught fire and the woman was badly burned. However investigators said a gunshot wound was found when the woman was later examined. It appears that in Soriano's haste to stop the woman from leaving in her car, he left his cellphone in the house and it was his cellphone the other victim used to call the sheriff's department, deputies

Deputies said Soriano fled the scene in a gray Ford pick-up truck, which was later found. Investigators believe Soriano swapped cars to a 2009 black Honda Accord.

Recognize Serious Symptoms

It's important to know that anyone can have mild to severe symptoms with either COVID-19 or flu.

"More serious complica tions from respiratory illness are a bigger issue for older adults and anyone who may have underlying health conditions. Yet, it's possible to experience severe symptoms at any age,' Oueini said.

Monitor your symptoms if you're not feeling well:

Mild symptoms in clude having a low-grade fever, nasal congestion, runny nose, sore throat, mild cough and mild body aches. What to do: Get tested for COVID-19. Stay home and isolate yourself from others to avoid spreading illness, even if you test negative for COV-

• Moderate symp toms include fever over 100.4 F, persistent cough temporary shortness of breath and feeling like you need to stay in bed. What to do: Get tested for COV-ID-19 and contact your doctor about worsening

Severe symptoms include difficulty breathing, shortness of breath,

wheezing, pain or pressure in the chest, confusion, trouble staying awake and bluish lips or face. What to do: Seek emergency medical care for severe respiratory symptoms.

Mild cases of respiratory illness can often be managed with rest, fluids and fever-reducing medicines at home. However, don't wait to see a doctor if you're in a high-risk group and experiencing worsening symptoms. Mild or moderate symptoms can quickly become severe for older adults and those who have heart disease, diabetes, cancer or chronic respiratory problems.

Manage Your Health

If you have chronic respiratory conditions, such as asthma or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), it's important to manage the condition closely with your doctor.

"There are things we are doing to reduce exposure risk for patients, including telehealth appointments and video visits," said Oueini.

Oueini recommends taking steps like getting regular exercise, quitting smoking and vaping and minimizing exposure to allergens to keep your lungs

Stay Healthy

"The best thing everyone can do to help protect each other is to follow recommended respiratory practices," said Oueini.

Staying vigilant with tips, like staving home from work or school if you feel sick, practicing social distancing, getting a flu shot, wearing a mask in public and washing hands often, helps prevent the spread of illness.
