### New pipeline crosses River, Neighborhoods

LYNCHBURG - Exxon-Mobil Pipeline Company will install pipelines underneath the San Jacinto River, one at the Houston Ship Channel between here and Baytown, the other north to the IH-10 bridge using a technique called Horizontal Directional Drilling.

Some of this work will include activity on Alexander Island, an uninhabited island within the channel. This project is a part of a \$500 million energy infrastructure investment in East Harris County.

According to a press release from ExxonMobil Pipeline Company, "Throughout all phases of planning and installation, work will be conducted with an unwavering commitment to the safety of the community, the environment and our team

The Lynchburg Ferry closed Tues., Feb. 25 2020 for necessary improvements to preserve the longevity of its operations. During the closure, crews are reconstructing the approaches and transfer ramps for the Lynchburg Ferry Boats.

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# Brady goes for 7<sup>th</sup> Lombardi, Mahomes second in what could be a very real 'Super' Bowl!

I guess that Tom Brady guy still has something left in the tank.

After spending 20 years in New England and leading the Patriots and head coach Bill Belichick to six Super Bowl titles, Brady moved south to sunny Tampa, FL and proved he's not washed up at 43 years of age.

In Kansas City, Chief fans have once again put their faith in 25-year-old Patrick Mahomes, who led their beloved team to the Lombardi Trophy last year and is making a return trip this year to go after a second straight title.

The former Texas Tech star had his ups and downs this season, but when it mattered most, the strong-armed slinger put the Chiefs on his back in the AFC title game against Buffalo to lead them to a second straight Super Bowl.

In the Chief's 38-24 conference title victory, Mahomes passed for 325 yards and three touchdowns to send his team onto Tampa.

While Mahomes was working his magic, Brady tossed three touchdown passes to lead the Buccaneers to a 31-26 win at Green Bay. Brady wasn't great, he did throw three interceptions in the NFC title game, but he did enough to send TB to its second Super Bowl in team history (Tampa Bay defeated Oakland 18 years ago for its only NFL title).

Brady not only led his team to the ultimate game, but they will play the game in their home stadium, becoming the first team to host a Super Bowl. In the 1980 game, the Los Angeles Rams played in their backyard in the Rose Bowl when they faced the mighty Steelers, but their home stadium at the time was the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. The other team that came closest to hosting the big game was the San Francisco 49ers, who defeated Miami in the 1985 big game in Palo Alto, CA, a suburb of Frisco.

Brady's 10<sup>th</sup> Super Bowl (he's 6-3 in the big game) will make him the fourth NFL quarterback to lead two different teams to a Super Bowl. Tom Terrific joins Craig Morton (Dallas and Denver), Kurt Warner (St. Louis Rams and Arizona Cardinals), and Peyton Manning (Indianapolis and Denver) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to take two different teams, and start, a Super Bowl.

The  $55^{\rm th}$  version of the NFL's ultimate game could be a very special one as both teams have explosive offenses and bi-play ability.

Brady had a solid season in his first year in Tampa throwing for 4,633 yards and 40 touchdowns. He led the Bucs to three straight road playoff wins passing for 860 yards and seven TDs.



Mahomes followed up his 2019 MVP season with 4,740 passing yards in 15 games (he sat out the Chief's season finale) and 38 touchdowns. In two home playoff games he passed for another 580 yards and four touchdowns and overcame a concussion and big toe injury in the AFC Divisional game against Cleveland.

Having an extra week of rest before the Feb. 7 game should benefit Mahomes, so expect him to be ready to take on a solid TB defense on Sunday.

KC head coach Andy Reid does have a major injury concern to deal with as he prepares his team for a shot at a second straight Lombardi Trophy (it would be the franchises third overall. Kansas City defeated Minnesota in Super Bowl 4). Starting left tackle Eric Fisher, who protects Mahomes blind side, was lost for the season in the AFC title game when he sustained an Achilles injury. Chief fans are probably confident that Reid and his staff will find a suitable replacement and they had better because Tampa Bay has an aggressive and quick front seven that has produced six sacks and three fumble recoveries in three playoff games (the Bucs had four against Aaron Rodgers in the NFC title game). The secondary is also playing well and has produced five interceptions in three playoff games

But this will be the TB's defense biggest test when they take on Mahomes and an offense that is loaded with offensive weapons. Mahomes has a host of dependable and speedy wide receivers, but the best of the bunch is Tyreek Hill (87 receptions, 1,276 yards, 15 TDs in the regular season). In two playoff games Hill has caught 22 passes for 250 yards, but has yet to score a post-season touchdown. Mahomes also has the game's best tight end in dependable Travis Kelce (105 receptions, 1,416 yards, 11 TDs). Kelce has grabbed 23 passes for 226 yards and three scores in the Chief's first two playoff games. He's going to be a matchup nightmare for the TB linebackers and when Mahomes needs a big play in a tight situation, you can bet he will be looking for big No. 87.

KC has also got some nice production from speedy wide receiver Mecole Hardman in the playoffs. He had a 50+ yard run to set up one touchdown and grabbed a scoring pass from

Hardman against the Bills.

The Chiefs are not a one-trip pony, they can also run the ball and having rookie running back Clyde Edwards-Helaire (803 rushing yards, 4 TDs) back in the fold should help keep the Bucs defense honest knowing they will need to stop the run first to slow down the Chiefs (good luck with that, Bucs). Edwards-Helaire missed the last two regular season games and the first playoff game with a high ankle sprain, but returned for the AFC title game and helped the cause with a touchdown run. Backup Darrell Williams has done a nice job as his replacement and don't forget about Le'Von Bell as well. If Bell is healthy (he missed the Buffalo game with a knee injury), I would not be surprised if Reid comes up with some gadget play to get him involved in the game.

Brady has a few weapons of his own and has two solid receivers to throw to in former Texas A&M Aggie Mike Evans (70 receptions, 1,006 yards, 13 TDs). In three playoff games, Evans has grabbed 10 passes for 107 yards and two TDs. Fellow wide out Chris Godwin (65 receptions, 840 yards, 7 TDs) has been Brady's go-to guy in the post season with 14 receptions for 223 yards and one score. Brady also has his buddy from New England to go to in Rob Gronkowski, who has only one reception in the post season. Don't be surprised if Gronk's role expands in the Super Bowl.

Tampa Bay has also gotten some nice production in the running game from Leonard Fournette, who has come up with two rushing scores and one receiving score in the playoffs. Fournette's ability to move the chains could be crucial in SB 55 because if the Bucs can control the clock and keep Mahomes off the field, their chances of winning a second Lombardi Trophy would be greatly enhanced.

This one has all the making of an offensive shootout and playing on their home field will be a huge benefit for the Bucs. This will be the fifth time Brady and Mahomes have met and both own two wins against each other, so something has to give on Sunday. Brady is the Master and Mahomes is the Student, but he's a quick learner and it's tough to bet against either one of them on the big stage.

This one might come down to who has the ball last, and something tells me the kid will outplay the legend as Mahomes outduels Brady and enters a select club of NFL quarterbacks who have won two or more Super Bowls. Enjoy the game folks; it should be a good one. My pick, Kansas City 36, Tampa Bay 33

shop she worked at during Leonard, 67, said. "I didn't recognize her with her mask on."

Leonard was admitted to Houston Methodist Baytown in December 2020 for abdominal surgery under Hospital surgeon Dr. Boutros Kahla. He recalls Jessica as being a conscientious, dedicated employee who was elevated to shift leader just a few weeks after starting the job at age 17. In fact, her work ethic led to an event that would change Jessica's life.

"She was a super employee; a gogetter as a high school kid. As a night shift leader, she left the store in

perfect condition with the money and inventory always accounted for. She was a smart, reliable, driven kid and we were so impressed that we awarded her a scholarship through Dayton High School," Leonard recalls.

Sutterfield said the \$500 scholarship helped to propel her toward a career

Sutterfield used the money to help her earn a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing at Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches. She would go on to earn a Master of Science in Nursing and Master of Business Administration

(MBA). "I was not surprised when I found her not only working as a nurse, but as a manager and that she is successful in her pursuit of nursing," Leonard said. "It was evident she had the

### Sheriff solves serial robberies with arrests

A series of robberies from Orange to Harris County have lead to a series of arrests by the Chambers County Sheriff's Office working in conjunction with other law enforcement agencies.

What began late January 6 with Chambers County Sheriff's Office responding to a robbery call at DJ's Grocery near Interstate 10 would amount to a series of robberies over a wide region in January.

Victims at the grocery store described multiple actors wearing masks, entering the business, brandishing a firearm and demanding money. An undisclosed amount of money was taken from the business and the actors fled the area in a vehicle that was parked nearby.

January 19 at the 8100 block of SH-146 a similar

armed robbery drew deputies to investigate. Shortly after this report, a second report of an armed robbery was reported again at DJ's Grocery. After reviewing security video footage, it became apparent to Chambers County Detectives that the same individuals were most likely responsible for all three robberies.

Detectives determined



that these individuals have been responsible for numerous other armed robberies from Baytown to Orange at various gas stations over the last month. Through joint efforts from multiple law enforcement agencies along the IH-10 corridor in Southeast Texas, the robbery suspects

have now been identified. On January 28, 2021,

Chambers County Sheriff+fs Office Detective Paul Vest obtained arrest warrants for K-Leb Diamond, 17, Eddie Thomas, 17, and Moses Rhine, 20, as well as one juvenile male for Engaging in Organized Crime (2 counts each) 1st Degree Felony. All four of the individuals reside in the Beaumont area and are currently in

The number of robberies these individuals have committed along with the violent nature of the crime have attracted ATF and Federal Prosecutors. All are reviewing all the cases that have occurred throughout multiple jurisdictions and are considering pursuing federal prosecution.

According to Sheriff Brian Hawthorne +gBy having a close working relationship with other law enforcement agencies, our Detectives with the Chambers County Sheriff+fs Office were able to do our part in making sure these violent offenders are off the street. We look forward to a successful prosecution of these criminals and will continue to do our part to keep Chambers County a safe place to live.

### A Promising Start



#### Vaccine pace picks up slowly The rate of COVID-19

Just over 400,000 are fully vaccinated. The state has received 3.16 million doses so far; nearly half remain to be administered. Texas ranks near the bottom in per-capita doses administered when compared to other states, according to the Centers

### Texas Lyceum poll measures impact of the pandemic

The Texas Lyceum, a nonpartisan group of movers and shakers based in Austin, released its annual survey last week. It painted a fairly negative picture of the state's economy as a result of the pandemic and illustrated the widespread impact of the coronavirus on Texans. Responding to the pandemic is the most important issue facing the state, according to 37 percent of respondents. Political corruption and leadership ran a distant second at 10 percent.The 2021 poll presented the most negative views of the state's and nation's economies since the Great Recession of 2008. Additionally, four in five respondents said they knew someone who had contracted COVID-19, while half knew someone who had died from it. On the somewhat brighter side, nearly three-fourths were either "very hopeful" or "somewhat hopeful" that the nation would get the pandemic under control in the next six months. But just 45 percent of Texans say they plan to get vaccinated when it becomes available to them. The complete poll results can be found at texaslyceum.org.

### Score one for the chi-

In a decade-long battle between the Texas Medical Association and the group that represents the state's chiropractors, the Texas Supreme Court ruled late last week that the lawful scope of practice for chiropractors includes nerves and related testing as it pertains to the musculoskeletal system. TMA originally sued the Texas Board  $of\,Chiropractor\,Examiners$ in 2011, arguing that such diagnoses exceeded what chiropractors were licensed to do.In a split decision, the high court overturned a ruling from the Austin Court of Appeals that had sided with TMA. Matt Webb, attorney for the chiropractic board, said in an email: "Today's decision was not only legally sound but a victory for common sense and patient care. A different outcome could have drastically curtailed access to critical chiropractic care for patients across the State of Texas."

### Free Speech for Me, but Not for Thee

'Free Speech for Me, But Not for Thee' -Long a stalwart defender of the First Amendment, the American media is now having second thoughts. For decades, it was a common place sentiment among journalists that freedom of the press was one of the glories of our system. It helped to make the government accountable and to air diverse points of view even unpopular ones — to be tested in the marketplace of ideas. Media organizations were at the forefront of the Amendment rights, with The New York Times involved in two landmark Supreme Court decisions (New York Times Co. v. Sullivan and the Pentagon Papers case) and tended to rise as one against any perceived threat to their prerogatives and freedoms This advocacy has been sincere, although, if nothing else, journalists should be First Amendment purists out of a sense of selfinterest. In a 2018 essay in The Atlantic representing the bygone conventional wisdom, titled "Why a Free Press Matters," the longtime newscaster Dan Rather noted, "As a working journalist, I know I have a stake in this concept." One would think so. Yet, now journalists have lurched from finding a threat to freedom to the press in every criticism of reporters and news outlets by former President Donald Trump to themselves calling for unwelcome media organizations to be shut down. They've become the thing they profess to hate -

closed-minded censors who



want to stifle free expression, First Amendment be damned. Perversely, the TV program and email newsletter of the top media analyst at CNN, Brian Stelter, has been a clearinghouse for such advocacy, whether it is demands to get rightwingers removed from social media or — more astonishingly — to keep conservative cable networks off the airwaves. Stelter's colleague, media reporter Oliver Darcy, tweeted about his effort to get cable companies to answer why they carry pro-Trump channels like Newsmax and One America News Network. "Do they have any second thoughts about distributing these channels given their election denialism content?" he asked on Twitter. "They won't say." In the same vein, Washington Post columnist Max Boot drew a direct line between how we deal with foreign terror groups and how we should treat right-wing media organizations. "We need," he wrote, "to shut down the influencers who radicalize people and set them on the path toward violence and sedition." Boot noted, approvingly, that the U.K. doesn't have the equivalent of Fox News because regulators won't allow it. The U.K. also doesn't have a First Amendment, a small detail that might be worth considering if the point is to

writer at the progressive publication Mother Jones argued for an advertiser boycott instead of regulatory action in a post called, charmingly, "It's Time to Crush Fox News." A boycott wouldn't violate the First Amendment like a direct crackdown on Fox and others. Still, it would be private action undertaken in the service of a profoundly illiberal goal, running counter to the country's culture of free speech. All of this would be bad enough if it weren't people who write and comment on TV for a living advocating it. But journalists have been moving in this direction for a while now, as Armin Rosen catalogues in a disturbing report for Tablet magazine. The author, Steve Coll, who is no less than the dean of the Graduate School of Journalism at Columbia University, said last December, "Those of us in journalism have to come to terms with the fact that free speech, a principle that we hold sacred, is being weaponized against the principles of journalism." The former managing editor of Time magazine, Richard Stengel, has written: "All speech is not equal. And where truth cannot drive out lies, we must add new guardrails." And so its erstwhile champions are ready to retreat from strict adherence to the First Amendment to a new rule of "free speech for me, but not

with God as your trainer. Like the horse, we humans seem to have an instinctive tendency to fear all sorts of things and often have issues with trust, especially when it comes the closer we get to to situations that we clearly can't control. (Matthew 19:26) This is a commonly quoted verse, and two of the most important words are the first: With God. When we work with God we can be a powerhouse team!

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### **Groundbreaking Initiative** provides boost to Air Quality monitoring in Harris County

Harris County, Texas (January 28, 2021) - A new collaborative initiative between Harris County, an independent research group and private industry, will enhance daily collection and availability of air monitoring data and improve air quality knowledge during significant industrial incidents.

Deployment of new equipment and development of new protocols was made possible through a first of its kind \$1 million grant provided to Harris County by the American Chemistry Council (ACC) Foundation in December 2019. The grant assists Harris County purchase monitoring equipment that enhances the County's local Community Air Monitoring Program (CAMP). CAMP provides air data to the community through a recently created air monitoring network.

"Over the past two years, Harris County has undertaken historic steps to modernize the county's ability to protect the environment and enable a proactive response to threats to public health and safety," said Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo. "After decades of systemic underfunding and neglect of key County departments, we've made the biggest investments needed in more than 30 years. There is still a long way to go, but we should never lose sight of the fact that every family in Harris County should never have to worry about the quality of the air they breathe or the safety of their environment."

Harris County is using the grant to deploy the following new air monitoring equipment:

The stationary monitors will communicate data directly through the recently created HCPCS CAMP network. Information from portable and handheld monitors will be uploaded to the website to provide local officials with timely and useful data to make informed decisions on community response to poten-

tial health impacts. Over the past year, Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia's office, Harris County Pollution Control Services (HCPCS) and Houston Advanced Research Center (HARC) have worked with ACC. East Harris County Manufacturing Association (EHCMA) and Texas Chemical Council (TCC) to outline

activities, equipment and protocols that best serve the community

"It has been exciting to have been working together with ACC, TCC, EHCMA, and HARC. I commend and thank them for their partnership with my office. Our joint work has been with the goal to provide Precinct 2 citizens and industry neighbors access to current air quality data for everyday use by the public. On top of that, this critically important information will be especially valuable during industrial events," said Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia.

"This historic relationship we are building takes a significant step toward making Harris County a model of how to be good neighbors for entities all across the nation. Collaboration between industry, environmental groups, community-focused organizations along with government is what helps promote a healthy, safe, and economically strong area. Together we can work to assure our residents feel engaged and educated about our industry neighbors and industry can ensure their neighbors breathe clean air," said Commissioner Garcia.

"Harris County Pollution Control's Community Air Monitoring Program is a huge step toward establishing a networked air monitoring system that will allow Harris County to provide residents with real-time data and information about the air quality in their communities," said Dr. Latrice Babin, Director of Harris County Pollution Control Services. The data gathered will inform residents and decision-makers on routine monitoring as well as emergency events. The ACC Foundation grant is a timely and generous contribution to the CAMP program that will prove beneficial to fence line communities deeply impacted by industrial events.

"Harris County Pollution Control looks forward to working collaboratively with HARC to better understand baseline data and various other community partner stakeholders that ue to boost the County's air monitoring program," Dr. Babin added.

In another collaborative effort, Harris County and City of Houston are finalizing an agreement for Harris County to place an SPOD monitor in the City of Houston's Hartman Park. "We first want to thank Harris County Precinct 2 and Harris Countv Pollution Control for taking this important step of placing an advanced air monitoring system in our Hartman Park," said Kenneth Allen, Director Houston Parks and Recreation Department. "The safety of our citi-

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zens is the number one priority for both the City and County. Our strong partner-ship means we work hand-inhand in the fight to keep our citizens informed about their air quality. It's a mission that must be done collaboratively to protect the people, neighborhoods, and communities of Houston

Through the grant, Harris County is also obtaining independent scientific support from HARC, including analysis and modelling of air quality data collected throughout Precinct 2. To help with their analysis, HARC also received 30 years of private industry air monitoring data which will assist with background studies on air quality to better understand day-to-day baseline readings.

Under the new agreement with HARC, a Science Advisory Committee of noted air quality, risk communications, and health experts will help review threshold values for certain pollutants, which will support the ongoing analysis conducted by the County's revamped Pollution Control department.

"This is a very exciting project for HARC. We look forward to working with the project's independent Science Advisory Committee and ACC, EHCMA, TCC, first responders, Harris County, other governmental entities, and all the partner community stakeholders and advocacy groups to help enhance Harris County's and our region's emergency preparedness and response capabilities. Protecting public health and safety is a paramount goal we all share," said Dr. Mustapha Beydoun, HARC Vice President and COO.

HARC, Harris County and industry will test the new network and improve stakeholder coordination during a series of table-top drills slated for later this year.

"We thank Judge Hidalgo and Commissioner Garcia for opening the door to industry for collaboration. We applaud Commissioner Garcia for his active leadership and we appreciate the opportunity to be a part of this groundbreaking initiative, which will help proties throughout the Houston region," said Chris Jahn, President and CEO of the American Chemistry Council. "One of the project's important strengths is that in addition to providing local officials with an array of new air monitoring equipment, it also allows officials to draw on the scientific expertise of HARC. It's a tremendous team effort that will greatly improve the county's ability to collect, analyze and share information about air quality, especially during an emer-

pletion date is in April. Once complete, the Lynchburg Ferry will resume standard, toll-free operations.

According to Roxy Sibrian of HCTRA, "As you may be aware, the Lynchburg Ferry was closed in February of 2020 to make necessary improvements to preserve the longevity of its operations. The work encompasses reconstructing both approaches and transfer ramps that go onto and off the ferry boats

Once complete, the project improvements will reduce ferry service outages related to the impact of local flooding, therefore providing better service and reliability to drivers. This project is a joint venture between HCTRA and the Texas Department of Transportation.

ExxonMobil Pipeline Company began last Fall to replace an existing 20mile crude oil pipeline between EMPCo's Webster Station in Webster, TX and ExxonMobil's Baytown refinery in Baytown. The work will take place on and along a 20-mile pipeline corridor through parts of Webster, Houston, La Porte, Pasadena, Deer Park and Baytown. The replacement 36 inch pipeline will support delivery and takeaway crude service to and from Exxon-Mobil's Baytown refinery, and will reinforce the energy infrastructure network enabling domestic was safely completed in


