PFAS chemicals are known as "forever chemicals," a family of potentially thousands of synthetic chemicals that are extremely persistent in the environment and in our bodies. PFAS is short for perfluoroalky and polyfluoroalkyl substances and includes chemicals known as PFOS, PFOA and GenX. $PFAS\ chemicals\ have\ been$ highly utilized in various industries because of their ability to repel oil and water. They've been manufactured since the 1940s and can be found in Teflon nonstick products, stains and water repellants, paints, cleaning products, food packaging and firefighting foams. A growing body of science has found that there are potential adverse

health impacts associated with PFAS exposure, including liver damage, thyroid disease, decreased fertility, high cholesterol, obesity, hormone suppression and cancer. These chemicals can easily migrate into the air, dust, food, soil and water. They are water soluble and highly mobile. They can easily contaminate groundwater and can be hard to filter out. Since these substances don't break down naturally, our exposure to PFAS could continue for hundreds or $thousands\ of\ years.\ People$ can also be exposed to them through food packaging and industrial expo-

Vaccine Booster shots available from Harris County Public Health

Include a COVID-19 Vaccine Booster in Your Holiday "To Do" list

Booster doses are available for qualifying fully vaccinated residents

Houston - Unlike last year, this upcoming holiday season we have a vaccine available that can protect us against COVID-19. Additionally, eligible residents who completed their two-dose mRNA vaccine series (Pfizer or Moderna) at least six months ago and anyone who received the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine at least two months ago can get a booster. Harris County Public Health (HCPH) is administering the COVID-19 vaccine booster for people in qualifying groups

All COVID-19 vaccines provide strong protection for most people. A booster vaccine is an additional dose given after the protection provided by the original series has begun to decrease over time. All three vaccine boosters help cer tain groups of people maintain their level of immunity longer.

For individuals who received a Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccines, the following groups are eligible for a booster shot at 6 months or more after their primary series:

-- 65 years and older -- Age 18+ who live in long-term care settings

- Age 18+ who have underlying medical conditions -- Age 18+ who work or

live in high-risk settings Note: The Moderna COVID-19 booster dose is half of the dose that is administered for the primary series dose. For individuals who received the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine, booster shots are also recommended for those who are 18 and older and who were

vaccinated two or more months ago.

Additional Doses

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend that people who are moderately to severely immunocompromised should receive an additional dose of Pfizer or Moderna vaccine at least 28 days after the initial two doses. Please contact your healthcare provider to find out if you should get an additional dose or

Additional doses and accine boosters are free at HCPH designated sites and vaccine appointments are not required, although recommended Go to vacstrac.hctx.net or call 832-927-8787. To find a location near you click here. Please remember to bring your COVID-19 vaccination card with you to receive a booster shot.

Body found in Liberty County **House Fire**

LIBERTY COUNTY -Law enforcement officers are investigating the death of a man found inside a home that was consumed by flames.

At about 1:30 a.m. Thursday, November 4th, the Liberty County Sheriff's Office received a call reporting a house fire on FM 160 North. According to Liberty County Fire

Bariatric Surgery Transforms Baytown Man's Life

BAYTOWN — (November 4, 2021) — The seed was planted while on a family vacation as Baytown resident Chris Chisum watched from a park bench as his family enjoyed a fun filled day at an amusement park.

"I had been a big guy for a long time, but I began to feel joint pain, especially in my knees, and having other health issues, such as high blood pressure," Chisum said. "We went on vacation to Universal Studios, but I couldn't ride a lot of the rides. Watching them having fun without me made me want to make a change."

For Chisum, an employee at Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital, the first step in changing his lifestyle and improving his health began by participating in a 2018 bariatric surgery seminar hosted by Dr. Laura Choi, a bariatric surgeon with the Houston Methodist Weight Loss Center at Baytown. With his weight hovering at around 360 pounds, Chisum decided that missing out on life was no longer an option.

"Looking at the way I was aging and the things I couldn't do the way I used to anymore made the deci-

sion for me," Chisum said. His initial appointment with Choi included a general assessment of his health to ensure that he was healthy enough to un-

dergo surgery.

"During the initial assessment, I discuss past weight issues and weight loss attempts to determine the proper pathway for each individual," Choi said.

The pre-surgery preparation process included consultations with a dietician, who discussed how dietary habits should be altered post-surgery, as well as counseling to determine any underlying emotional factors that may lead to obesity.

"While everyone has a special, personal journey, I think Chris had very similar characteristics that are common with most bariatric surgery patients. They are challenged by complicated medical conditions that seem overwhelming and weight loss attempts in the past that seemed to

always tell them it is impossible to succeed," Choi said. "All patients make this decision after much consideration, personal reflection and discussion with family."

Choi and Chisum decided the sleeve gastrectomy procedure would be best for helping him achieve his weight loss goals. The most commonly used operation for weight loss, the procedure re-shapes the stomach into a thin. sleeve-shaped organ that helps to limit the amount of food that can be consumed at a given time.

"This was chosen after careful consideration of surgery options that could include intestinal rerout $ing\ and\ malabsorption.\ We$ assessed the risks and benefits on both types of procedures and determined that effective restrictive help is what Chris was

looking for," Choi said. Chisum was placed on a liquid/soft diet-which he describes as "not the most pleasant"—immediately following the surgery, but says he began eating a regular, but revised diet after about two months.

Many bariatric surgery patients adhere to strict dietary plans post-surgery, but Chris says while he has not adopted a structured diet, he has developed a plan that works for

"I'm not really a structure guy. I eat if I'm hungrv. but I must be aware of what I eat. I gave up eating bread and cut way back on sweets because I have to focus on consuming enough nutrients, such as protein. Life is normal. I just eat a lot less," Chisum

Getting regular exercise is crucial to the post-surgery regimen for bariatric surgery patients. Chisum says he began jogging, bike riding and doing strength training about two months

following the procedure. Now more than 130 pounds lighter and feeling years younger, Chisum says Choi worked as a partner in his journey to

better health.
"Dr. Choi is down to earth and very real with you," Chisum said. "Anyone contemplating weight loss surgery should come and hear what she has to say. She will answer any questions you have."

Chisum says the surgery has transformed his life in ways he could not have imagined.

"It gave me so much more life. I can do more with my kids and my wife. I'm healthier and can even wear better clothes! Nothing I gave up in the process was as good as what I've gained. I wish I'd made the decision a long time ago."


