David L. King, Hillsboro, Texas INCREASE IN COVID-19 HOSPITALIZATIONS TRIGGERS INCREASE IN HARRIS COUNTY COVID-19 THREAT LEVEL

Harris County, Texas - January 10, 2022, Judge Lina Hidalgo today announced that she is raising the county's COVID-19 Threat Level Indicator from Level 2: Orange to Level 1: Red. A surge of the highly contagious Omicron variant has contributed to an increase in COVID transmission across Harris County.

Level 1 signifies a severe and uncontrolled level of COVID-19 transmission in Harris County. Residents experiencing symptoms should get tested and avoid con-



tact with others, assuming they have COVID until they confirm otherwise. Any gatherings should be held outdoors and ideally

with masking. Unvaccinated residents should avoid all gatherings and get vaccinated immediately.

"We're finding ourselves

again at a point in this pandemic where hospital staff are being stretched way too thin," said Judge Hidalgo. "We owe it to our nurses, doctors, and teachers to take steps to protect ourselves and give them a break. If you have been on the fence about getting vaccinated, now is the time to roll up your sleeve. We are in the midst of a COV-ID-19 tsunami and our best defense are vaccines and booster shots. We've been here before, but this time we have more tools available and a better understanding of this virus."

The COVID-19 vaccine and vaccine booster continues to be available at no charge for all Harris County residents. To find out more information, locations and hours, click ReadyHarris.org.

# Huffman Constable guilty of cocaine trafficking

### FORMER DEPUTY CONSTABLE CONVICTED IN COCAINE CONSPIRACY

HOUSTON - A 49-yearold Huffman resident has pleaded guilty to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute more than five kilograms of cocaine, announced U.S. Attorney Jennifer B. Lowery.

Alexsander S. Reyes is a former Harris County Precinct 1 deputy consta-

On or about Dec. 5, 2020, Reyes escorted a tractor-trailer in a marked constable vehicle through Houston. They believed it contained 10 kilograms of cocaine.

For his assistance, Reyes received a total of \$6000 in cash.

However, the drug load was actually part of an un-

dercover operation and included "dummy" or fake cocaine.

Sentencing has been set for March 22 before U.S. District Judge Charles R. Eskridge III. At that time, Reyes faces a minimum of 10 years and up to life in prison as well as a \$10 million maximum fine.

He has been and will remain in custody pending that hearing.

FBI Public Corruption conducted the investigation with assistance of Harris County Precinct 1 Constable's Office, Houston Police Department and Texas Department of Public Safety.

Assistant U.S. Attorneys Carolyn Ferko and Heather Winter are prosecuting the case.

Hidalgo said she made the decision because hospitalizations and ICU cases have spiked at area hospitals, along with the positivity rate.

"The 14-day average for COVID-positive ICU cases is now 18.1%; the positivity rate is now 35%," Hidalgo said. "For the sake of our hospitals and for the sake of our workforce, we have to sound the alarm once again."

This is the third time Harris County has been at level red, but Hidalgo said it could have been avoided this time if more people would get vaccinated and

Hidalgo also urged unvaccinated residents to mask up and avoid "all gatherings." Those who are vaccinated are asked to wear masks while indoors in public places and to avoid unvaccinated people. **UPDATE ON RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS AND PCR** 

Hidalgo said 120,000 rapid antigen tests will be provided to school districts across the county. She said the tests will help students and staff who are exposed to COVID-19 return to school sooner if they test negative.

She said thousands of PCR tests are still readily available at more than 10 county-wide sites. Another testing site will open Tuesday at Planet Ford Stadium in the Spring area. NO LOCKDOWNS

Under statewide orders from Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, local governments cannot enforce their own stay-at-home orders, as Abbott allowed them to do in the early stages of the pandemic.

Abbott's latest executive order related to the COV-ID-19 response, issued in July 2021, forbids local government entities from mandating closures and vaccinations.

"Business activities and legal proceedings are free to proceed without COV-ID-19-related limitations imposed by local governmental entities or officials," the order states.

Williams notes that her agency has helped housing, food, medical, rent, home repair after a disaster, ID cards, utility bills, and employment opportunities.

Eddie Williams is one of the founders and directors of the Marcelous Williams Resource Center, a division of the Talent Yield Coalition. They provide social services to the East Harris County population in need.

County Navigation Center for the Homeless, Inc.

Following the example of other Navigation Centers around Houston, the EHCNC plans on "supporting homeless clients on their journey from hopelessness to hopefulness."

The goal of the organization will be to serve and support individuals, families, and veterans, according to Kelchner.

They say that services and support programs will be administered by experienced case workers and program specialists.

In a promotional brochure issued by EHCNC. an extensive list of "project partners" is listed, including churches, Baytown social organizations, Harris County Precinct 2, Harris

County Sheriff's Department Homeless Outreach Team, and many others.

The Navigation Center is just in the early stages of fund raising, and establishing working relationships with its partners. Acquisiton of the residential property on Wallisville is still in the due-diligence stage. It does not expect to be operational until sometime near the end of 2022, according to Ramonia Williams.

Marcelous-Williams Resource Center receives funding from the United Way, who are also sponsoring a series of meetings termed "Passport to Change" dealing with the homeless problem. The next meeting is January







### Chambers County Sheriff's **Deputies** make drug arrest

Sheriff Brian Hawthorne reports, on Wednesday, December 30, 2021, Detectives with **Chambers County** Sheriff's Office **Covert Investigations** Unit conducted an operation targeting drug traffickers on the west side of Chambers County. Detectives observed a white male identified as Lee Thomas Harris, 46, of the 1200 block of Missouri Street, Baytown (Harris County), delivering over an ounce of methamphetamine in the 8700 Block of North State Highway 146, in Chambers County. Lee Thomas Harris was detained and placed into custody for Manufacture/ Delivery of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine) PG#1 greater than 4grams less than 200grams, a 1st



degree felony.

"Our Covert Investigative Unit will continue to investigate and pursue anyone dealing narcotics in Chambers County. Drug dealers from other counties will not get a free pass to sell narcotics in Chambers County. We will put forth our best effort to keep this activity away from our communities and prosecute these offenders to the fullest extent" said Sheriff Hawthorne.

# Major new development planned for Mont Belvieu

Mont Belvieu City Council has approved McGrath Real Estate Group's proposal to begin developing a 1,400acre piece of land on the corner of Eagle Drive and FM 565. What's currently being used as farmland, will become a new master-planned community called Riceland.

Scott Swigert, Interim City Manager, says "The City of Mont Belvieu is excited to partner with McGrath Real Estate Partners to bring the Riceland master-planned community into Mont Belvieu. The vision for Riceland underscores what people love about living in Mont Belvieu; a highquality high-amenity lifestyle that maintains our hometown feel. This is evident in the priority the developers have placed on working with the City to bring our vision of an authentic downtown, anchored by our new City Hall, into reality.

### Take control with migraine treatments

BAYTOWN - (December 23, 2021 - A migraine headache may trigger throbbing pain on one or both sides of the head, causing nausea, vomiting or sensitivity to light and sound. Dealing with migraine attacks can also be mentally and emotionally draining, especially when symptoms interfere with daily life.

If you suffer from migraine headaches, you probably know what it's like to spend hours or even days in a dark room coping with symptoms.

Researchers continue to learn about the science behind migraine headaches, and there are new and effective treatments providing hope for better migraine management. The latest treatments and medical advancements can help combat symptoms and prevent future attacks.

Specialized Treatment for

gIf migraine headaches disrupt your daily activities, you should see your doctor,+h said Dr. Olga Brusil, neurologist at Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital. "A primary care physician may refer you to a neurologist who can help identify migraine triggers and offer treatments for your specific needs." Depending on your symptoms and medical history, a combination of the following treatments may be helpful.

Preventive medications. For people who suffer frequent migraines, preventive therapy may include drugs commonly prescribed to treat heart disease, such as betablockers or calcium channel blockers. Prescription medications normally used to treat conditions, such as depression and seizures also may be helpful.

Monoclonal antibodies. Newer drugs, called calcitonin gene-related peptide (CGRP) monoclonal antibodies, may be given via injection or intravenous (IV) infusion. This type of treatment given every one to three months may help manage severe cases of chronic headaches and migraine.

BOTOX injections. "The same BOTOX, or botuli-

num toxin type A, used by plastic surgeons to treat facial wrinkles is also used to relieve chronic migraines, "shared Brusil. "With BOTOX treatment, I inject a tiny dose in certain areas of the head and neck to prevent migraine headaches. BOTOX may be helpful for migraines in two ways: it prevents muscle tension that can trigger migraines and blocks nerves that signal pain."

Alternative medicine. Nontraditional therapies may help relieve pain or reduce the number of migraines you have. Your doctor may encourage you to try the following as part of your treatment plan:

\* Relaxation techniques, such as biofeedback, meditation and yoga.

Acupuncture, which involves having a practitioner insert thin needles into the skin in certain ar-

\* Cognitive behavioral therapy (talk therapy), which can help you understand how thoughts and behaviors may affect your response to pain.



"Then why are you laughing, Doc?"


I guess we all were. Truth was, they couldn't trot out too many honors for Doc. Prince of a guy.



### State's Workforce surpasses Pre-Pandemic high

The Texas labor market exceeded the previous prepandemic high in February 2020 by hitting just under 13 million nonagricultural jobs in November, the Texas Workforce Commission reported last Friday. The adjusted jobless rate was 5.2% last month, down slightly from the previous month.

"Reaching this milestone for job creation in Texas shows the strength of our economy," TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel said.

The Amarillo area had the lowest unemployment rate among Texas Metropolitan Statistical Areas at 3.1%, followed by the Austin-Round Rock MSA at 3.2% and College Station-Bryan at 3.5%.

"Texas continues to reach unprecedented milestones thanks to our unwavering commitment to economic freedom and our young, skilled, growing, and diverse workforce," Gov. Greg Abbott said.

### PUC APPROVES ELECTRIC GRID RELIABILITY

MEASURES

The state <u>Public Utility</u>
<u>Commission</u> last week voted unanimously to enhance both short-term and long-term reliability of the state's electric grid through what it termed "major reforms" to the state's wholesale electricity market.

"In prior years, any single one of these changes would have been considered significant. Taken together, they are a generational shift in the Texas electricity market," said Peter Lake, PUC chairman. "This (is) a move away from the crisis-based business model we have operated under for the past two decades. This new model centers on reliability."

Some of the major

• Changes in the mathematical formula used to price electricity when reserves become scarce. The change will provide earlier price signals to add additional generation of power and for large consumers to reduce demand.

• Increasing incentives for large consumers to cut usage when the grid needs additional power.

• New or revamped ancillary services that increase the capacity for generators to react to sudden swings in electricity supply and demand.

Phase two of the process will provide "long-term incentives for investment in reliable power generation infrastructure to ensure Texas will have the power the state's needs for decades," according to the news release.

A total of 469 people working in Texas died in work-related incidents in 2020, according to the Texas Department of Insurance. That is a 23% decrease from 2019. The state's incident rate for fatalities was 3.9 per 100,000 full-time employees in 2020, while the national incident rate stood

The construction industry accounted for 27% of the fatalities, with 127 incidents, according to TDI. Fatalities in the transportation and warehousing industries had the second highest, accounting for 20.4% with 96 people killed. Natural resources and mining recorded the third-highest number with 54 fatalities, or 11.5%.

### RAISING THE BAR FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

The Commissioner of Higher Education said last week the state is raising the bar for higher education. In an address before nearly 200 higher education leaders, Harrison Keller released "an ambitious vision for higher education," according to a news release from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The updated strategic plan for the state's higher education system includes:

- Adding a new goal for 35- to 64-year-olds who need new skills to compete in today's economy.
- A broader range of postsecondary credentials of value to fit workforce needs.
  The goal of students
- The goal of students having no college debt or at least a low, manageable debt.
- A greater focus on research and development to drive innovation.
- Renewing the state's commitment to advancing equity for all Texans to complete post secondary degrees and certificates.

Keller called the present time "the greatest opportunity since the end of World War II to make an impact in higher education."

"As we emerge from the global pandemic, we arrive at another defining moment in history," he said. "In Texas, the window of opportunity is open for us

to work together to advance and enhance this vision for higher education and enrich the lives of generations to come."

### VACCINE BATTLE MANDATE LIKELY HEADED TO SUPREME COURT

The fight over a federal COVID-19 mandate for companies with more than 100 employees is likely headed to the U.S. Supreme Court after the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals overruled a lower-court decision that had paused the mandate nationwide. The mandate from the U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration is now scheduled to take effect Jan. 4.

Republican state attorneys general in 27 states, including Texas, are suing OSHA over the mandate, joined by conservative groups, business associations and individual businesses, The Dallas Morning News reported.

The Biden administration issued a statement after the appeals court ruling: "Especially as the U.S. faces the highly transmissible Omicron variant, it's critical we move forward with vaccination requirements and protections for workers with the urgency needed in this moment."

Meanwhile, Abbott announced last week that he had sent a letter to U.S. Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin reaffirming the state would not enforce the mandate on members of the Texas National Guard.

"The state of Texas will not enforce this latest COVID-19 vaccine mandate against its guardsmen," Abbott said. "If the federal government keeps threatening to defund the Texas National Guard, I will deploy every legal tool available to me as governor in defense of these American heroes."

The number of new cases of COVID-19 reported last week stood at 36,508, according to the Coronavirus Resource

the <u>Coronavirus Resource</u> <u>Center</u> at Johns Hopkins University, down slightly from the previous week, while deaths rose to 478.

The number of law-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations totaled 3,117 on Sunday, virtually unchanged from the previous week, according to the Texas State Department of Health Services.

I walk around my neighborhood later in the evening these days, mostly so I can see the lights.

There are some impressive houses just a mile or so away, and I walk down the sidewalks and see what has appeared on the lawns and in the windows now, right before Christmas.

Some of the houses clearly had outside assistance. There are lights hung in places that only a cherry picker could reach. One house had four such enormous trees in a row, all in uniform white lights, until the top half of one of them went out (which completely spoiled the look) and all four trees have been dark ever since.

I see florist vans parked outside some houses as elaborate arrangements of pine and birch and colored berries are delivered. The result is splendid, if a little predictable. Some houses have an electric candle in every window-and there are a lot of windows. Some have put a lit Christmas tree in the attic window. One house has matching trees shining out of two windows on the second floor, decorated in brilliant red lights. It's a stunning sight.

But the thing that stopped me in my tracks the other night was a single small tree and a woman stringing lights just before Christmas.

It was dark, and I was across the street. The house was large and old and on the porch was a skinny tree—a live Christmas tree—and there was a woman stringing lights around it. The woman was also old. Her movements were slow, and I could see she was a little bent over. But she was determined to decorate this little tree, standing to the side of her front door, and I watched as the lit bulbs were wound with infinite care around the narrow tree frame.

Progress was slow. But it was a warm night and the action, for some reason, transfixed me. The woman had large golden bulbs wound around the center of the tree from the bottom to the top, and now she was winding smaller golden lights around the exterior of the branches. The lights were nested densely together, and it looked as if the tree was ablaze with warm yellow light. It was the only decoration in the front of her big house, and I could tell she was determined to get it exactly right. And, by the end, it was. Her little tree, covered in golden lights of different sizes, was this small, perfect thing, blazing from her porch, visible up and down

Something about that tree made my heart hurt.

I wanted to tell that woman how much at least one passer-by appreciated her small, bright tree, and how I knew how long and hard she'd worked to get it right. I wanted to tell her that, while the season is short, I will enjoy her tree every time I walk by it, and I will remember it long after it is taken down.

But it was more than that.

I wanted to be like that woman who did this one beautiful thing so well. I wanted to be like her tree that shone so brightly from the porch, creating a sort of magic that stopped me on the sidewalk. I wanted to lift someone's spirits in the way that tree lifted mine and be a reminder of the small, bright things that fill our lives if we only stop long enough to enjoy them.

But the best I can do is to tell you about it. And so I have.
