
# **GREAT FINAL WEEKEND FOR CROSBY RODEO**

# Abbott orders School Safety Study instead of Special Session on guns

AUSTIN - In lieu of calling a special session of the legislature to deal with new regulations to curb mass shootings, as requested by several state legislators, Governor Greg Abbott today sent a joint letter to Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick and Speaker Dade Phelan requesting the Texas legislative leaders convene special legislative committees following last week's tragic shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde. The special legislative committees will be charged with examining and developing legislative recommendations on school safety, mental health, social media,

police training, firearm safety, and more.

"As Texans mourn the tragedy that occurred at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde last week, we as a State must reassess the twin issues of school safety and mass violence," reads the letter. "As leaders, we must come together at this time to provide solutions to protect all Texans. Accordingly, I hereby request that each of you convene a special legislative committee. I look forward to working with you both on this important mission to make Texas safer, and I stand ready to provide any and all sup-

The tragedy that occurred in Uvalde ISD is truly devastating. Our hearts go out to the families and educators that have experienced this horrific crisis.

School safety is on the forefront of our minds at this moment, as it is for every school district. Goose Creek CISD has implemented measures that have strengthened the safety and security of our schools over the past few years. We have established a district standard for perimeter fencing, which has been installed at all of our schools. We have also constructed safety vestibules at all campuses, which help protect the front en-

try point at every campus. Our primary focus continues to be the safety of our students and staff while they are in our care. We have grown our police department staff to 20 police officers and have doubled the size of our security of-

ficers as well. We have tak-

en these measures because

we know they will help keep students and staff safe.

Our Social Emotional Learning department, which has grown from two staff members to almost 15 social emotional workers over the last two years, provides resources and assistance for students and faculty who need support in the areas of mental health and wellbeing.

While these measures help increase the safety of our schools, we are being vigilant in our discussions and actions about school safety and how we can continually strengthen our efforts. In light of the Uvalde shooting, we are currently in the process of reviewing our safety procedures and practices to ensure Goose Creek provides the safest learning environment for our students and staff.

## **District Celebrates Opening of** Two Newest Facilities with **Ribbon Cuttings**

Goose Creek CISD is on the fast track to growth. With 30 campuses and counting, the district is looking forward to servicing the needs of its 24,000 students for many years to come.

The district celebrated the ribbon cuttings of their two newest elementary campuses, Jessie Lee Pumphrey and San Jacinto Elementary Schools, on May 25<sup>th</sup>. Former and current student and staff members, members of the community, GCCISD Board members, Baytown City Council members, and district representatives were eager to tour the new facilities, including the Early Learning Academy wings.

The campuses have been staples in the Goose Creek community for many years. Pumphrey, which opened in June 1970, was the first campus named after a local individual. Ms. Pumphrey was the district's first woman principal who began her career at De Zavala Elementary in 1928.

The campus was closed on March 30, 2009. Members of the Baytown community spoke in favor of naming Elementary School #17 after Pumphrey, and May 17, 2021, the Board unanimously approved that decision. The campus is located in the middle of the newly-developed Ashbel Cove community. "I am so thankful that the Superintendent and Board saw fit to allow me to lead this campus," Renee Meyer, Principal of Pumphrey, said. "Ms. Pumphrey's legacy will live on in the students the campus will educate for years to come."

San Jacinto Elementary School was built in 1930. The school was destroyed by fire in December of 1979 and rebuilt in 1982. Principal Luis Munoz was overwhelmed with emotion. "I am so grateful that I am able to lead the school where I once walked the halls as a student," he said. "So many of us share the same sentiment and I know this campus will be a beacon of light for many years to come."

Members of the Goose Creek Masonic Lodge #1192 performed dedication ceremonies for each campus and provided them with cornerstones that will be prominently fixed on the facility's exterior.

San Jacinto and Pumphrey Elementary Schools will officially open their doors to students for the 2022-2023 school year.

Our Athletics Department is hosting several summer camps in June at Crosby High School, from boys' and girls' basketball to softball and volleyball. Football camp for incoming 3rd through 8th graders will be August 2nd and 3rd at Cougar Stadium. We have the camp registration forms posted on the District's Athletics website. I also want to thank the "Barrett Economic and Community Development Organization" for supporting the Barrett Youth Enrichment Summer Camp through August. It's a vital program to ensure our students are engaged physically and academically while school is out for

the summer. Crosby ISD's spring testing season was a success, both in terms of the scores and in terms of processing 10,000 exams, mostly electronically. Our curriculum and technology teams did an outstanding job. I know parents are interested in seeing their students' results. The

# Family of 11 Loses Everything in House Fire Near Dayton

DAYTON - A mother, father and their nine children who live near Dayton lost everything in a house fire Wednesday.

"I'm going to be okay. I just wish my kids didn't have to go through this." mom Jerene Buckles said.

Some of their children have special needs and take medication.

The walls are the only thing left standing at Jerene Buckle's home.

"I think I'm still in shock. I think I'm still numb," she said.

Jerene and her husband have nine children. Their youngest is six and the oldest is 20 years old. On Wednesday, their lives were forever changed.

"This was our dream home," Jerene said. "We had finally found a home that was going to work for not only just what we wanted but also for our three non-ambulatory children. It was big and had the land."

Jerene shared pictures of

the intense flames that destroyed the two-story home. The fire torched trees and melted the family's van. Another car was also totaled.

Fire crews came back to the home on Thursday to put out various hot spots. Denny Loonam with Liberty County Emergency District No. 3 says the call came in as a kitchen fire. He lives down the road from the home and the fire station.

"By the time we pulled back in here, this house was totally involved. It was the hottest fire that we've had out here in a long time," Loonam said. The Liberty County Fire

Marshal says the cause of

the blaze is under investigation. Thankfully everyone made it out safely.

"There were a lot of tears, especially from our 20year-old," Jerene said. "She was adopted from Ukraine several years ago."

Jerene is still trying to process what happened and hates her family has to start over. She says her children lost their musical instruments and books.

# Fighting Cancer with your Fork

Does what you eat really make a difference in your risk for cancer? Many experts agree that making better choices about what you put on your plate is one way to protect against the cell changes or mutations, that can lead to cancer. Although some risks for cancer are out of your control, choosing a healthy diet is one way to take action. "A diet rich in fruits and vegetables may help protect against some types of cancer," said Dr. Ugochukwu A. Odo, an oncologist at Houston Methodist Neal Cancer Center at Baytown. "Plant-based foods contain vitamins, minerals and antioxidants that can provide some cancer protection as part of an overall healthy diet."

Your Diet and Cancer

Risk Antioxidants are important nutrients, such as beta-carotene, lycopene, lutein, and vitamins A, C and E. These healthy nutrients are abundant in fruits, vegetables, nuts and grains. Antioxidants help protect body cells from damage caused by unstable molecules, called free radicals. "Free radicals can damage DNA and may play a role in the development of cancer, so we're looking at how antioxidants may help work against free radicals," Odo explained. More research is needed to understand the links between diet and cancer, but there's some evidence to suggest that antioxidants and other nutrients in foods may fight cancer by:

\*Destroying free radicals that damage DNA, which can lead to cancer

\*Helping to eliminate carcinogens (cancer-causing substances)

\*Blocking the activation of carcinogens

Sources of Antioxidants Here's where you can find antioxidants in foods:

\*Vitamin A: liver, dairy products, eggs and fish liver oil. It's also converted from carotenoids, found in dark-red, green and yellow vegetables

\*Vitamin C: citrus fruits, tomatoes, peppers, broccoli, leafy vegetables, strawberries and potatoes

\*Vitamin D: milk, coldwater fish, egg yolks and liver

\*Vitamin E: avocado,

coconut or olive oils; sweet potatoes; avocados; nuts; sunflower seeds; and soy-\*Allyl sulfides: garlic,

onions, shallots, leeks, chives and scallions

\*Carotenoids: apricots, papaya, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, mangoes, carrots, pumpkin, red peppers, spinach, corn and canta-

\*Catechins: green tea and berries

\*Flavonoids: parsley, carrots, citrus fruits, broccoli, cabbage, cucumbers, squash, tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, soybeans and berries

\*Folate: avocados, bananas, orange juice, cold cereal, asparagus, green leafy vegetables, dried beans, peas and yeast

\*Lycopene: cooked tomato products, watermelon and pink grapefruit

FOODS TO KNOW

Odo recommends eating at least five servings of fruit and vegetables each day. "Try to fill two-thirds of your plate with plantbased foods, and choose a variety of colorful fruits and vegetables," Odo added. Here are some cancerfighting foods you may want to add to your shopping cart:

\*Berries — Fruits like strawberries and blueberries are loaded with antioxidants, which have cancer-fighting properties.

\*Tomatoes — Tomatoes are rich in lycopene, a powerful plant compound that may protect against prostate cancer.

\*Whole grains — Whole grains can help reduce your risk of colon cancer. Be sure to check ingredient labels on breads and other grains and look for the words "100% whole grain."

\*Red-orange fruits and  $vegetables -- Foods, \, such \,$ as butternut squash and sweet potatoes, are rich in beta-carotene which acts as an antioxidant to help protect cells from damage.

\*Coffee — Your morning cup of java contains a variety of plant compounds that may be protective for some cancers.

\*Dark-green leafy vegetables - Kale, spinach, romaine lettuce and other green, leafy vegetables are excellent sources of fiber, lutein and flavonoids. These substances may help protect against mouth, pharynx and larynx cancers.

\*Green tea — Laboratory studies have suggested that green tea may help slow the development of colon, liver, breast and prostate cancers.

FOODS TO LIMIT Grilled and red meats -Red meat has been linked to colorectal and other cancers. Grilling meat over high heat can additionally form cancer-causing agents. Instead, opt for grilled vegetables, which do not create carcinogens when exposed to high heat.

#### Cornyn Discusses Ukraine Visit and Support for Aid

'The Ukrainians' spirit and will to defend their country remains unbroken and undaunted, and Putin's plans have failed, and failed miserably. We saw this firsthand when we had a chance to visit Kyiv this weekend.'

'This funding, this support, this military and humanitarian support, is not strictly an act of altruism on our part. We are doing this also because allowing Ukraine to defend itself is in our best interest.'

'The cost of the United States doing nothing, of simply turning over this democracy, and our security, and our economy to Putin, well, that's greater than any cost that could come by a supplemental appropriation.'

WASHINGTON - On the floor, U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) discussed last week's congressional delegation trip to Ukraine, Sweden, and Finland, and how the U.S. benefits from helping Ukraine. Excerpts of Sen. Cornyn's remarks are below.

"We visited not only President Zelensky in the presidential palace but also visited two of what we hope will be the next members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, namely, Sweden and Finland."

"The Ukrainians' spirit and will to defend their country remains unbroken and undaunted, and Putin's plans have failed, and failed miserably. We saw this firsthand when we had a chance to visit Kyiv this weekend."

"He and his advisors warned us about the possibility of global food shortages caused by Russian blockade[s] of Ukrainian ports. This will lead to widespread famine not just in Europe, but throughout Africa, and spread the pain far afield from Europe."

"This week, as we know, the Senate will consider a supplemental funding bill to provide Ukraine with even more security and humanitarian assistance. I know there are some who disagree with more funding for Ukraine. To them, I would say this funding, this support, this military and humanitarian support, is not strictly an act of altruism on our part. We are doing this also because allowing Ukraine to defend itself is in our best interest."

"We can't kid ourselves by thinking Putin would simply end with his brutal conquest of Ukraine."

"Of course, in this situation, the cost of the United States doing nothing, of simply turning over this democracy, and our security, and our economy to Putin, well, that's greater than any cost that could come by a supplemental appropri-

"I'm grateful to Leader McConnell for putting together this past weekend's trip. I found it enormously educational."

Senator John Cornyn, a Republican from Texas, is a member of the Senate Finance, Intelligence, and Judiciary Committees.

### Gunman Walked into School Building Unopposed

The gunman who killed 21 people inside a Uvalde elementary school walked into the unlocked building unopposed, the Department of Public Safety said in a revised statement, as reported by the Austin American-Statesman and other media sources.

After the gunman crashed his grandmother's truck in a ditch, he walked into the building while firing a semiautomatic weapon purchased just after days 18th birthday. The shooter was inside a classroom for about an hour. Nineteen children and two teachers were killed before a tactical team got inside the building and killed him.

The massacre is the second-deadliest school shooting in modern U.S. history.

#### **FIVE TEXAS REFINERIES EXCEED BENZENE LIMIT**

Five Texas refineries and one in Louisiana operated by a San Antonio company last year exceeded federal pollution limits for benzene emissions, which is listed as a carcinogenic chemical by the **Environmental Protection** Agency. Long-term exposure to benzene has caused blood disorders, according to a story in the San Antonio Express- $\underline{\text{News}}$ .

"In Texas, Marathon Petroleum's Galveston Bay refinery, TotalEnergies' Port Arthur refinery, Chevron's Pasadena refinery, Flint Hills Resources' Corpus Christi East refinery and LyondellBasell's Houston refinery reported average benzene emissions in 2021 that were above the federal threshold of 9 micrograms per cubic meter," the Express-News reported.

More than 6 million people in the United States live within 3 miles



of an oil refinery, according to the EPA.

#### **BOATERS URGED TO** 'CLEAN, DRAIN, AND DRY'

As summer approaches and Texans head to the state's lakes and rivers, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department urges boaters and paddlers to do their part to prevent the spread of invasive aquatic species that are threatening Texas lakes.

"The best way to prevent the spread of many destructive aquatic invasive species is to clean, drain and dry your boats and equipment - every time," Brian Van Zee, TPWD inland fisheries regional director, said.

Zebra mussels and giant salvinia continue to spread to new waterbodies in the state. Other highly invasive species that can be spread by boaters include water hyacinth, crested floating heart and quagga mussels.

"Boaters need to remove all plants, mud and debris from boats, trailers. vehicles and gear and drain the water from the boat, all equipment and on-board receptacles before leaving the lake. In addition, boats should be dried completely before visiting another lake, preferably for at least a week," the news release said.

#### **NEARLY \$5 MILLION IN** TRAIL GRANTS ANNOUNCED

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week awarded \$4.8 million in grants to fund 17 recreational trail-related projects across the state.

One million dollars of the amount allocated came directly from state Sporting Good Sales Tax funds dedicated to the Recreational Trails Program through a measure passed in the last legislative session.

The rest of the funding comes from a portion of the federal gas tax generated by gasoline purchases for off-road vehicles. Under the National Recreational Trails Fund, 30% of total grants it awards goes for motorized trails, with an equal amount going for non-motorized trails, while the rest is discretionary.

#### **WILDFIRE RISK ABATES SLIGHTLY**

Recent rainfall has reduced the potential for widespread wildfires for much, but not all, of the state, according to the Texas A&M Forest Service. However, hot and windy conditions are expected to return this week, bringing with them the increased risk of more wildfires, particularly in the Rolling Plains, Hill Country and South Texas areas of the state.

As of Friday, there was one active wildfire, in Taylor County. The Mesquite Heat Fire consumed nearly 11,000 acres and was 82% contained. There are currently 132 counties with burn bans.





Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.






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
