

HOUSTON - Ten trail rides converged on Memorial Park last Friday night, after a week on the road from their origin cities.

In our readership area, two trail rides made the trek, stopping along the way about six times to rest, sleep and prepare for the next day. Many also

shared the experience with local residents who visited the campsites, and elementary schools such as Sheldon and Hilliard Elementary.

The Northeastern Trail Ride and the Spanish Trail Ride are the two that come through our area on the way into Memorial Park.

The Northeastern Trail Ride starts in Cheeks, Texas near Beaumont, travels 111 miles with 55 riders and 19 wagons.

Trail Rides trek through **CROSBY ISD VOTES FOR** 4 DAY SCHOOL WEEK

CROSBY — The Crosby Independent School District Board of Trustees approved moving to a four-day instructional week starting next school year, at their board meeting Monday night.

Crosby ISD is the largest district in Texas to make the decision and the first in Harris County.

The change will help recruit and retain both school teachers and bus drivers, accoring to Crosby ISD Superintendent Pau-

la Patterson. When the 2023-2024 school year begins, Fridays will be considered student holidays, the district said. Teachers and staff will work one Friday a month for "staff development."

An additional 20 to 25 minutes will be added to the school days to compensate for the three-day weekend.

Crosby ISD superintendent Paula Patterson said she hopes the move to a four-day school week will attract more teachers to the district. Crosby ISD started this school year down 40 teachers and they expected that number to get worse next year.

"We want to find, recruit and retain the best teachers in the state in the classrooms for our students," Patterson said. "The change immediately makes Crosby ISD a top destination for educators in Harris County. Our move will attract even more exceptional teachers for our students, leading to high-quality academic outcomes. We also believe this move will increase our recruitment of bus drivers, who are vital in getting our students to



and from school safely and on time."

The vote for the new instructional calendar was closer than people may think with four board members giving the new instructional calendar approval and three others giving it a thumbs down. Crosby ISD board of trustees members Karen Thomas, school board President J.R. Humphries, Lisa Kallies and Phillip Chapman voted in favor of the 4-day school week.

Trustee President Humphries said "In my personal view, the 4-day calendar recommendation from Superintendent Patterson and her administration was a bold, stra-Continued. See Crosby



Mont Belvieu FD Receives \$5,000 Grant for New Thermal Imaging Cameras

Mont Belvieu, TX (February 20, 2023) - The Mont Belvieu Fire Department has received a \$5,000 grant award from Motiva Enterprises to purchase new thermal imaging cam-

The specialized cameras can help firefighters make better decisions in an emergency and provide incident commanders with the technology to see hot spots from an exterior.

The Mont Belvieu Fire Department is one of 23 emergency response organizations across six states that received a total of nearly \$159,000 in funding through the Motiva First Responder Grant Program, which is designed to support first responders in communities that host Motiva assets.

"We greatly appreciate

the support that Motiva is providing to enhance public safety in in Mont Belvieu by making it possible for us to purchase new thermal imaging cameras," said City of Mont Belvieu Fire Chief Lee Atchison. "Thermal imaging cameras make our operations safer by allowing our firefighters to have a clearer picture of the emergency. What is Cardiac Arrest? other vital organs aren't getting February is American Heart Month, a time when everyone adequate blood flow, it leads to

can focus on their cardiovascular health. Your heart is one of the most important organs in your body. So, it is important to recognize when you may have a problem with your

The heart pumps blood to every other organ, providing the constant supply of oxygen and nutrients these systems need to function. This process is also involved in removing harmful metabolic waste, like carbon dioxide.

If the heart stops working properly, as is the case with cardiac arrest, your entire body also shuts down.

"Cardiac arrest is when the heart suddenly stops functioning. In most cases, this results from certain malignant abnormal heart rhythms or arrhythmias," explains Dr. Nene Linda Ugoeke, a cardiologist at Houston Methodist.

Arrhythmias result from problems with the heart's electrical system. Not all arrhythmias are immediately harmful. But some, including ventricular fibrillation (v-fib) and ventricular tachycardia, can develop suddenly and lead to cardiac arrest.

"These types of irregular rhythms disrupt the heart's ability to pump blood effectively," explains Dr. Ugoeke. "When the brain, lungs and

loss of consciousness and breathing, as well as organ damage and eventually death."

Depending on the underlying arrhythmia, some cardiac arrests can be treated by shocking the heart back into a normal rhythm using a defibrillator device. Regardless of the underlying heart rhythm during cardiac arrest, immediate cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is of utmost importance in increasing the chances of surviving a cardiac arrest or at least having the best possible outcome.

What causes cardiac ar-

"One of the most common causes of cardiac arrest is a heart attack," explains Dr. Ugoeke. "As blood flow to the heart is reduced, the injury experienced can set off cardiac arrest by triggering one of the dangerous rhythms."

But a person with no known heart issues can also experience sudden cardiac arrest.

"There are genetic disorders that can make a person more prone to arrhythmias and, therefore, cardiac arrest," explains Dr. Ugoeke. "For instance, cardiac channelopathy disorders affect how electricity transverses through the heart, setting a person up for arrhyth-

Cardiac arrest vs. heart

The terms heart attack and cardiac arrest are frequently used as synonyms, but in fact, they are unique conditions that should be understood distinct-

While "cardiac arrest" is a term that generally describes the abrupt cessation of heart function, "heart attack", formally known as myocardial infarction, specifically results from compromised blood flow to portions of the heart muscle. which occurs when the arteries supplying blood to the heart muscles become blocked. Failure to deliver enough oxygenated and nutrient-rich blood to the heart leads to the damage of heart muscle. This, in turn, can affect the heart's rhythm and cause cardiac arrest.

A common cause of heart attack is coronary artery disease, a heart condition in which the coronary arteries narrow over time because of plaque buildup,

a process called atherosclerosis. Sudden rupture of these plaques can cause complete blockage of the affected artery, resulting in a heart attack.

How to prevent cardiac

Various heart conditions and medical conditions, in general, can predispose to cardiac arrest. Heart attacks resulting from coronary artery disease are a common cause. Therefore, taking steps to reduce your risk of developing coronary artery disease, or working with your doctor to establish an effective plan for managing the condition if you already have it, will reduce your risk of having a cardiac arrest from coronary artery disease.

Living a healthy lifestyle eating a well-balanced, heart-

Since cardiac arrest can occur in people who don't have coronary artery disease, you may be wondering whether there are ways to screen for

people who might be at increased risk of having cardiac arrest due to other heart conditions.

"We have ways to screen for conditions that may increase the risk of cardiac arrest, but screening isn't appropriate for everyone," adds Dr. Ugoeke. "Since we know these conditions can run in families, there are questions we ask first to help determine a person's risk."

Having a family member who died suddenly at a young age usually prompts screening. Further tests are then done based on the results of the initial screening. In most cases, an electrocardiogram (ECG or EKG), which is a test that records the electrical signals of the heart, is a good starting point. However, some other imaging tests and even genetic testing on occasion are done

Despite what we know about preventing cardiac arrests, they can occur unexpectedly. Therefore, Dr. Ugoeke emphasizes the importance of learning how to perform CPR, to ensure readiness when help is needed.




Harris County Crime Stats

2022 HARRIS COUNTY CRIME STATS

During the last election, the severity of crime in Harris County was hotly debated. The final numbers for 2022 are now available from the Texas Department of Safety and they paint a mixed picture. In some of the more serious categories, there was some improvement last year but the levels remain well above where they stood a decade ago. Robberies and burglaries both continued a long-standing trend downward, but other property crimes continued to climb with double digit increases in 2022.


HOMICIDE, RAPES & ASSAULTS



In the late 1980s and early 1990s, Houston was going through its last crime wave. Homicides topped out in 1990 at 734. However, from there, homicides steadily declined for the next twenty years, hitting a low of 264 in 2011. Considering the population of Harris County grew by about 70% during that same period, the decline was truly remarkable.


However, after 2011, homicides began creeping up and then skyrocketed higher in 2020 and 2021. The 631 homicides in 2021 was the highest level since 1990. In 2022, homicides declined slightly to 578 (-8%) but were still nearly double the number of homicides a decade ago.

The trend for rapes and assaults tracked fairly close to homicides.



ROBBERIES & BURGLARIES

Interestingly, the trend for robberies and burglaries was almost the opposite of homicides, rapes and assaults. Both began the last decade well below the peak in Houston's last crime wave in the early 1990s and have continued to track lower. Robberies took a particularly sharp downturn starting in 2021 and fell again in 2022 to just over 9,000. That is as low a level as I could find going back for thirty years.



THEFT

The DPS has two categories of theft that it reports in its Index Crime Summary - larceny and auto theft. Larceny is basically any kind of theft that does not involve physically taking someone's property from them by force, which is robbery, and breaking into a home or business to steal something, which is burglary.

Both larceny and auto theft have also been generally declining for the last thirty years. Improvements in vehicle security systems resulted in a large reduction when those technologies were first rolled out.

However, both reached their nadir in 2018 and have been steadily climbing since. Both saw an 11% increase in 2022


I have been watching Houston's crime stats for nearly thirty years. I have learned over that time that crime is an incredibly complex phenomenon, which defies simple explanations as to why it goes up or down. Also, while local factors like the effectiveness of the local criminal justice system and a community's cohesiveness play a large part, there are also national marco factors that effect it. For example, our nation's decision to largely deinstitutionalize mental health care in the 60s and 70s has tremendously affected the criminal justice system.

Many have speculated that the pandemic affected crime rates, citing various possible effects. While some of that conjecture seems to make some intuitive sense, it is hard to find much support for the pandemic having any outsize effects in the stats. For example, some speculated that the $\,$ stress of the pandemic and associated lockdowns would cause more violence, especially family violence. But while homicides certainly took a spike upward at the beginning of the pandemic, assaults have slightly declined throughout the pandemic.

However, I do not think that it can be seriously doubted that the more lenient bond practices of many of the Democratic judges elected since 2018, combined with the huge case backlogs, have contributed to much of the increase in serious violent crimes, especially murders, in Harris County recently. Crime Stoppers has documented more than enough specific instances to show that has been a significant driver of the increase.

The precipitous drop in violent crime in Harris County that began in the early 1990s was a national phenomenon. Nationally, the murder rate in the U.S. dropped by half between 1990 and 2006. And for most of the last decade, the rates have remained relatively low. Those lower levels of crime became our new norm. So, it is hardly surprising that Americans would be anxious about the spike in violent crime over the last three years. Unless and until we return to those norms, I expect that crime will continue to be on the public's mind and a leading issue in elections.





Street Takeover Spurs Governor's Action

Gov. Greg Abbott has created a statewide task force after several "street takeovers" recently took place in Austin in which motorists obstructed intersections, shot off fireworks and drove recklessly.

Videos posted after the events showed vehicles doing donuts, crowds gathering around intersections, and people setting off fireworks, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

Seven people were arrested in the incidents, which occurred at four Austin intersec-

Abbott directed the Texas Department of Public Safety to investigate the events and "target the organized crime aspect" of the events, according to The Dallas Morning News.

"We are seeing fireworks fired at officers in crowds, lasers pointed at aircraft, drivers driving upwards of 130 miles per hour with no lights on in the dark of night - all of it is reckless, and it needs to be stopped," DPS Director Steve McCraw said.

Additional arrests are expected, law enforcement officials said.

TXDOT PROPOSES \$100 BILLION TRANSPORTATION PLAN

The Texas Department of Transportation is proposing a record \$100 billion, 10-year transportation plan to improve congestion, increase safety and maintain the state's roadways. That's a \$15 billion increase over the original plan and comes after record projected revenue for the state, generated by oil and gas fees that are dedicated to highway projects.

The latest plan would increase funding in a number of areas, including "safety, energy sector, rural and urban connectivity, border infrastructure, maintenance and preservation," according to a TxDOT statement.

"Safety is a top priority for TxDOT, and these funding levels reflect that," TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams said.

TxDOT now has more than \$33 billion in transportation projects under construction throughout the state. More than 7,000 projects are either underway or scheduled to break ground this year.



BILLS WOULD BAN COVID RESTRICTIONS

A trio of bills by state Rep. Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham, would address Gov. Greg Abbott's calls to end COVID-related restrictions put in place as the pandemic began in

"This legislation is aimed at preventing future repeats of these controversial public health measures, which did little to slow the spread of the virus and did serious damage to the economy and education systems," Kolkhorst said in a statement, as reported by the Statesman.

The measures, if passed, would codify executive measures issued by Abbott in 2021 that prohibited employer or governmental COVID-19 mandates requiring people to wear masks or to be vaccinated.

Since Abbott has made the COVID-19 package an emergency measure, it bypasses many of the rules put in place by the state constitution to slow passage of legislation, the Statesman reported.

SENATE REVIVES EFFORT TO MAKE ILLEGAL VOTING A FELONY

After lowering the penalty for illegal voting to a misdemeanor in 2021, leaders in the Texas Senate appear poised to again raise the penalty to a second-degree felony, the Texas Tribune reported. Legislation filed by state Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, would also modify the standard for determining a person's intent to vote illegally.

Current law says a person commits a crime if they "knowingly or intentionally" vote or attempt to vote and know they are not eligible. Under Hughes' bill, the language changes that to say anyone who votes or attempts to vote in an election in which "the person knows of a particular circumstance that makes the person not eligible to vote" could be charged.

That means, for example, that someone who knows they are not a U.S. citizen but did not know they were ineligible to vote could still be prosecuted. An attorney with the Texas Civil Rights Project criticized the proposed change as a "very nasty and very potentially consequential provi-

"That is why this intent requirement exists, because it's not fair for people to go to jail for good-faith mistakes," attorney James Slattery said.

STATE COULD FOOT AG **OFFICE'S LEGAL BILL**

A \$3.3 million settlement of a whistleblower complaint filed against the Texas attorney general's office should be paid by the state and not personally by Attorney General Ken Paxton, an agency attorney said. The AG's chief of general litigation told lawmakers that the agency, not Paxton personally, is the defendant under the Texas Whistleblower Act, and that taking the case to trial would cost even more.

"The agreement itself is contingent on legislative funding," he said. "It's a settlement that we made in order to save money for the state of Texas. It was the prudent thing to do to minimize litigation risk," Chris Hilton of the AG's office said, according to kut.org.

However, House Speaker Dade Phelan has said he does not support using taxpayer dollars for the settlement. Abbott has said "this is an issue that the attorney general is going to have to fully explain to both the House and the Senate."

TEA RELEASES TEACHER VACANCY RECOMMENDATIONS

A task force appointed last year by the Texas Education Agency has released its recommendations to address the teacher and staff vacancy crisis in Texas, as record numbers of both leave the education field in the wake of the pandemic and other issues.

The Teacher Vacancy Task Force, established last March, was comprised of teachers and school system leaders from across the state. The recommendations include:

- A significant increase in overall teacher salaries
- Enhancing teachers' total compensation package, including reducing cost of health care insurance.
- Provide incentives and support for hard-to-staff areas, such as special education and bilingual education teachers.
- Improve the pipeline and pre-service preparation of novice teachers. · Expand training and sup-
- port for teacher mentorship.
- Provide access and support for high-quality instruc-
- tional materials. Demonstrate respect and value for teacher time.
- School culture and discipline supports.

The task force urged the Legislature to increase funding for teacher salaries, noting the state ranks 28th in the nation for average teacher salary.

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

tegic move that evolved after much deliberation with her team as well as with feedback from the staff, the students and the community at large," said Board of Trustees President J.R. Humphries.

The majority of parents that were present during the vote Monday supported the move, but the district's latest survey found 41% of respondents wanted to stick with a five-day school week because they were concerned about the

inability of families to find and pay for childcare.

"I do feel for those family members that don't have someone to stay at home with them, but at the end of the day, we're going to have a whole lot less days if we don't have teachers in the classroom," Angela Hayes said. "So four good days are better than five days where teachers are absent or not able to be there."

There will be a transition between 4 and 5 day

schedules next year. Beginning with the upcoming fall semester, the month of August will operate under the regular, 5-day schedule. Then, from September through mid-April, Fridays will be student holidays. The 5-day schedule will resume from mid-April to the end of the school year in May.

The 2023-2024 school year begins Aug. 7 for Crosby ISD, though the four-day schedule won't start until September.

3 teens shot in House Party in Baytown area

BAYTOWN, Texas — An investigation is underway after three teenagers were shot and one was seriously hurt at a house party in Baytown, according to the Harris County Sheriff's Of-

Deputies responded to the shooting at about 11:30 p.m. on Friday in the 4300 block of Firebrush Lane, a cul-de-sac off Bay Run Avenue in Meadowlake Village. The site of the House Party is not far from Goose Creek Memorial High School on Wallisville.

When deputies got there, they said they found two young men, who are 18 and 19 years old, with gunshot wounds. Investigators said the 19-year-old is in critical condition, and the 18-yearold is in fair condition.

Two other teenagers, 15and 16-year-old boys, also arrived at the hospital, according to the sheriff's office. Deputies said the 15-year-

old was shot, and the 16year-old was trampled as he ran from the house after shots were fired. They are both reportedly in fair condition.

Joseph Wetterer, who said he is a longtime friend of Erik Poteet, the 19-yearold who was shot, said

"This is something that's just mind-boggling to us all. It's something you'd never expect. It's a shame something like this happened to him. When you heard his name, and you hear the situation that happened, it makes you go into disbelief," Wetterer said.

"There's still a bullet lodged into the back of his spine and they won't touch it for a while because he's he has no feeling through his legs or anything like that," Wetterer said.

Wetterer wasn't at the party but has set up a Go-FundMe for his friend, who he said was just in the wrong place at the wrong

Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said there were an estimated 100 to 200 people at the house party.

According to Gonzalez, other people fell and/or were trampled while running from the house after the shots were fired. The motive for the shooting is still under investigation.

"If you know anything about the situation or the people involved, please speak up. It would help the family out big time. I just hope that the people who are responsible for this are held up to the law," Wetterer said.

Gonzalez said investigators are aware of possible videos of the party on social media and are asking for anyone with info to call the Harris County Sheriff's Office at 713-274-9365 or Crime Stoppers at 713-222-TIPS.

In addition to drainage improvements and traffic projects already underway, construction of asphalt improvement projects has started for the repair of roadways to increase safety and mobility throughout these areas.

Asphalt Reconstruction Package 2022-2 in the Humble, Aldine and Crosby areas: Construction will begin in the second quarter of 2023 to reconstruct various roads in Humble and Crosby. Roadway portions include Aldine Westfield Road, First Street in the Crosby area, Miller Wilson Road, Hare Cook Road, Ramsey Road, East Stroker Road, and Krenek Road. Drivers may notice daily lane closures, roadway detours, and temporary one-way operations while crews are working. Construction cost is approximately \$11.3 million, and the contractor is GMJ Paving.

River Terrace Subdivision Roadway Reconstruction in the Crosby area: Construction of the asphalt roadways is expected to begin in the third quarter of 2023. As part of the project, Cypress Street, Holley Street, Cherry Laurel Drive, Pine Street, Elm Street, Magnolia Street, Main Street, and portions of River Terrace Road will all undergo reconstruction. Drivers may notice daily lane closures, roadway detours, and temporary oneway operations while crews are working. The reconstruction cost is included within Asphalt Reconstruction package 2022-2, and the contractor is GMJ Pav-
