HOUSTON - Houston pastors and faith leaders congregated to hear Texas General Land Office (GLO) Commissioner Dawn Buckingham, M.D., speak about the success of the GLO's Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP). Major new housing project for Crosby

EAST HARRIS COUN-TY - A new community of almost 1,000 homes is planned for the Crosby area, on the east side of Lake Houston.

Meritage Homes has acquired 241 acres near FM 2100 and Foley Road for its Sundance Cove community, the company announced. About 30 miles northeast of downtown Houston, the community will offer houses with starting prices in the low \$200,000s.

This site had been scheduled for development by other companies several years ago, but due to the economy and Covid pandemic they declined to proceed, and the land was available for Meritage.

Meritage Homes, the



The 241 acre building site for Sundance Cove has been cleared, and construction of new homes is scheduled to start this month.

Scottsdale, Ariz.-based builder, which builds in 37 communities in the Houston area, will offer one- and two-story homes of about 1,300 to 3,000 square feet.

Model homes are expected to open in late summer. Meritage will be the only builder in the community, which will take several years to complete, according to the company.

Sundance Cove will be a welcome addition for the region, which has been popular among residents who grew up in Crosby and

surrounding areas, said David Jarvis, a principal at John Burns Research and Consulting, which tracks U.S. housing markets. "The existing communities are rapidly building out," Jarvis said. "There hasn't been enough new development coming on to replace them."

Sundance Cove will offer amenities such as trails, a swimming pool, splash pad and recreation center. Students will attend Crosby ISD schools. Homes will be available on three lot sizes, from 40 to 50 feet wide and 120 feet

Baytown Woman guilty of Embezzling Millions from her Employer over 10 years

HOUSTON - A 54year-old Baytown woman has pleaded guilty to wire fraud, announced U.S. Attorney Alamdar S. HamdaNi.

Judy M. Green admitted to embezzling over \$3 million from her employer for approximately 10

Green worked as an account manager for a Houston-based building



and maintenance supply company. As part of the scheme, she submitted fraudulent invoices to induce payment from the company and pocketed the funds for personal expenses. Ultimately, the scheme was uncovered when one of the business owners noticed a large payment to an unknown credit card company in the summer of 2022. An audit revealed the fraud had been ongoing since 2012.

U.S. District Judge Alfred Bennett accepted the plea and set sentencing for Aug. 3. At that time, Green faces up to 20 years in federal prison as well as a possible \$250,000 maximum fine.

Green was permitted to remain on bond pending sentencing.

The FBI conducted the investigation. Assistant U.S. Attorney Thomas Carter prosecuted the

Texas GLO posts amendment to expand housing programs

Second amendment of the plan expands eligibility of participants in the Homeowner Assistance Program and Resilient Home Program

AUSTIN - Today the Texas General Land Office (GLO) posted Amendment 2 of the Mitigation State Action Plan for \$4.3 billion in Community Development Block Grants for Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) for a federally required 30-day public comment period. This amendment allows additional individuals with a remaining need for housing assistance to be served in Cameron, Chambers, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Jim Wells, Liberty, Montgomery, Orange, San Jacinto, and Willacy counties.

The amendment includes the following chang-

- Housing Oversubscription Supplemental: Expanded eligible participants to include waitlisted eligible Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP) applicants from the 2018 South Texas Floods HAP and 2019 Disasters (Lower Rio Grande Flooding and Tropical Storm Imelda) HAP.
- Resilient Home Program: Expanded eligible participants to include waitlisted eligible Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP) applicants from the 2018 South Texas Floods HAP and 2019 Disasters (Lower Rio Grande Flooding and Tropical Storm Imelda) HAP.

The GLO's Homeowner Assistance Program has successfully reached the hardest hit, low and moderate income, vulnerable, and historically hard-to-reach families and individuals as defined by the Fair Housing Act and required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Of all approved applicants, nearly 90 percent identify as Black or Hispanic, and 89 percent of homeowners are considered low-tomoderate income with 63 percent of applicants making less than 30 percent of the area median income.

The innovative Resilient Home Program (RHP) reconstructs owner-occupied single-family homes damaged by Hurricane Harvey with additional resiliency and mitigation standards. Eligible participants will be drawn from the GLO's existing waitlisted eligible Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP) applicants. This program also serves as a showcase for more resilient residential construction practices and provide the opportunity to promote these practices throughout the residential construction industry on a scale larger than previously attempted. RHP offers four enhanced construction methods: tiltwall, steel-frame, structural composite lumber, and enhanced wood-frame construction. For more information, please visit recovery.texas.gov/rhp.

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Texas House last Thursday passed two education-related bills, one that allocates \$4.5 billion for teacher pay raises and another to increase the annual per-student base funding from \$6,160 to \$6,300 - a 2.3% increase.

The Austin American-Statesman reported the bill would create minimum salaries for teachers ranging from \$35,000 to \$63,000 depending on experience and level of education. It would also increase funding for special education and fine arts.

Some education advocates worry the per-student funding is insufficient to keep up with inflation, which has grown by 17% in the last four years, the Statesman reported.

The bill also creates a method to adjust the per-student funding for inflation every other year, starting in 2025.

VOTERS MAY DECIDE FATE OF BROADBAND EXPANSION

Voters could decide whether the state should invest \$5 billion to expand internet availability if a bill passed last week by the Texas House makes it through the Senate. House Bill 9, sponsored by state Rep. Trent Ashby, R-Lufkin, would create the Texas Broadband Infrastructure the Texas Fund. Tribune reported.

"This bill will have a measurable impact on each one of your districts," Ashby said last week on the House floor. "No matter whether they be urban,

suburban or rural.' Nearly 7 million Texans do not have reliable broadband service, a fact hammered home during the pandemic, when connectivity often was crucial for schools and people trying to work from home. However, state Comptroller Glenn Hegar said in March that it would take closer to \$10 billion to get all Texans connected.

The state is also expected to receive federal dollars for broadband expansion out of the infrastructure package passed by Congress in 2021, though it is unknown how much Texas will receive out of the \$42.45 billion allocated for broadband expansion. The



\$200 ANNUAL FEE FOR EV

A bill requiring electrical vehicle owners to pay a \$200 annual fee to the state has passed both chambers and sent to Gov. Greg Abbott, The Dallas Morning News reported. Backers of the bill say the higher vehicle registration fees are needed because EV owners don't pay fuel taxes built into the price of fuel and used to fund the state's highway system. The state fuel tax on both gasoline and die-

Opponents of the bill say it would slow the expansion of EVs in the state, which pollute less than vehicles using carbon-based fuels. They also note the fuel tax funds just 29% of what is spent on Texas high-

"The primary cause of the road funding shortfall in Texas has nothing to do with EVs, but rather with the fact that Texas has not increased their gas tax since 1991," Dylan Jaff, sustainability policy analyst with Consumer Reports, said in a memo.

A bipartisan effort to decriminalize the use of fentanvl test strips has stalled in a Texas Senate committee after passing the Texas House with near unanimous report, The Morning News reported. The bill also has the backing of Ab-

some members fear making the test strips legal would lead to more people feeling confident about using dangerous drugs

Fentanyl is often mixed with more expensive drugs such as heroin, leading to thousands of fatal overdoses, including more than 5,000 in Texas from July 2021 to July

"It's just illogical, but there's a belief by some members that it might safeguard the use," Whitmire said.

The testing strips are currently treated as drug paraphernalia. The strips are used to test for the presence of fentanyl in other drugs.

BILL CALLS FOR ARMED OFFICERS AT ALL SCHOOLS

A bill that would require school districts to place at least one armed officer on each campus has passed the Texas H o u the Statesman reported. The measure comes almost a vear after a gunman killed 19 children and two teachers in a mass shooting in Uvalde last May.

ployee would have to complete handgun safety training. The measure also requires at least one audit for intruder detection each year in all districts. The state would provide at least \$100 per student and \$15,000 per campus to maintain and improve school safe-

State Sen. Roland Gutierrez, D-San Antonio, has filed several gun control measures in that chamber that have yet to receive a hearing. Gutierrez represents Uvalde and says more needs to be done besides the House measure.

"Let me be very clear: I'm for anything that's going to make our schools safer," Gutierrez said in the Statesman story. "But the three things that is going to really make our schools safer is extreme risk protective orders, you take guns out of the hands of the mentally ill, Florida did it, it worked; raising the age limit, take guns, AR-15's out of (the hands of) 18-, 19- and 20-yearolds, Florida did it, it worked; closing the gun show loophole and universal background checks."

DISASTER DECLARATION PARTIALLY APPROVED

President Joe Biden has partially approved the state's request for a major disaster declaration for counties affected by an ice storm in late January.

The original request included 23 counties, but 13 were given access to funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency — Bastrop, Blanco, Burleson, Burnet, Hays, Henderson, Kendall, Lee, Leon, Milam, Robertson, Travis and Williamson.

The ice storm damaged millions of trees, particularly in the Austin area, and caused widespread power outages throughout Central Texas. A total of 350,000 people in Texas were without power at some point, according to Spectrum

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Commissioner Dawn Buckingham Addresses Houston Pastors Meeting, Brings Homeowners to Set the Record Straight

dressing the housing needs of Houstonians who need help rebuilding as well as the GLO's success of having more than 1,000 homes rebuilt in Houston and Harris County with another 1,000 homes approved and under construction. She also emphasized the success of the GLO's program, which has helped homeowners who were not served by the City of Houston, which was initially administering the funds for home rebuilding.

"When I was running, I promised, you would see me, you would know me, and I'd be here serving your communities," said Commissioner Buckingham. "What I care about is meeting unmet needs and being sure we are bringing prosperity to your communities, your churches, and helping your folks who need help."

Several Houston-area Harvey victims shared their emotional stories with the audience, including June Battist, who expressed her gratitude to the GLO for intervening when the City of Houston failed to help. Greg Luna shared his story of how the City of Houston mishandled his case and how the GLO was able to provide him with a new home in just 77 days.

Lloyd Helms, who had been approved by the City of Houston for assistance five years before the GLO's intervention, spoke about the frustration as he waited in vain for aid. Timothy LeBlanc also shared his experience, expressing how the GLO was able to build his new home in just 110 days.

Speaking on the impor-

tance of community members meeting with Commissioner Buckingham, Reverend Perry Wooten stated, "[Commissioner Buckingham] has been here every step of the way. God put us here to lead our people and shepherd His flock. We need for her to be in here and touch base with the faith based community." He continued, "She's kept her word. She's

doing what she's told me she's going to do. That's who she is. As long as I'm involved, we're going to bring it back to the community. We're going to make sure you're at the table."

Commissioner Buckingham also took the opportunity to correct some of the false narratives that have been repeated by those opposing the GLO's recovery efforts. She noted that some have falsely claimed the home rebuilding program, regulated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, diminishes home values when in fact, on average, homes rebuilt through the GLO's Homeowner Assistance Program increase the value of the property by more than \$85.000.

Commissioner Buckingham also noted that 85% of

funds are benefiting low-to moderate-income families, significantly outperforming HUD's requirements. Nearly 60% of the households served by the GLO are considered extremely low income, which means the household income would be less than \$27,750 for a family of four.

Commissioner Buckingham concluded the meeting by thanking Reverend Wooten for organizing the event and highlighting the need for organizations to work together more effectively in the future. With the upcoming hurricane season only weeks away, she emphasized the importance of being prepared and working efficiently to provide aid to those who need it

"We know there is another storm coming. We know we haven't recovered from the last one. We have got to get that recovery complete. Then we have to figure out how to come together so next time something happens - because we know it's going to happen - that we come together more efficiently and more effectively," said Commissioner Buckingham.

The meeting was an opportunity to set the record straight and provide homeowners with the required assistance. The Commissioner's remarks highlight the importance of collaboration and the need to work together to prepare for future disasters. (Contributed)

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
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
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
